In the House of Representatives, January 26, 1982

- 1 WHEREAS, Specialty steels are an essential industrial
- 2 material and, therefore, the domestic industry is a strategic
- 3 resource necessary to national defense; and
- 4 WHEREAS, The United States can, and must, maintain an
- 5 adequate level of self-sufficiency and production capability in
- 6 specialty steels, including a skilled and adequate labor force;
- 7 and
- 8 WHEREAS, The economic base of the specialty steel industry
- 9 has been seriously eroded in recent years by the damaging flow
- 10 of imports of specialty steels and products containing these
- 11 materials; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Under pressure of excessive imports, unemployment
- 13 has climbed as high as forty percent in the specialty steel
- 14 industry during recent years; and
- 15 WHEREAS, American privately-owned specialty steel producers
- 16 compete in the marketplace with foreign companies which are

- 1 government-owned, subsidized, or directed and do not have to
- 2 meet the disciplines of our free-market system; and
- 3 WHEREAS, The specialty steel industry has always favored
- 4 development of open, fair, and mutually beneficial world trade--
- 5 it is not protectionist; and
- 6 WHEREAS, The problem of assuring that foreign companies
- 7 compete fairly and legally confronts the specialty steel
- 8 industry, many other industries, and our entire economy. As the
- 9 major open-world market, our Nation faces industrial
- 10 stagnation--reduced job opportunities--and a declining standard
- 11 of living, unless new understandings and rules relating to trade
- 12 can be developed with foreign governments; and
- 13 WHEREAS, The specialty steel industry is experiencing massive
- 14 layoffs due to the unfair dumping of foreign specialty steel;
- 15 and
- 16 WHEREAS, Unfair competition and the dumping of foreign steels
- 17 in United States markets is causing substantial and lasting
- 18 hardship for Pennsylvania citizens employed in the specialty
- 19 steel industry; therefore be it
- 20 RESOLVED (the Senate concurring), That the General Assembly
- 21 of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania memorialize the President of
- 22 the United States, the Congress, and the International Trade
- 23 Commission to take prompt and aggressive action to control
- 24 unfair foreign competition and the dumping of specialty steels
- 25 in the United States markets; and be it further
- 26 RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to the
- 27 President of the United States, the presiding officers of both
- 28 Houses of Congress, each member of Congress from the
- 29 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the International Trade
- 30 Commission, ALONG WITH ITS UNITED STATES TRADE REPRESENTATIVE,
