## AN ACT

- 1 Providing for improvements and development at State parks and
- 2 historic properties and facilities; providing for limited
- 3 private sector development at selected State parks in
- 4 accordance with a strategic development plan; and providing
- 5 for grants-in-aid to certain nonprofit organizations and
- 6 institutions for capital improvements to non-State-owned
- 7 historic properties and facilities.
- 8 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 9 hereby enacts as follows:
- 10 Section 1. Short title.
- 11 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Project 110
- 12 Recreation and Historic Facilities Improvement Act.
- 13 Section 2. Legislative intent.
- 14 The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:
- 15 (1) Pennsylvania's 114 State parks and 61 historic
- 16 properties and facilities, as well as more than 900 non-

- State-owned historic properties and facilities, are
- 2 significant assets of this Commonwealth and are an important
- 3 part of tourism and recreation in Pennsylvania.
- 4 (2) Tourism is now regarded as this Commonwealth's
- 5 second leading economic contributor and may become an even
- 6 more significant economic factor in the future.
- 7 (3) Pennsylvania's State park system and its historic
- 8 properties and facilities are in need of capital improvements
- 9 and maintenance.
- 10 (4) Our neighboring states are expanding their state
- 11 parks and related facilities in an effort to attract tourism
- 12 from other states.
- 13 (5) In order to facilitate the improvement of our State
- 14 park system and the historic properties and facilities
- 15 located within this Commonwealth, it is necessary to make
- substantial expenditures for capital improvements for State
- 17 parks and for State-owned and non-State-owned historic
- 18 properties and facilities.
- 19 Section 3. Definitions.
- The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
- 21 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
- 22 context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 23 "Commission." The Pennsylvania Historical and Museum
- 24 Commission.
- 25 "Department." The Department of Environmental Resources of
- 26 the Commonwealth.
- 27 Section 4. Capital improvements to State parks.
- 28 (a) Funding of projects.--The department shall prepare
- 29 annually a priority schedule of State park capital improvement
- 30 projects which shall be submitted to the Governor and to the

- 1 General Assembly. The total cost of all projects included in the
- 2 department's priority schedule shall approximate at least
- 3 \$18,000,000 annually for a period of five years from the
- 4 effective date of this act.
- 5 (b) Project approval. -- Only those projects previously
- 6 authorized in a capital budget act approved by the General
- 7 Assembly shall be included in the department's priority
- 8 schedule.
- 9 Section 5. Strategic State park development plan.
- 10 (a) Plan preparation. -- Within six months following the
- 11 effective date of this act, the department shall complete a
- 12 State park development plan which shall include:
- 13 (1) Identification of selected State parks that are
- candidates for the development of recreation facilities by
- the private sector and the type of development considered
- appropriate at each selected park site. Facilities that may
- 17 be developed by the private sector could include, but are not
- limited to, hotels, lodges, restaurants, conference centers,
- 19 marinas, golf courses, tennis courts and swimming pools.
- 20 There shall be a minimum of three but no more than five State
- 21 parks identified as candidates for private sector development
- that includes hotels and conference centers.
- 23 (2) A detailed assessment of personnel needs required to
- 24 adequately operate and maintain the State park system.
- 25 (b) Plan review. -- The department shall submit the completed
- 26 State park development plan to the Environmental Quality Board
- 27 which shall have 90 days to review and make recommendations
- 28 pertaining to subsection (a)(1).
- 29 Section 6. Development of recreation facilities by the private
- 30 sector.

- 1 (a) Departmental requirement. -- Within one year from the
- 2 effective date of this act, the department shall issue a request
- 3 for proposals for the development of recreation facilities at
- 4 selected State parks by the private sector consistent with the
- 5 strategic State park development plan provisions of section
- 6 5(a)(1).
- 7 (b) Selection of projects.--The department shall establish
- 8 the criteria for the selection of projects to be constructed and
- 9 operated by private entities in State parks.
- 10 (c) Terms of projects. -- The site on which any privately
- 11 owned project is constructed shall be owned by the Commonwealth
- 12 and leased to the operator for a term not exceeding 99 years.
- 13 The department shall have the right of first refusal in the
- 14 event that the project is to be sold or transferred by the
- 15 private operator or the right to disapprove any sale or
- 16 transfer.
- 17 Section 7. Capital improvements to State-owned historic sites
- 18 and facilities.
- 19 (a) Funding of projects.--The commission shall prepare
- 20 annually a priority schedule of improvement projects at State-
- 21 owned historic sites and facilities which shall be submitted to
- 22 the Governor and to the General Assembly. The total cost of all
- 23 projects included in the commission's priority schedule shall
- 24 approximate at least \$2,000,000 annually for a period of five
- 25 years from the effective date of this act.
- 26 (b) Project approval. -- Only those projects previously
- 27 authorized in a capital budget act approved by the General
- 28 Assembly shall be included in the commission's priority
- 29 schedule.
- 30 Section 8. Grants to non-State-owned historic properties and

- 1 facilities.
- 2 (a) General provisions. -- From moneys appropriated annually
- 3 by the General Assembly, the commission shall make grants-in-aid
- 4 to eligible nonprofit organizations and institutions for capital
- 5 improvements to non-State-owned historic properties and
- 6 facilities.
- 7 (b) Amount for grants and administrative costs of the
- 8 commission. -- The amount of grants and the administrative costs
- 9 for operating the grant program shall not exceed the following:
- 10 (1) First year \$1,000,000.
- 11 (2) Second year \$1,500,000.
- 12 (3) Third year \$2,000,000.
- 13 (4) Fourth year \$2,500,000.
- 14 (5) Fifth year \$3,000,000.
- 15 (c) Eligibility. -- The following nonprofit organizations
- 16 shall be eligible to apply to the commission for grants-in-aid
- 17 for capital improvements:
- 18 (1) Historical societies.
- 19 (2) Colleges and universities.
- 20 (3) Museums.
- 21 (4) Other historical organizations, including, but not
- 22 limited to, libraries.
- 23 (d) Application and criteria for awarding grants.--The
- 24 commission shall establish the methods and procedures for making
- 25 an application for a grant and the criteria to carry out the
- 26 purpose of this section on which it will base its approval.
- 27 Section 9. Repeals.
- 28 (a) Specific.--Section 1906-A(4) of the act of April 9, 1929
- 29 (P.L.177, No.175), known as The Administrative Code of 1929, is
- 30 repealed only to the extent it is inconsistent with the

- 1 provisions of section 6(c) and only for those projects which
- 2 qualify under section 6(c).
- (b) General.--All acts and parts of acts are repealed 3
- 4 insofar as they are inconsistent with this act.
- 5 Section 10. Effective date.
- This act shall take effect in 60 days. 6
