6 A bridge on that portion of State Route 403 over the Two Lick  
7 Creek, Borough of Clymer, Indiana County as the Sergeant  
8 James Robert Pantall Memorial Bridge.  
9 A bridge on that portion of State Route 580 over the Susquehanna  
10 River, Cherry Tree Borough, Indiana County, as the Airman  
11 Second Class Gerald Emmett Johnson Memorial Bridge.  
12 A bridge on State Route 2014 over the Muncy Creek in Muncy Creek  
13 Township, Lycoming County, as the Private Walter L. Smith

15 A portion of State Route 2044 in Lycoming County as the Lance  
16 Corporal William F. Merrill Vietnam Veterans Highway.  
17 The bridge on State Route 225 that crosses the Armstrong Creek

19 Brian K. Mowery Memorial Bridge.  
20 A bridge on that portion of State Route 1026, Section 004 over  
21 the Cocalico Creek, Denver Borough, and West Cocalico  
22 Township, Lancaster County, as the Samuel L. Snyder Memorial  
23 Bridge.  
24 An overpass on State Route 49 over State Route 15, Lawrence  
25 Township, Tioga County, as the Lance Corporal Michael G.  
26 Plank Memorial Bridge.  
27 A portion of Blair Mill Road in Montgomery County as the PVT  
28 William H. Walls, U.S.M.C. Memorial Highway.  
29 The overpass on State Route 3145 over Interstate 376, BMS 02-  
30 3145-0010-0537, in the Market District at Settlers Ridge,  
31 Robinson Township, Allegheny County, as the Roy F. Johns,  
32 Jr., Overpass.  
33 A portion of State Route 51 in the Borough of Coraopolis,  
34 Allegheny County, as the Fred A. Trello Memorial Boulevard.  
35 A certain interchange in New Stanton Borough, Westmoreland  
36 County, as the Edwin "Lance" Wentzel Memorial Interchange.  
37 The bridge carrying State Route 2005 (Business Route 222) over  
38 the Schuylkill River, Riverfront Drive and Norfolk Southern

1 Railroad in the City of Reading, Berks County, commonly  
2 referred to as the Bingaman Street Bridge, as the 65th U.S.  
3 Infantry Regiment, Borinqueneers Memorial Bridge.  
4 A bridge on that portion of State Route 36 over Chest Creek,  
5 Patton Borough, Cambria County, as the Martin Joseph Davis  
6 Memorial Bridge.  
7 A portion of State Route 1008 in Fayetteville, Franklin County,  
8 as the James W. Cutchall Memorial Highway.  
9 A bridge on that portion of U.S. Route 15 over State Route 114,  
10 Mechanicsburg Borough, Cumberland County, as the Corporal  
11 Jonathan Dean Faircloth Memorial Bridge.

12 Amend Bill, page 3, by inserting between lines 21 and 22

13 Section 2. Sergeant James Robert Pantall Memorial Bridge.

14 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
15 follows:

16 (1) Sergeant James Robert Pantall grew up in the Borough  
17 of Clymer, where he attended Penns Manor High School.

18 (2) Sergeant Pantall served his country honorably in  
19 Vietnam as a member of the 329th Transportation Company, 5th  
20 Transportation Command.

21 (3) On November 3, 1970, Sergeant Pantall was a  
22 passenger on Landing Craft Utility #63 that capsized five  
23 nautical miles south of the port at Tan My, Vietnam. His  
24 remains were not recovered.

25 (b) Designation.--The bridge located on State Route 403 in  
26 the Borough of Clymer, Indiana County, over the Two Lick Creek  
27 is hereby designated the Sergeant James Robert Pantall Memorial  
28 Bridge.

29 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
30 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
31 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

32 Section 3. Airman Second Class Gerald Emmett Johnson Memorial  
33 Bridge.

34 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
35 follows:

36 (1) Airman Second Class Gerald Emmett Johnson of Arcadia  
37 was a crew member of a B-29A Superfortress Bomber with the  
38 371st Bomber Squadron, 307th Bomber Wing during the Korean  
39 War.

40 (2) On October 23, 1951, the aircraft was shot down by  
41 enemy MIGs over Namsi Airfield and Airman Second Class  
42 Johnson was taken as a prisoner of war.

43 (3) Airman Second Class Johnson was declared dead on  
44 January 28, 1954.

45 (4) Airman Second Class Johnson was awarded the Air  
46 Medal, the Purple Heart, the Prisoner of War Medal, the  
47 Korean Service Medal, the United Nations Service Medal, the  
48 National Defense Service Medal, the Korean Presidential Unit  
49 Citation and the Republic of Korea War Service Medal.

1 (b) Designation.--The bridge located on State Route 580 over  
2 the Susquehanna River in Cherry Tree Borough, Indiana County, is  
3 hereby designated the Airman Second Class Gerald Emmett Johnson  
4 Memorial Bridge.

5 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
6 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
7 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

8 Section 4. Private Walter L. Smith Spanish-American War  
9 Memorial Bridge.

10 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
11 follows:

12 (1) Private Walter L. Smith was born on April 27, 1877,  
13 in Muncy, Lycoming County. He was the son of David S. Smith,  
14 a Civil War veteran, and Hannah (Colley) Smith. Private Smith  
15 served in the Spanish-American War and the Philippine  
16 Insurrection.

17 (2) Private Smith first entered the service at  
18 Williamsport on May 7, 1898, and mustered into service May  
19 12, 1898, as a private in Company D, 12th Pennsylvania  
20 Volunteer Infantry. He mustered out and was honorably  
21 discharged on November 1, 1898.

22 (3) Private Smith reenlisted on November 11, 1898, at  
23 Philadelphia during the Time of the Peace Jubilee, with the  
24 rank of Private in the U.S. Army, Company I, 1st U.S.  
25 Volunteer Infantry, as a member of the foot service, heavy  
26 artillery. From December 29, 1898, to September 6, 1900, he  
27 was assigned to Guanajay Barracks, Cuba. He arrived in the  
28 Philippines on April 15, 1901.

29 (4) On July 28, 1901, while on a supply patrol with a  
30 small detachment, Private Smith bravely and selflessly  
31 defended members of his company against an overwhelming  
32 ambush attack by approximately 60 native insurgents at Don  
33 Carlon, Samar, Philippine Islands. During the engagement, his  
34 Sergeant, the only other man who was armed, was shot and  
35 killed by the insurgents. As Private Smith courageously and  
36 fearlessly fought alone, two unarmed soldiers were able to  
37 escape and return to camp. Private Smith was soon overpowered  
38 by the enemy and severely wounded, being stabbed several  
39 times. He was captured and taken prisoner. The U.S. Army  
40 conducted multiple searches to locate Private Smith.

41 (5) Private Walter L. Smith was listed as missing in  
42 action until February 10, 1902, when the fact was  
43 established, beyond a doubt, that he had met his death at the  
44 hands of the insurgents on the date of his capture, July 28,  
45 1901. His remains were never recovered for return home to his  
46 family in Muncy.

47 (b) Designation.--The bridge on State Route 2014 over the  
48 Muncy Creek in Muncy Creek Township, Lycoming County, is hereby  
49 designated the Private Walter L. Smith Spanish-American War  
50 Memorial Bridge.

51 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and

1 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
2 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

3 Section 5. Lance Corporal William F. Merrill Vietnam Veterans  
4 Highway.

5 (a) Findings.--

6 (1) Lance Corporal William Franklin Merrill was born  
7 August 20, 1948, in Muncy, Lycoming County, Pennsylvania, to  
8 Joseph A. and Sheila (Wolfe) Merrill.

9 (2) Lance Corporal Merrill was a resident of Muncy,  
10 Pennsylvania, before enlisting in the United States Marine  
11 Corps on May 6, 1968, at 20 years of age.

12 (3) Lance Corporal Merrill was assigned to India  
13 Company, Third Battalion, First Marines in Vietnam as a  
14 radioman.

15 (4) On May 12, 1969, while on a search and clear  
16 mission, Lance Corporal Merrill's company came under heavy  
17 enemy small arms and repeating fire.

18 (5) With complete disregard for his own personal safety,  
19 Lance Corporal Merrill ran across open and fire-swept terrain  
20 to retrieve a fallen comrade.

21 (6) Lance Corporal Merrill immediately administered  
22 first aid to the wounded marine and carried the marine to a  
23 safer area where he could receive further treatment, helping  
24 to save his life.

25 (7) On August 7, 1969, Lance Corporal Merrill himself  
26 was wounded but returned to duty.

27 (8) On November 26, 1969, the first squad of the third  
28 platoon, including squad leaders and lieutenants, was sent on  
29 a special night activity to conduct an ambush.

30 (9) After the ambush, as nine marines were returning to  
31 their company's position, a wire attached to a booby trap was  
32 tripped.

33 (10) Lance Corporal Merrill guarded the device and  
34 called for his sergeant as the rest of the marines made their  
35 way through the danger area.

36 (11) After the other marines had safely crossed the  
37 ravine where the booby trap was located, the device  
38 detonated, killing Lance Corporal Merrill instantly and  
39 fatally wounding his sergeant.

40 (b) Designation.--The section of State Route 2044 in  
41 Lycoming County from the bridge over Glade Run to the  
42 intersection of State Routes 405 and 422 is hereby designated  
43 the Lance Corporal William F. Merrill Vietnam Veterans Highway.

44 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
45 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to  
46 traffic in both directions on the highway.

47 Section 6. Staff Sergeant Brian K. Mowery Memorial Bridge.

48 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
49 follows:

50 (1) Brian K. Mowery was born on December 30, 1961, to  
51 Harry E. and Patricia M. Mowery.

1 (2) Staff Sergeant Mowery served in the United States  
2 Marine Corps from 1979 through 1985.

3 (3) In 2000, Staff Sergeant Mowery enlisted in the  
4 Pennsylvania Army National Guard - Kutztown as an infantry  
5 team leader and a motor transport operator. During this time,  
6 he served in the Kosovo Peacekeeping Mission from 2003  
7 through 2004 and in disaster relief after Hurricane Katrina  
8 in 2005.

9 (4) Staff Sergeant Mowery proudly served in the 131st  
10 Transportation Company of the Pennsylvania Army National  
11 Guard - Williamstown starting in 2010 and was stationed in  
12 Afghanistan from January 2011 until his death.

13 (5) While transporting necessary supplies near Bagram,  
14 Afghanistan, his convoy was attacked, and Staff Sergeant  
15 Mowery was killed on July 18, 2011.

16 (6) In recognition of his service, Staff Sergeant Mowery  
17 was awarded two Army Commendation Medals, an Army Reserve  
18 Component Achievement Medal, a NATO Medal, the Kosovo  
19 Campaign Medal and the Governor's Unit Citation. He  
20 posthumously received the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star,  
21 and he was promoted to the rank of Staff Sergeant.

22 (b) Designation.--The bridge on State Route 225 that crosses  
23 the Armstrong Creek in Halifax Township, Dauphin County, is  
24 hereby designated as the Staff Sergeant Brian K. Mowery Memorial  
25 Bridge.

26 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
27 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
28 traffic in both directions on the bridge.  
29 Section 7. Samuel L. Snyder Memorial Bridge.

30 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
31 follows:

32 (1) Samuel L. Snyder was born on February 12, 1882, in  
33 East Cocalico Township, Lancaster County. Mr. Snyder was a  
34 building contractor, developer and realtor in Denver,  
35 Pennsylvania, for nearly six decades. It is estimated that he  
36 built approximately 200 homes in the Denver area alone.

37 (2) Mr. Snyder served as the fire chief for the Denver  
38 Fire Company for 33 years and held the title of honorary  
39 chief at the time of his death in 1965.

40 (3) Mr. Snyder donated the land on which the new fire  
41 house was built and served as a trustee of the Lancaster  
42 County Firemen's Association. He was also a member of the  
43 Firemen's Association of Pennsylvania, the Keystone State  
44 Fire Chiefs Association and the International Association of  
45 Fire Chiefs.

46 (4) He was a leader in Masonic organizations, a charter  
47 member of the Denver Lions Club since 1926, as well as a past  
48 president and a vice president of the Lancaster Automobile  
49 Club. He served on the council of the St. John's Lutheran  
50 Church in Denver Borough and contributed funding to assist  
51 the St. John's Evangelical and Reformed Church and the

1 Trinity Evangelical United Brethren Church in Denver.

2 (5) Following World War II, there was a movement in  
3 Denver Borough for a community park. Mr. Snyder donated 15  
4 acres of land for what is now the Denver Memorial Park and  
5 Playground, as well as leading efforts to develop the park.

6 (6) Mr. Snyder died on February 19, 1965, at the age of  
7 83.

8 (b) Designation.--The bridge located on that portion of  
9 State Route 1026, Section 004 over the Cocalico Creek, Denver  
10 Borough, and West Cocalico Township, Lancaster County, is hereby  
11 designated as the Samuel L. Snyder Memorial Bridge.

12 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
13 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
14 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

15 Section 8. Lance Corporal Michael G. Plank Memorial Bridge.

16 (a) Findings.--

17 (1) Lance Corporal Michael G. Plank was a 2004 graduate  
18 of Elkland High School, Tioga County.

19 (2) Lance Corporal Plank served in the Marine Corps  
20 assigned to the 7th Engineer Battalion, 1st Marine Logistics  
21 Group, Camp Pendleton, California.

22 (3) On June 9, 2010, Lance Corporal Plank died while  
23 supporting combat operations in Helmand Province,  
24 Afghanistan.

25 (4) Lance Corporal Plank received the National Defense  
26 Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign Medal, the War on Terrorism  
27 Service Medal, the Non-Article 5 ISAF Medal and the Rifle  
28 Expert, 2nd Award.

29 (b) Designation.--The overpass on State Route 49 over State  
30 Route 15, Lawrence Township, Tioga County, is hereby designated  
31 the Lance Corporal Michael G. Plank Memorial Bridge.

32 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
33 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
34 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

35 Section 9. PVT William H. Walls, U.S.M.C. Memorial Highway.

36 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
37 follows:

38 (1) PVT William H. Walls, a native of Horsham Township,  
39 Montgomery County, valiantly served in the Marine Corps  
40 during the Vietnam Conflict.

41 (2) On January 24, 1966, PVT Walls, at 19 years of age,  
42 gave his life in service to his country when he was mortally  
43 wounded by sniper fire in Quang Nam Province, Vietnam.

44 (b) Designation.--The section of Blair Mill Road from  
45 Moreland Road to Horsham Road in Upper Moreland Township and  
46 Horsham Township, Montgomery County, is hereby designated the  
47 PVT William H. Walls, U.S.M.C. Memorial Highway.

48 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
49 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to  
50 traffic in both directions on the highway.

51 Section 10. Roy F. Johns, Jr., Overpass.

1 (a) Findings.--

2 (1) Roy F. Johns, Jr., United States Army veteran and  
3 chief executive officer of the Moon Township-based  
4 engineering consulting firm, Roy F. Johns, Jr., Associates,  
5 died in Moon Township, October 28, 2014, at 80 years of age.

6 (2) Mr. Johns graduated with honors from Carnegie Mellon  
7 University, having earned a bachelor's degree in civil  
8 engineering and a master's degree in business administration.

9 (3) Mr. Johns attained distinction as a master planner  
10 and developer of notable sites in southwestern Pennsylvania,  
11 including office and land acquisitions along the Parkway West  
12 in the 1970s.

13 (4) A leader of the region's commercial, industrial and  
14 residential development, Mr. Johns was affiliated with  
15 Airport Office Center Associates, Alleges Institute, Tech One  
16 Associates and other corporations in and around the Airport  
17 Corridor as well as retail sites in West Mifflin.

18 (5) Mr. Johns was instrumental in forming the Moon  
19 Transportation Authority and Thorn Run Interchange Group.

20 (6) Mr. Johns was a member of the American Society of  
21 Civil Engineers, National Society of Professional Engineers,  
22 International Council of Shopping Centers, Engineering  
23 Society of Western Pennsylvania, Society of American Military  
24 Engineers and United States Senatorial Business Advisory  
25 Board.

26 (7) With his wife, Barbara Johns, Mr. Johns further  
27 enriched Greater Pittsburgh through the Roy F. Johns, Jr.,  
28 Family Foundation.

29 (b) Designation.--The overpass on State Route 3145 over  
30 Interstate 376, BMS 02-3145-0010-0537, in the Market District at  
31 Settlers Ridge, Robinson Township, Allegheny County, is hereby  
32 designated as the Roy F. Johns, Jr., Overpass.

33 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
34 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
35 traffic in both directions.  
36 Section 11. Fred A. Trello Memorial Boulevard.

37 (a) Declaration of policy.--The General Assembly finds and  
38 declares as follows:

39 (1) Representative Fred Trello was born on November 14,  
40 1929, in the Borough of Coraopolis in Allegheny County.

41 (2) Representative Trello graduated from Coraopolis High  
42 School in 1949 and earned degrees from the Air Force  
43 Electronics School and Robert Morris College.

44 (3) Representative Trello served in the Korean War as a  
45 member of the United States Air Force.

46 (4) Representative Trello began his political career as  
47 a Democratic committeeman and councilman for the Borough of  
48 Coraopolis.

49 (5) In 1974, Representative Trello was elected to the  
50 Pennsylvania House of Representatives where he served the  
51 45th legislative district until 2002.

1 (6) Representative Trello was a long-time member of the  
2 Knights of Columbus, the Coraopolis Lions Club, the ISDA Club  
3 and Saint Joseph's Roman Catholic Church.

4 (7) On March 28, 2006, Representative Fred Trello passed  
5 away at the age of 76.

6 (b) Designation.--The section of State Route 51 North, known  
7 as Fourth Avenue, that runs from Ferree Street (Segment 0690,  
8 offset 0730) to Thorn Run Road (Segment 0720, offset 0720) and  
9 the section of State Route 51 South, known as Fifth Avenue, that  
10 runs from Thorn Run (Segment 0721, offset 0790) to Ferree Street  
11 (Segment 0691, offset 0545), in the Borough of Coraopolis,  
12 Allegheny County, is hereby designated as the Fred A. Trello  
13 Memorial Boulevard.

14 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
15 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to  
16 traffic in both directions on the highway.  
17 Section 12. Edwin "Lance" Wentzel Memorial Interchange.

18 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
19 follows:

20 (1) Edwin "Lance" Wentzel was a native of Youngwood and  
21 a 35-year veteran of the Youngwood Volunteer Hose Company No.  
22 1.

23 (2) On March 22, 2014, Mr. Wentzel was part of a group  
24 from the fire department using its K-9 Search and Rescue team  
25 to aid in a search for a missing woman in North Versailles.  
26 As he was searching along railroad tracks, Mr. Wentzel  
27 accidentally stepped in front of an oncoming train and was  
28 hit from behind by its engine. He died at the scene.

29 (3) Mr. Wentzel was a well-respected and committed  
30 volunteer firefighter. He held numerous line officer and  
31 board positions within the department during his lengthy  
32 service and was named the 2012 Youngwood Firefighter of the  
33 Year. Mr. Wentzel took part in the rescue effort at Ground  
34 Zero after 9/11.

35 (b) Designation.--The interchange of Interstate 70 and  
36 Pennsylvania Route 119 in New Stanton Borough, Westmoreland  
37 County, is hereby designated the Edwin "Lance" Wentzel Memorial  
38 Interchange.

39 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
40 maintain appropriate signs at the interchange displaying the  
41 name of the interchange.

42 Section 13. 65th U.S. Infantry Regiment, Borinqueneers Memorial  
43 Bridge.

44 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds as follows:

45 (1) "The Borinqueneers" were the only all-Hispanic unit  
46 in the history of the United States Army.

47 (2) "The Borinqueneers" is a nickname for the 65th  
48 Infantry Regiment of the 3rd Division in the United States  
49 Army, an all-volunteer Puerto Rican unit. The name was  
50 derived from the name borinquen meaning "land of the brave  
51 lord."



(3) The unit was founded in 1899 and remained a vital part of the United States Armed Forces until 1956.

(4) "The Borinqueneers" displayed valiant and meritorious service in World War I, World War II and the Korean War.

(5) More than 62,000 Puerto Ricans joined the military during World War II and more than 43,000 Puerto Ricans served in the Korean War.

(6) While in Korea, "the Borinqueneers" served in nine separate military campaigns, where hundreds of men gave their lives in service to their country.

(7) In 1959, the regiment was allotted to the Puerto Rico Army National Guard, where the 1st Battalion, 65th Infantry still serves.

(8) Since inception of the unit, more than 20,000 Puerto Ricans have served as "Borinqueneers," but their contributions and sacrifices have gone largely unnoticed by the country at large.

(9) While defending the United States, these brave soldiers have earned 628 Bronze Stars, 258 Silver Stars, 10 Distinguished Service Crosses and more than 2,700 Purple Hearts.

(b) Designation.--The bridge carrying State Route 2005 (Business Route 222) over the Schuylkill River, Riverfront Drive and Norfolk Southern Railroad in the City of Reading, Berks County, commonly referred to as the Bingaman Street Bridge, is hereby designated the 65th U.S. Infantry Regiment, Borinqueneers Memorial Bridge.

(c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to traffic in both directions on the bridge.  
Section 14. Martin Joseph Davis Memorial Bridge.

(a) Findings and declarations.--The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:

(1) Born August 25, 1947, Martin Joseph Davis was a resident of Patton and graduated from Cambria Heights High School in 1966.

(2) Mr. Davis entered the Army November 14, 1967, and served as a Specialist 4th Class with B Company, 3rd Battalion, 21st Infantry, 196th Infantry Brigade, during the Vietnam War.

(3) On August 2, 1968, in the Quang Tin Province of Vietnam, Specialist Davis was killed in action by an explosive device. He was 21 years of age.

(4) Specialist Davis served this Commonwealth and our nation with honor and respect and gave the supreme sacrifice while carrying out his duties.

(b) Designation.--The bridge located on State Route 36 in Patton Borough, Cambria County, over Chest Creek, is hereby designated the Martin Joseph Davis Memorial Bridge.

(c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and

1 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
2 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

3 Section 15. James W. Cutchall Memorial Highway.

4 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
5 follows:

6 (1) Fayetteville Fire Chief James W. Cutchall was  
7 tragically shot and killed on July 2, 1977, when he arrived  
8 at the scene of a blaze set by his killer who then ambushed  
9 the responding firefighters.

10 (2) Chief Cutchall, only 33 years of age at the time of  
11 his death, was widely regarded as one of the most outstanding  
12 fire chiefs in the nation.

13 (3) Chief Cutchall was known for using one saying in his  
14 speeches, "To be a volunteer firefighter and make an error is  
15 human. To be a volunteer firefighter and worry about those  
16 errors is compassion. To be a volunteer firefighter and do  
17 something about those errors is professionalism."

18 (b) Designation.--The section of State Route 1008 in  
19 Fayetteville, Franklin County, is hereby designated the James W.  
20 Cutchall Memorial Highway.

21 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
22 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to  
23 traffic in both directions on the highway.

24 Section 16. Corporal Jonathan Dean Faircloth Memorial Bridge.

25 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
26 follows:

27 (1) United States Marine Corps Corporal Jonathan Dean  
28 Faircloth, 22 years of age, died on March 29, 2011, while  
29 taking part in training maneuvers at Marine Corps Base  
30 Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii; and

31 (2) Corporal Faircloth was born in York on May 7, 1988,  
32 and graduated from Mechanicsburg Area High School in 2006;  
33 and

34 (3) Corporal Faircloth joined the Marine Corps in 2006  
35 and was deployed to Iraq in 2008 and to Afghanistan in 2010;  
36 and

37 (4) Corporal Faircloth served as an aerial observer and  
38 aircraft mechanic throughout his five-year military career;  
39 and

40 (5) For his exemplary service, Corporal Faircloth was  
41 awarded four Air Medals, two Navy-Marine Corps Achievement  
42 Medals, the Iraq Campaign Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign  
43 Medal, the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal and the  
44 National Defense Service Medal.

45 (b) Designation.--The bridge located on U.S. Route 15 in  
46 Mechanicsburg Borough, Cumberland County over State Route 114 is  
47 hereby designated the Corporal Jonathan Dean Faircloth Memorial  
48 Bridge.

49 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
50 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
51 traffic in both directions on the bridge.
