## AN ACT

11	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania	
12	finds and declares as follows:	
13	Conserving our State's natural and wildlife resources is one

14 of the most important responsibilities we have to this and

15 future generations of this Commonwealth.

16 Hunters and anglers were among the first to realize this

responsibility nearly 100 years ago when they saw firsthand how
 expanding civilization and unregulated exploitation has caused
 disastrous declines in wildlife population throughout this
 Commonwealth.

5 Hunters and anglers took steps to reverse this trend of 6 exploitation, helping found the conservation movement, 7 supporting laws to stop the uncontrolled exploitation of 8 wildlife and helping establish game and fish laws and 9 enforcement and management practices.

Hunters and anglers also suggested and supported laws to establish special hunting and fishing license fees and special taxes on their equipment to pay for conservation programs. Junior hunter and angler youth conservation programs supported and financed by this Commonwealth's hunters and anglers have benefited hundreds of wildlife species by teaching our children the ethics of the great outdoors.

As individuals and through their organizations, hunters and anglers volunteer countless hours of their time and money for local youth conservation programs.

The Commonwealth recognizes the importance of junior conservation programs and the need for additional funding to ensure that these programs continue to educate our youth on the importance of our wildlife resources.

27	(d) Youth Hunter and Angler Education Fund
28	(1) Fifteen dollars of each fee received under section
29	1359 (relating to youth hunter and angler education plate)
30	shall be credited to the Youth Hunter and Angler Education
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1 <u>Fund.</u>

2	(2) There is established a special account in the
3	Treasury Department which shall be known as the Youth Hunter
4	and Angler Education Fund. The purpose of the Youth Hunter
5	and Angler Education Fund is to assist this Commonwealth's
6	nonprofit sportsmen's clubs, Commonwealth natural resource
7	agencies and other organizations in conducting youth field
8	days, conservation schools and other related hunter or
9	trapper or angler youth education programs which are approved
10	by the Youth Hunter and Angler Education Board.
11	(3) All moneys in the Hunter and Angler Youth Education
12	Fund are annually appropriated, subject to the approval of
13	the Governor, to the Department of Conservation and Natural
14	Resources and shall be expended for the purposes authorized
15	under this subsection.
16	(4) The State Treasurer shall not honor any requisition
17	for expenditures by the Department of Conservation and
18	Natural Resources in excess of estimates approved by the
19	Governor or in excess of the amount available for the
20	purposes for which the requisition was made, whichever is the
21	lesser amount.
22	(5) (i) A 15-member Youth Hunter and Angler Education
23	Board will approve all Education programs and projects.

4	GOVERNOR OR IN EXCESS OF THE AMOUNT AVAILABLE FOR THE
5	PURPOSES FOR WHICH THE REQUISITION WAS MADE, WHICHEVER IS THE
6	LESSER AMOUNT.
7	Section 3. This act shall take effect as follows:
