AN ACT

- Amending the act of May 17, 1921 (P.L.682, No.284), entitled "An 2 act relating to insurance; amending, revising, and 3 consolidating the law providing for the incorporation of insurance companies, and the regulation, supervision, and protection of home and foreign insurance companies, Lloyds associations, reciprocal and inter-insurance exchanges, and 7 fire insurance rating bureaus, and the regulation and 8 supervision of insurance carried by such companies, associations, and exchanges, including insurance carried by 9 10 the State Workmen's Insurance Fund; providing penalties; and 11 repealing existing laws, prohibiting the raising of 12 automobile insurance rates because of an accident where the 13 insured is not at fault.

- 15 hereby enacts as follows:
- 16 Section 1. The act of May 17, 1921 (P.L.682, No.284), known
- 17 as The Insurance Company Law of 1921, is amended by adding a

- 19 Section 357. Automobile Insurance Premiums Raised Because of
- 20 Accident. -- An insurer may not raise premiums in a policy of

- automobile insurance on account of the insured being involved in 1
- 2 <u>an accident unless there is a judgment against the insured in an</u>
- 3 <u>action arising out of the accident which (judgment) is satisfied</u>
- 4 by the insurer or unless the insurer pays the settlement of a
- claim arising out of the accident. 5
- Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days. 6
