AN ACT

- Amending Title 18 (Crimes and Offenses) of the Pennsylvania
- 2 Consolidated Statutes, providing for an offense resulting
- from an attack by a wild animal. 3
- 4 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 5 hereby enacts as follows:
- 6 Section 1. Title 18, act of November 25, 1970 (P.L.707,
- 7 No.230), known as the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, is
- amended by adding a section to read: 8
- § 2710. Attack by wild animals.
- (a) Offense defined. -- A person owning, possessing or 10
- harboring a wild animal who fails to exercise due care in 11
- 12 safequarding the public from attack by it or who recklessly
- 13 engages in conduct which places or may place another person in
- danger of attack by the wild animal is quilty of a misdemeanor 14
- 15 of the second degree.
- 16 (b) Previous attacks. -- In the prosecution of an alleged
- offense under this section, it shall not be necessary to prove 17
- 18 previous attacks upon a human being by the wild animal or

- 1 knowledge of the vicious propensities of it on the part of the
- 2 <u>owner, possessor or harborer thereof. The fact that it has not</u>
- 3 previously attacked a human being or lack of knowledge of the
- 4 <u>vicious propensities of such wild animal on the part of the</u>
- 5 <u>owner, possessor or harborer thereof shall not be a defense to a</u>
- 6 prosecution hereunder.
- 7 (c) Definitions. -- As used in this section the following word
- 8 shall have the meaning given to it in this subsection:
- 9 <u>"Wild animal." Includes bears, coyotes, lions, tigers,</u>
- 10 <u>leopards</u>, <u>jaguars</u>, <u>cheetahs</u>, <u>cougars</u>, <u>wolves</u> and <u>any crossbreed</u>
- 11 of such animals which have similar characteristics to those
- 12 <u>animals</u>.
- 13 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
