AN ACT

Amending the act of June 3, 1937 (P.L.1333, No.320), entitled "An act concerning elections, including general, municipal, 1 2 special and primary elections, the nomination of candidates, 3 primary and election expenses and election contests; creating and defining membership of county boards of elections; 5 imposing duties upon the Secretary of the Commonwealth, courts, county boards of elections, county commissioners; 6 7 imposing penalties for violation of the act, and codifying, 8 9 revising and consolidating the laws relating thereto; and repealing certain acts and parts of acts relating to 10 elections," in primary and election expenses, further 11 providing for definitions, for organization of political 12 committees, for registration and for reporting; in primary 13 and election expenses, providing for limitations on 14 contributions; in primary and election expenses, further providing for late filing fees and certificates of filing, 15 16 17 for contributions or expenditures by national banks, corporations or unincorporated associations and for reports 18 19 by business entities and publication; in primary and election expenses, providing for independent expenditures; and 20 providing for corporate political accountability. 21 22 The General Assembly finds and declares as follows: 23 The Commonwealth has a compelling governmental interest to 24 protect the integrity of the government from actual corruption 25 or the appearance of corruption. The General Assembly recognizes 26 that when people, associations or other entities provide

unlimited monetary support for elected government officials or

- 1 candidates who are seeking governmental offices, there arises
- 2 the appearance of corruption. The appearance of corruption and
- 3 actual corruption can be prevented by regulating the
- 4 contributions that can be made to elected governmental officials
- 5 and candidates who are seeking governmental offices.
- 6 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 7 hereby enacts as follows:
- 8 Section 1. Section 1621(d) of the act of June 3, 1937
- 9 (P.L.1333, No.320), known as the Pennsylvania Election Code,
- 10 added October 4, 1978 (P.L.893, No.171), is amended and the
- 11 section is amended by adding subsections to read:
- 12 Section 1621. Definitions. -- As used in this article, the
- 13 following words have the following meanings:
- 14 * * *
- 15 (d) The word "expenditure" shall mean <u>any of the following</u>:
- 16 (1) The payment, distribution, loan or advancement of money
- 17 or any valuable thing by a candidate, candidate committee,
- 18 political committee, political action committee, political party
- 19 <u>committee</u> or other person for the purpose of influencing the
- 20 outcome of a nomination or an election[;]: Provided, however,
- 21 That such payment, distribution, loan or advancement of money or
- 22 <u>any valuable thing shall be made only for expenses directly and</u>
- 23 exclusively incurred for the campaign in which the candidate is
- 24 running in the contemporaneous election cycle and that no
- 25 expenditure of funds from campaign accounts shall be used for
- 26 any personal purpose.
- 27 (2) The payment, distribution, loan, advance or transfer of
- 28 money or other valuable thing between or among political
- 29 committees[;].
- 30 (3) The providing of a service or other valuable thing for

- 1 the purpose of influencing the outcome of a nomination or
- 2 election of any person to any public office to be voted for in
- 3 this Commonwealth[; or].
- 4 (4) The payment or providing of money or other valuable
- 5 thing by any person other than a candidate or political
- 6 committee, to compensate any person for services rendered to a
- 7 candidate or political committee.
- 8 * * *
- 9 <u>(n) The words "affiliate" or "affiliated committee" shall</u>
- 10 include:
- 11 (1) Any committee established or authorized by a candidate
- 12 <u>as part of his or her campaign for a specific campaign for a</u>
- 13 <u>designated office.</u>
- 14 (2) Any committee established, financed, maintained or
- 15 controlled by the same corporation, labor organization,
- 16 membership association, not-for-profit organization or trade or
- 17 professional association, person or group of persons, including
- 18 any parent, subsidiary, branch, division, department or local
- 19 <u>unit thereof. Local units may include, in appropriate cases, a</u>
- 20 franchisee, licensee or regional association.
- 21 (o) The words "in-kind contribution" shall mean a
- 22 <u>contribution of goods, services, property or any valuable thing</u>
- 23 <u>offered free or at less than the fair market value for such</u>
- 24 goods, property or services, but shall not include any legal or
- 25 accounting services rendered to or on behalf of any political
- 26 committee of a political party, an authorized committee of a
- 27 <u>candidate or any other political committee</u>, if such services are
- 28 solely for the purpose of ensuring compliance with this article.
- 29 Such legal or accounting services, however, shall be reported
- 30 pursuant to section 1631.

- 1 (p) The words "personal purpose" mean a purpose that, by its
- 2 nature, confers a personal benefit, including expenditures such
- 3 as a home mortgage, home rent, utility payment, clothing
- 4 purchase, noncampaign automobile expense, country club
- 5 membership, vacation or a trip of a noncampaign nature,
- 6 household food items, tuition payments, admission to a sporting
- 7 event, concert, theater or other form of entertainment and other
- 8 <u>such expenditures not specifically and directly necessary for</u>
- 9 the conduct of the campaign.
- 10 (q) The words "clearly identified" are satisfied by:
- 11 (1) the name of the candidate appears;
- 12 (2) a photograph, drawing or other image of the candidate
- 13 appears; or
- 14 (3) the identity of the candidate or ballot question is
- 15 apparent by unambiguous reference.
- 16 <u>(r) The word "person" shall include any corporation,</u>
- 17 partnership, limited liability company, business trust, other
- 18 association, government entity, other than the Commonwealth,
- 19 estate, trust, foundation or natural person.
- 20 Section 1.1. Section 1622 of the act, amended or added
- 21 October 4, 1978 (P.L.893, No.171) and July 11, 1980 (P.L.591,
- 22 No.127), is amended to read:
- 23 Section 1622. Organization of Political Committees;
- 24 Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer; Records of Candidate and
- 25 Committees.--
- 26 (a) Every political committee shall have a treasurer and a
- 27 chairman. No contribution shall be received nor shall any
- 28 expenditure be made when there is a vacancy in either one of
- 29 these offices. All money received and disbursed by a political
- 30 committee must be done through the treasurer of the committee.

- 1 (b) Every candidate who authorizes a committee [or
- 2 committees,] to receive and disburse funds on behalf of this
- 3 candidacy, shall name a sole treasurer[, irrespective of the
- 4 number of committees so authorized,] to receive and disburse all
- 5 funds [for] of said [committees. Nothing herein shall be
- 6 construed to prohibit a candidate from receiving or expending
- 7 moneys on his behalf or a treasurer of a political party
- 8 committee or a committee authorized to receive and distribute
- 9 funds on behalf of more than one (1) candidate from receiving or
- 10 expending moneys on behalf of said candidates, notwithstanding
- 11 the appointment of a sole treasurer. A sole treasurer may
- 12 delegate authority, in writing, to any number of assistant
- 13 treasurers to receive and disburse moneys collected on behalf of
- 14 a candidate for election. Nothing in this section shall prohibit
- 15 authorized individuals from selling tickets or soliciting funds
- 16 when funds are deposited in the campaign account of the
- 17 candidate] committee.
- 18 (c) Each candidate and committee shall keep records of the
- 19 names and addresses of each person from whom a contribution of
- 20 over ten dollars (\$10) has been received and a record of all
- 21 other information required to be reported pursuant to this act.
- 22 All such records shall be retained by the candidate or treasurer
- 23 for a period of three (3) years after such information is
- 24 reported as required by this act.
- 25 (d) Any person receiving any contribution on behalf of a
- 26 political committee or candidate shall turn such contributions
- 27 over to the treasurer of that committee or the candidate within
- 28 ten (10) days of its receipt.
- 29 Section 1.2. Section 1624 of the act, added October 4, 1978
- 30 (P.L.893, No.171), is amended to read:

- 1 Section 1624. Registration.--
- 2 (a) Any political committee which receives contributions in
- 3 an aggregate amount of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) or more
- 4 shall file a registration statement, designed by the Secretary
- 5 of the Commonwealth, with the appropriate supervisor within
- 6 twenty (20) days after the date on which it receives such
- 7 amount. Each committee in existence shall have sixty (60) days
- 8 from the effective date of this amendatory act to comply with
- 9 the requirements of this section.
- 10 (b) Each registration statement shall contain the following
- 11 information:
- 12 (1) The name, addresses and phone numbers of the political
- 13 committee.
- 14 (2) The name, address and phone number of the committee's
- 15 treasurer.
- 16 (3) The name, address and phone number of the committee's
- 17 chairman.
- 18 (4) The names, addresses and relationships of other
- 19 affiliated or connected organizations.
- 20 (5) The candidates, if any, and their names and addresses.
- 21 (6) The ballot question, if any, which the committee intends
- 22 to support or oppose.
- 23 (7) The banks, safety deposit boxes or other repositories
- 24 and their addresses used by the committee.
- 25 (8) The proposed period of operation of the committee.
- 26 (9) A political committee which is established, financed,
- 27 <u>maintained or controlled by a sponsoring organization such as a</u>
- 28 corporation, labor organization, membership association, not-
- 29 for-profit organization or trade or professional association
- 30 shall include in its registered name the full name of its

- 1 <u>sponsoring organization</u>.
- 2 (c) The committee shall inform the appropriate supervisor of
- 3 any changes in the information contained in subsection (b)
- 4 within thirty (30) days of that change.
- 5 (d) No political committee which receives an aggregate
- 6 amount of contributions of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) or
- 7 more may make a contribution to any candidate or political
- 8 committee unless it has registered with the appropriate
- 9 supervisor.
- Section 2. Section 1626(a), (b), (d) and (g) of the act,
- 11 amended or added October 4, 1978 (P.L.893, No.171) and July 11,
- 12 1980 (P.L.600, No.128), are amended and the section is amended
- 13 by adding a subsection to read:
- 14 Section 1626. Reporting by Candidate and Political
- 15 Committees and other Persons.--
- 16 (a) Each treasurer of a political committee and each
- 17 candidate for election to public office shall file with the
- 18 appropriate supervisor reports of receipts and expenditures on
- 19 forms, designed by the Secretary of the Commonwealth, if the
- 20 amount received or expended or liabilities incurred shall exceed
- 21 the sum of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250). Should such an
- 22 amount not exceed two hundred fifty dollars (\$250), then the
- 23 candidate or, in the case of a political committee, the
- 24 treasurer of the committee shall file a sworn statement to that
- 25 effect with the appropriate supervisor rather than the report
- 26 required by this section[.]: Provided, however, That if the
- 27 <u>amount received or expended by a candidate does not exceed two</u>
- 28 <u>hundred fifty dollars (\$250) he or she may comply with this</u>
- 29 section by signing an affidavit to that effect on his or her
- 30 political committee's report or statement.

- 1 (b) Each report shall include the following information:
- 2 (1) The full name, mailing address, specific occupation and
- 3 specific name of the employer, if any, or the principal place of
- 4 business, if self-employed, of each person who has made one or
- 5 more contributions to or for such committee or candidate within
- 6 the reporting period in an aggregate amount or value in excess
- 7 of [two hundred fifty dollars (\$250)] one hundred dollars
- 8 (\$100), together with the amount and date of such contributions.
- 9 The accuracy of the information furnished to the candidate or
- 10 committee shall be the responsibility of the contributor.
- 11 (2) The full name and mailing address of each person [who]
- 12 and political committee that has made one or more contributions
- 13 to or for such committee or candidate within the reporting
- 14 period in an aggregate amount or value in excess of fifty
- 15 dollars (\$50), together with the amount and date of such
- 16 contributions. The accuracy of the information furnished by the
- 17 contributor shall be the responsibility of the contributor.
- 18 (3) The total sum of individual contributions made to or for
- 19 such committee or candidate during the reporting period and not
- 20 reported under clauses (1) and (2).
- 21 (4) Each and every expenditure, the date made, the full name
- 22 and address of the person to whom made and the purpose for which
- 23 such expenditure was made. <u>In the event the creditor is a credit</u>
- 24 card company or like instrumentality that is an intermediary for
- 25 <u>collecting payments due</u>, it shall not be sufficient to list the
- 26 name of the collecting organization. The report shall identify
- 27 the credit card company and also the specific entities and
- 28 payments being paid through the credit card company or like
- 29 entity. In the event the payment is being made by a committee to
- 30 a creditor for expenses on behalf of one or more candidates, the

- 1 amounts of payments and purposes of the payments shall be broken
- 2 down to identify each candidate's share of the incurred
- 3 <u>expenses</u>.
- 4 (5) Any unpaid debts and liabilities, with the nature and
- 5 amount of each, the date incurred and the full name and address
- 6 of the person owed.
- 7 (6) The account shall include any unexpended balance of
- 8 contributions or other receipts appearing from the last account
- 9 filed.
- 10 (7) Identification of political committees:
- 11 (i) If the contributor is a political committee, the
- 12 <u>official registration number of the committee must be included</u>
- 13 on the contribution check or in the case of an electronic
- 14 <u>transfer within the documentation sent to the candidate</u>
- 15 providing notice to the electronic transfer of funds.
- 16 (ii) The official registration number of the committee shall
- 17 be included on the disclosure report filed by the committee.
- 18 (iii) The official committee registration number shall be
- 19 included on each entry for that committee on a candidate's
- 20 disclosure report.
- 21 * * *
- 22 (d) Pre-election reports by candidates for offices to be
- 23 voted for by the electors of the State at large, candidates for
- 24 the office of Senator in the General Assembly, candidates for
- 25 the office of Representative in the General Assembly and all
- 26 political committees, which have expended money for the purpose
- 27 of influencing the election of such [candidate] candidates,
- 28 shall be filed not later than the sixth Tuesday before and the
- 29 second Friday before an election, provided that the initial pre-
- 30 election report shall be complete as of fifty (50) days prior to

- 1 the election and the subsequent pre-election report shall be
- 2 complete as of fifteen (15) days prior to the election. Pre-
- 3 election reports by all other candidates and political
- 4 committees which have received contributions or made
- 5 expenditures for the purpose of influencing an election shall be
- 6 filed not later than the second Friday before an election,
- 7 provided that such report be complete as of fifteen (15) days
- 8 prior to the election.
- 9 (d.1) During nonelection years in which subsection (d) is
- 10 not operative, an elected official or announced candidate for
- 11 any elective office shall file quarterly reports if he or she
- 12 receives more than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) during the
- 13 <u>respective calendar quarter. Reports shall be due thirty (30)</u>
- 14 days after the end of each calendar quarter and shall be
- 15 complete through the final day of the calendar quarter the
- 16 <u>report covers.</u>
- 17 * * *
- 18 (g) [Every] Except as provided under section 1644, every
- 19 person, other than a political committee or candidate, who makes
- 20 independent expenditures expressly advocating the election or
- 21 defeat of a clearly identified candidate, or question appearing
- 22 on the ballot, other than by contribution to a political
- 23 committee or candidate, in an aggregate amount in excess of [one
- 24 hundred dollars (\$100)] one thousand dollars (\$1,000) during a
- 25 calendar year shall file with the appropriate supervisor, on a
- 26 form prepared by the Secretary of the Commonwealth, a report
- 27 which shall include the same information required of a candidate
- 28 or political committee receiving such a contribution and,
- 29 additionally, the name of the candidate or question supported or
- 30 opposed. Reports required by this subsection shall be filed on

- 1 dates on which reports by political committees making
- 2 expenditures are required to report under this section.
- 3 * * *
- 4 Section 3. The act is amended by adding a section to read:
- 5 <u>Section 1627.1. Limitations on Certain Contributions.--</u>
- 6 (a) Aggregate contributions, including in-kind
- 7 contributions, from any individual to any candidate for the
- 8 office of Senator or Representative in the General Assembly,
- 9 court of common pleas or a county or local office, or to the
- 10 candidate's committee or agent, may not exceed five hundred
- 11 dollars (\$500) for each election. Furthermore, for each
- 12 <u>election</u>, a candidate and the candidate's committee or agent may
- 13 not accept or receive more than five hundred dollars (\$500) in
- 14 aggregate contributions, including in-kind contributions from
- 15 any individual for each election.
- 16 (b) Aggregate contributions, including in-kind
- 17 contributions, from any individual to any candidate for
- 18 Statewide office, his authorized committee or agent may not
- 19 exceed two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for each
- 20 election. Furthermore, for each election, no candidate, his
- 21 authorized committee or agent may accept or receive more than
- 22 two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) in aggregate
- 23 contributions, including in-kind contributions from any
- 24 individual for each election.
- 25 (c) For each election aggregate contributions, including in-
- 26 kind contributions, from a single political action committee,
- 27 <u>its affiliate or agent or candidate's political committee, its</u>
- 28 affiliate or agent to any candidate for Statewide office, the
- 29 <u>office of Senator or Representative in the General Assembly,</u>
- 30 court of common pleas or a county or local office, his

- 1 authorized committee or agent may not exceed five thousand
- 2 dollars (\$5,000). For each election, no candidate for such
- 3 office, nor the candidate's committee or agent may accept or
- 4 receive more than the applicable amount or amounts as specified
- 5 <u>in this subsection in aggregate contributions, including in-kind</u>
- 6 contributions, from a single political action committee or agent
- 7 <u>or candidate's political committee. A donor is an individual or</u>
- 8 <u>a single committee regardless of the number of contributions</u>
- 9 made by that individual or committee during the election cycle.
- 10 (d) Contributions from political party committees to a
- 11 political action committee, other party committee or other
- 12 committee may not exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for each
- 13 election.
- 14 (e) A candidate for the office of Senator or Representative
- 15 <u>in the General Assembly, judge of a court of common pleas or a</u>
- 16 <u>county or local office</u>, or the candidate's committee or agent
- 17 may not accept in excess of one hundred thousand dollars
- 18 (\$100,000) in aggregate contributions, including in-kind
- 19 contributions from all political party committees, affiliates or
- 20 agents. Such contributions, in the aggregate, received by a
- 21 candidate, may not exceed the aggregate contributions made by
- 22 individuals per election.
- 23 (f) Except for a candidate for the office of Governor, a
- 24 candidate for Statewide office, his authorized committee or
- 25 agent may not accept in excess of two hundred fifty thousand
- 26 dollars (\$250,000) in aggregate contributions, including in-kind
- 27 <u>contributions from all political party committees</u>, affiliates or
- 28 agents. A candidate for Governor, his authorized committee or
- 29 <u>agent may not accept in excess of one million dollars</u>
- 30 (\$1,000,000) in aggregate contributions, including in-kind

- 1 contributions from all political party committees, affiliates or
- 2 agents. Furthermore, such contributions in aggregate received by
- 3 <u>a candidate may not exceed the aggregate contributions made by</u>
- 4 <u>individuals per election</u>.
- 5 (q) Aggregate contributions, including in-kind
- 6 contributions, from any person or a single political action
- 7 <u>committee</u>, its affiliate or agent or any single candidate's
- 8 political committee, its affiliate or agent to a single
- 9 political action committee, its affiliate or agent may not
- 10 exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) during any calendar year.
- 11 Furthermore, for each election, no political action committee,
- 12 <u>its affiliate or agent may accept or receive more than five</u>
- 13 thousand dollars (\$5,000) in aggregate contributions, including
- 14 <u>in-kind contributions</u>, from any individual person or a single
- 15 political action committee, its affiliate or agent during any
- 16 <u>calendar year</u>.
- 17 (h) Aggregate contributions from any individual, person or a
- 18 single candidate's political committee, its affiliate or agent
- 19 or a single political action committee, its affiliate or agent
- 20 or any other political committee to a single political party
- 21 committee may not exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in a
- 22 calendar year. Furthermore, no single political party committee
- 23 <u>may accept or receive more than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000)</u>
- 24 in aggregate contributions from any individual, person, single
- 25 candidate's political committee or agent or a single political
- 26 action committee, its affiliate or agent, any political
- 27 <u>committee or other committee in a calendar year.</u>
- 28 (i) The following shall apply to annual aggregate limits:
- 29 (1) No individual may make contributions to candidates,
- 30 political committees or other committees that have a combined

- 1 aggregate amount or value that exceeds twenty-five thousand
- 2 dollars (\$25,000) in a calendar year.
- 3 (2) No political action committee may make contributions to
- 4 <u>candidates</u>, political committees and party committees in an
- 5 aggregate amount or value that exceeds one hundred thousand
- 6 <u>dollars (\$100,000) in any calendar year.</u>
- 7 (j) A gift, subscription, loan, advance or deposit of money
- 8 or anything of value to a candidate shall be considered a
- 9 contribution both by the original source of the contribution and
- 10 by any intermediary or conduit if the intermediary or conduit:
- 11 (1) exercises any direction over the making of the
- 12 <u>contribution; or</u>
- 13 (2) solicits the contribution or arranges for the
- 14 contribution to be made and directly or indirectly makes the
- 15 <u>candidate aware of such intermediary or conduit's role in</u>
- 16 soliciting or arranging the contribution for the candidate.
- 17 (k) For purposes of subsection (j), a contribution shall not
- 18 be considered to be a contribution by an intermediary or conduit
- 19 to the candidate if any of the following situations occurs:
- 20 (1) The intermediary or conduit has been retained by the
- 21 candidate's committee for the purpose of fundraising and is
- 22 reimbursed for expenses incurred in soliciting contributions.
- 23 (2) In the case of an individual, the candidate has
- 24 expressly authorized the intermediary or conduit to engage in
- 25 fundraising, or the individual occupies a position within the
- 26 candidate's campaign organization and is authorized by the
- 27 organization to engage in fundraising.
- 28 (3) In the case of a political committee, the intermediary
- 29 or conduit is the authorized committee of the candidate.
- 30 (1) The following shall apply to out-of-State contributions:

- 1 (1) No candidate, candidate committee, party committee,
- 2 political action committee or political committee may accept a
- 3 <u>campaign contribution from an out-of-State political action</u>
- 4 <u>committee if the political action committee's home state has</u>
- 5 less restrictive disclosure laws than this Commonwealth, except
- 6 <u>as provided under paragraph (2).</u>
- 7 (2) A candidate, candidate committee, party committee,
- 8 political action committee or political committee may accept a
- 9 <u>campaign contribution from an out-of-State political action</u>
- 10 committee if that political action committee is registered in
- 11 this Commonwealth with the Department of State and, by such
- 12 registration, has affirmed that the contributor will comply with
- 13 the contribution, expenditure and reporting requirements of this
- 14 act, as well as the regulations relating to contributions,
- 15 <u>expenditures and reporting promulgated under this act by the</u>
- 16 <u>Department of State and the State Ethics Commission.</u>
- 17 (3) The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall list and certify
- 18 those states that have less restrictive disclosure laws than
- 19 this Commonwealth. The list shall be compiled and updated
- 20 annually and published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin not later
- 21 than January 1, 2014, and each January 1 thereafter. The list
- 22 shall be made available on the Department of State Internet
- 23 website and provided in hard copy in campaign committee packets
- 24 prepared by the department.
- 25 (m) The provisions of this section are applicable to any
- 26 contribution made for the purpose of influencing an election to
- 27 <u>any public office in this Commonwealth except Federal offices.</u>
- 28 (n) For purposes of this section, any contribution made to a
- 29 candidate in a year other than the calendar year in which the
- 30 election is held with respect to which such contribution is made

- 1 is considered to be made during the calendar year in which the
- 2 election is held.
- 3 (o) For purposes of this section, contribution limits shall
- 4 apply to each election separately, whether a primary, special,
- 5 municipal or general election, unless an annual limit or other
- 6 limit is specified.
- 7 (p) No person who has a fiduciary contract for services with
- 8 the General Assembly may engage in campaign finance activity for
- 9 candidates of the General Assembly, including, but not limited
- 10 to, making of contributions, fund raising activities or
- 11 <u>involvement in political action committees or candidate</u>
- 12 political committees.
- 13 (q) Nothing in this section shall prohibit a municipality,
- 14 <u>including a city of the first class, from instituting lower</u>
- 15 <u>limitations on contributions to candidates for elected offices</u>
- 16 <u>under the municipality's jurisdiction.</u>
- 17 (r) A violation of the contribution limits set forth in this
- 18 section shall subject the violator to a fine equal to three

- 6 (b) Report.--No later than April 1 of each year, the
- 7 Department of the Auditor General shall submit to the Governor a
- 8 report on the review required by subsection (a) for the
- 9 preceding year.
- 10 Section 1606-A. Board approval for all corporate political
- 11 <u>expenditures.</u>
- 12 (a) Approval required. -- Notwithstanding any other provision
- 13 of law, no corporation and no trade, business or professional
- 14 <u>association shall make any campaign contribution or expenditure</u>
- 15 <u>unless specifically authorized to do so:</u>
- 16 (1) by the vote of the board of directors of the
- 17 corporation or of the executive committee of the trade,
- 18 business or professional association at a regular or special
- 19 meeting thereof;
- 20 (2) by the president, vice president, secretary or
- 21 treasurer of a corporation whom the board has specifically
- 22 empowered to authorize such contributions or expenditures; or
- 23 (3) for a corporation, by any other person designated by
- resolution of the board of directors of a corporation to
- 25 <u>authorize contributions or expenditures.</u>
- 26 (b) Form of contribution. -- No corporation, trade, business
- 27 <u>or professional association shall make any contribution or</u>
- 28 expenditure as defined under Federal or State law, other than an
- 29 <u>in-kind contribution or expenditure</u>, except by check.
- 30 Section 1607-A. Applicability to foreign corporations.

- 1 (a) General rule. -- A foreign corporation, other than a
- 2 <u>foreign association or foreign nonprofit corporation, but</u>
- 3 including a foreign parent corporation even though it does not
- 4 <u>itself transact intrastate business, is subject to the</u>
- 5 requirements of sections 1602-A, 1603-A, 1604-A and 1605-A, if:
- 6 (1) the average of property, payroll and sales factors,
- 7 as defined in section 401 of the act of March 4, 1971 (P.L.6,
- No.2), known as the Tax Reform Code of 1971, with respect to
- 9 the foreign corporation, is more than 50% during its latest
- 10 full income year; and
- 11 (2) more than one-half of its outstanding voting
- 12 <u>securities are held of record by persons having addresses in</u>
- this Commonwealth appearing on the books of the corporation
- on the record date for the latest meeting of shareholders
- 15 <u>held during its latest full income year or, if no meeting was</u>
- 16 <u>held during that year, on the last day of the latest full</u>
- income year.
- 18 (b) Determination.--The determination of the property,
- 19 payroll and sales factors under subsection (a) with respect to
- 20 any parent corporation shall be made on a consolidated basis,
- 21 including in a unitary computation, after elimination of
- 22 intercompany transactions, the property, payroll and sales of
- 23 the parent and all of its subsidiaries in which it owns directly
- 24 or indirectly more than 50% of the outstanding shares entitled
- 25 to vote for the election of directors, but deducting a
- 26 percentage of the property, payroll and sales of any subsidiary
- 27 equal to the percentage minority ownership, if any, in the
- 28 subsidiary. For the purpose of this section, any securities held
- 29 to the knowledge of the issuer in the names of broker-dealers,
- 30 nominees for broker-dealers, including clearing corporations or

- 1 banks, associations or other entities holding securities in a
- 2 <u>nominee name or otherwise on behalf of a beneficial owner,</u>
- 3 <u>collectively "nominee holders," shall not be considered</u>
- 4 <u>outstanding</u>. However, if the foreign corporation requests all
- 5 <u>nominee holders to certify, with respect to all beneficial</u>
- 6 owners for whom securities are held, the number of shares held
- 7 for those beneficial owners having addresses as shown on the
- 8 records of the nominee holder in this Commonwealth and outside
- 9 of this Commonwealth, then all shares so certified shall be
- 10 considered outstanding and held of record by persons having
- 11 addresses either in this Commonwealth or outside of this
- 12 Commonwealth as so certified, provided that the certification so
- 13 provided shall be retained with the record of shareholders and
- 14 made available for inspection and copying. A current list of
- 15 <u>beneficial owners of a foreign corporation's securities provided</u>
- 16 to the corporation by one or more nominee holders or agent
- 17 thereof under the requirements of 17 CFR § 240.14b-1(b)(3)
- 18 (relating to obligation of registered brokers and dealers in
- 19 connection with the prompt forwarding of certain communications
- 20 to beneficial owners) or 240.14b-2(b)(3) (relating to obligation
- 21 of banks, associations and other entities that exercise
- 22 fiduciary powers in connection with the prompt forwarding of
- 23 certain communications to beneficial owners) promulgated under
- 24 the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 (Public Law 48-881, 15
- 25 U.S.C. § 78a et seg.) shall constitute an acceptable
- 26 certification with respect to beneficial owners for the purposes
- 27 of this subsection.
- 28 (c) Applicability. -- This section does not apply to any
- 29 <u>corporation:</u>
- 30 (1) With outstanding securities listed on the New York

- 1 <u>Stock Exchange or the American Stock Exchange.</u>
- 2 (2) With outstanding securities designated as qualified
- 3 for trading on the Nasdag National Market of the Nasdag Stock
- 4 <u>Market</u>, or any successor thereto.
- 5 (3) If all of its voting shares, other than directors'
- 6 qualifying shares, are owned directly or indirectly by a
- 7 <u>corporation or corporations not subject to this section.</u>
- 8 (d) Liability. -- Any party who obtains a final determination
- 9 by a court of competent jurisdiction that the corporation failed
- 10 to provide to the party information required to be provided by
- 11 this article or provided the party information of the kind
- 12 required to be provided by this article that is incorrect, then
- 13 the court, in its discretion, shall have the power to include in
- 14 <u>its judgment recovery by the party from the corporation of all</u>
- 15 court costs and reasonable attorney fees incurred in that legal
- 16 proceeding to the extent they relate to obtaining that final
- 17 determination.
- 18 Section 9. The dollar figures contained in section 1627.1 of
- 19 the act shall be adjusted biennially at a rate determined by the
- 20 Federal Election Commission as authorized under 11 CFR § 110.
- 21 The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall certify the calculation
- 22 of the rate as determined by the Federal Election Commission and
- 23 shall publish the new dollar figures in the Pennsylvania
- 24 Bulletin.
- 25 Section 10. The provisions of this act are severable. If any
- 26 provision of this act or its application to any person or
- 27 circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect
- 28 other provisions or applications of this act which can be given
- 29 effect without the invalid provision or application.
- 30 Section 11. A comprehensive, fully searchable and user

- 1 friendly computerized database to track full implementation of
- 2 this act shall be made available to the public by the Department
- 3 of State through its Internet website on or before December 31,
- 4 2014.
- 5 Section 12. This act shall take effect January 1, 2015.
