AN ACT

1 2	Prohibiting assessment of local governments for public utility work in connection with State road work.
3	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
4	hereby enacts as follows:
5	Section 1. Short title.
6	This act shall be known and may be cited as the Local Public
7	Utility Assessment for State Roads Act.
8	Section 2. Definitions.
9	The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
10	have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
11	context clearly indicates otherwise:
12	"Commission." The Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission.
13	"Department." The Department of Transportation of the
14	Commonwealth.
15	"Local government unit." Any city, borough, incorporated
16	town, township or municipality authority.
17	"Material contribution in connection with a project." A

contribution of 5% or more of the total cost of the project.
 "Project." The construction, reconstruction, widening or
 relocation of a State road.

Public utility work." The change, adjustment or relocation
of a water line, gas line or sanitary sewer owned and operated
as a public utility by a local government unit.

7 "State road." A State highway, State bridge or State tunnel.
8 The term includes any part of the highway, bridge or tunnel.
9 Section 3. Assessments prohibited.

10 If a local government unit has, within the immediately 11 preceding five years, made to the department a material 12 contribution in connection with a project, the commission's 13 assessment for public utility work under section 412.1 of the 14 act of June 1, 1945 (P.L.1242, No.428), known as the State 15 Highway Law, shall not apply.

16 Section 4. Effective date.

17 This act shall take effect in 60 days.
