## A RESOLUTION

- 1 Memorializing the Congress of the United States to increase the
- Veterans' Administration Medical Care Budget for fiscal year
- 3 2000 to \$20.3 billion.
- 4 WHEREAS, The Veterans' Administration hospitals were
- 5 established to provide quality health care to those who served
- 6 in defense of this nation; and
- 7 WHEREAS, We appreciate the service of American veterans in
- 8 defending our freedoms and protecting our security; and
- 9 WHEREAS, \$20.3 billion is needed for Veterans' Administration
- 10 health care in the 2000 Federal fiscal year; and
- 11 WHEREAS, The Congress of the United States has recently
- 12 approved a final budget resolution for fiscal year 2000 that
- 13 calls for a grossly inadequate increase for Veterans'
- 14 Administration health care funding; and
- 15 WHEREAS, The Veterans' Administration budget has been frozen
- 16 for three years at about \$17 billion; and
- 17 WHEREAS, The Veterans' Administration budget has not
- 18 accounted for inflation; and

- 1 WHEREAS, The Veterans' Administration budget is inadequate to
- 2 fund new and costly initiatives such as hepatitis C treatment;
- 3 and
- 4 WHEREAS, The Veterans' Administration budget is inadequate to
- 5 address increased health care issues created by the possibility
- 6 of chemical, biological and other unconventional warfare; and
- 7 WHEREAS, Unless an appropriation of at least \$20.3 billion is
- 8 authorized for fiscal year 2000, quality care for veterans
- 9 cannot be maintained; and
- 10 WHEREAS, The time is right to provide adequate funding for
- 11 veterans' health care; therefore be it
- 12 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the
- 13 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania memorialize the Congress of the
- 14 United States to increase the Veterans' Administration medical
- 15 care budget for fiscal year 2000 to \$20.3 billion.
