AN ACT

- 1 Amending the act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31, No.21), entitled "An
- 2 act to consolidate, editorially revise, and codify the public
- 3 welfare laws of the Commonwealth," limiting the case load for
- 4 each case worker.
- 5 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 6 hereby enacts as follows:
- 7 Section 1. Section 417, act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31,
- 8 No.21), known as the "Public Welfare Code," is amended to read:
- 9 Section 417. Personnel.--Each county board shall:
- 10 (1) In accordance with the Civil Service Act, appoint,
- 11 transfer, lay off, suspend and remove its employes who shall, on
- 12 behalf of the county board and under the supervision of the
- 13 Executive Director, provide assistance in the territory under
- 14 the jurisdiction of the county board in accordance with law.
- 15 (2) Determine the number of its employes and direct and
- 16 supervise their services so as to attain the maximum degree of
- 17 efficiency: Provided, however, That there shall be enough
- 18 employes that the number of cases assigned to an employe shall
- 19 <u>not exceed one hundred.</u>

- 1 (3) From time to time, appoint such board of review as it
- 2 sees fit and proper, to hear and determine appeals by employes
- 3 from orders of demotion and of removal.
- 4 (4) Use all their employes for eligibility and other county
- 5 <u>functions</u>; no employes funded through the county administration
- 6 budget shall be attached to regional or State offices.
- 7 Section 2. The excess case load of an employee shall be
- 8 reduced by at least one-half within 60 days after the effective
- 9 date of this act and all of the excess case load of an employee
- 10 shall be eliminated six months after the effective date of this
- 11 act.
- 12 Section 3. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
