In the House of Representatives, February 2, 1982 1 WHEREAS, Basic steel is an essential industrial material and, 2 therefore, the domestic industry is a strategic resource 3 necessary to national defense; and 4 WHEREAS, The United States can, and must, maintain an 5 adequate level of self-sufficiency and production capability in 6 basic steel, including a skilled and adequate labor force; and WHEREAS, The economic base of the basic steel industry has 7 8 been seriously eroded in recent years by the damaging flow of 9 imports of steel and products containing these materials; and 10 WHEREAS, Under pressure of excessive imports, unemployment 11 has climbed as high as forty percent in the steel industry during recent years; and 12 13 WHEREAS, American privately-owned steel producers compete in

14 the marketplace with foreign companies which are government-

owned, subsidized, or directed and do not have to meet the
disciplines of our free-market system; and

3 WHEREAS, The steel industry has always favored development of 4 open, fair, and mutually beneficial world trade; it is not 5 protectionist; and

6 WHEREAS, The problem of assuring that foreign companies 7 compete fairly and legally confronts the steel industry, many 8 other industries, and our entire economy. As the major open-9 world market, our Nation faces industrial stagnation, reduced 10 job opportunities, and a declining standard of living, unless 11 new understandings and rules relating to trade can be developed 12 with foreign governments; and

WHEREAS, The steel industry is experiencing massive layoffs due to the unfair dumping of foreign steel; therefore be it RESOLVED, (the Senate concurring), That the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania memorialize the President of the United States and the Congress to impose steel import limitations under the provisions of the Trade Act of 1974.
