### INTRODUCED BY THOMPSON AND BRIGHTBILL, APRIL 19, 2002

AS AMENDED ON THIRD CONSIDERATION, HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, MAY 8, 2002

#### AN ACT

9	Fund, the Hazardous Material Response Fund, The State Stores
10	Fund, the Milk Marketing Fund, the Home Investment Trust
11	Fund, the Emergency Medical Services Operating Fund, the
12	Tuition Payment Fund, the Banking Department Fund, the
13	Firearm Records Check Fund and the Ben Franklin Technology
14	Development Authority Fund to the Executive Department; to
15	provide appropriations from the Judicial Computer System
16	Augmentation Account to the Judicial Department for the
17	<del>fiscal year July 1, 2002, to June 30, 2003; to provide</del>
18	appropriations from the Motor License Fund for the fiscal
19	year July 1, 2002, to June 30, 2003, for the proper operation

Section 104. State appropriations. (a) General Fund. The 5 following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may 6 7 be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the 8 General Fund to the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive, Legislative and Judicial Departments of the 9 10 Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other 11 compensation and travel expenses of the duly elected or appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the 12 13 payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the 14 purchase or rental of goods and services, printing, public 15 advertising by or through any medium, equipment, land and 16 buildings and for payment of any other expenses, as provided by 17 law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the 18 duties, functions and activities and for the purposes 19 hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 20 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid 21 at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002. 22 (b) State Lottery Fund. The following sums set forth in 23 this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby 24 specifically appropriated from the State Lottery Fund to the 25 several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department 26 of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other 27 compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers 28 and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of 29 30 goods and services and for payment of any other expenses, as

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provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct 1 of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes 2 hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 3 4 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid 5 at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002. (c) Energy Conservation and Assistance Fund. The following 6 sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be 7 necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Energy 8 Conservation and Assistance Fund to the several hereinafter 9 10 named agencies of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth 11 for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment 12 13 of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, 14 necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and 15 activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2002, and for the payment of bills 16 incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year 17 18 ending June 30, 2002.

19 (d) Judicial Computer System Augmentation Account. The 20 following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may 21 be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the 22 restricted receipt account established within the General Fund, 23 known as the Judicial Computer System Augmentation Account, to 24 the Judicial Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of 25 salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses, for 26 the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the 27 purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary 28 29 for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities 30 and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year 20020S0005B2003 - 18 -

beginning July 1, 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred
 and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June
 30, 2002.

4 (e) Emergency Medical Services Operating Fund. The 5 following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the 6 Emergency Medical Services Operating Fund to the several 7 hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the 8 Commonwealth for the payment of fees for contractual services 9 10 rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and 11 for the payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, 12 13 functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set 14 forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2002, and for the 15 payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of 16 the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002. 17 (f) The State Stores Fund. The following sums set forth in 18 this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby 19 specifically appropriated from The State Stores Fund to the 20 hereinafter named agency of the Executive Department of the 21 Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other 22 compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers 23 and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of 24 25 goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as 26 provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct 27 of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes 28 hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 29 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid 30 at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002.

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1 (g) Motor License Fund. The following sums, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby appropriated from the 2 3 Motor License Fund to the hereinafter named agencies of the 4 Executive Department for the payment of salaries, wages and 5 other compensation and travel expenses of the duly elected or appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for 6 7 contractual services and other expenses necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities for the purposes 8 hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 9 10 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid 11 at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002. 12 (h) Aviation Restricted Revenue Account. The following 13 sums, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby 14 appropriated from the Aviation Restricted Revenue Account in the Motor License Fund to the hereinafter named agencies of the 15 16 Executive Department for the purposes set forth herein for the 17 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2002, and for the payment of bills 18 incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year 19 ending June 30, 2002. 20 (i) Hazardous Material Response Fund. The following sums 21 set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary,

22 are hereby specifically appropriated from the Hazardous Material

23 Response Fund to the several hereinafter named agencies of the

24 Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of fees

25 for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of

26 goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as

27 provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct

28 of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes

29 hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1,

30 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid 20020S0005B2003 - 20 - 1 at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002.

(j) Milk Marketing Fund. The following sums set forth in 2 3 this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby 4 specifically appropriated from the Milk Marketing Fund to the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department 5 of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other 6 compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers 7 8 and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for 9 contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of 10 goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as 11 provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct 12 of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes 13 hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 14 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid 15 at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002. 16 (k) Home Investment Trust Fund. The following sums set 17 forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are 18 hereby specifically appropriated from the Home Investment Trust 19 Fund to the hereinafter named agencies of the Executive 20 Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, 21 wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly 22 appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the 23 payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the 24 purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment of 25 any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary 26 for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year 27 28 beginning July 1, 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred 29 and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002.30

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1 (1) Tuition Payment Fund. The following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby 2 3 specifically appropriated from the Tuition Payment Fund to the 4 hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the 5 Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers 6 7 and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for 8 contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as 9 10 provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct 11 of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 12 13 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid 14 at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002. 15 (m) Banking Department Fund. The following sums set forth 16 in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby 17 specifically appropriated from the Banking Department Fund to 18 the hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of 19 the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other 20 compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers 21 and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for 22 contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of 23 goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as 24 provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct 25 of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes 26 hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 27 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid 28 at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002. 29 (n) Firearm Records Check Fund. The following sums set 30 forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are

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hereby specifically appropriated from the Firearm Records Check 1 Fund to the hereinafter named agencies of the Executive 2 Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, 3 4 wages or other compensation and travel expenses of the duly 5 appointed officers and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the 6 7 purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary 8 for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities 9 10 and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year 11 beginning July 1, 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 12 13 30, 2002.

(o) Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority Fund. The 14 15 following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may 16 be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Ben 17 Franklin Technology Development Authority Fund to the 18 hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the 19 Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other 20 compensation and travel expenses of the duly appointed officers 21 and employees of the Commonwealth, for the payment of fees for 22 contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of 23 goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as 24 provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct 25 of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes 26 hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 27 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid 28 at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002. 29 Section 105. Federal augmentation appropriations. The 30 following Federal augmentation appropriations set forth in this

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1	act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby
2	specifically appropriated from the Federal augmentation funds to
3	the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive
4	Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of the expenses
5	of implementing and carrying out the programs stated herein for
б	the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2002, and for the payment of
7	bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal
8	year ending June 30, 2002. Unless otherwise stated, the
9	appropriations include any carryovers from the prior fiscal
10	<del>year.</del>
11	Section 106. Block grants. (a) Appropriation. The
12	following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may
13	be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the
14	block grant (BG) funds to the several hereinafter named agencies
15	of the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the
16	purposes, and under the restrictions, for which the funds are
17	provided for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2002.
18	(b) Small Communities Development Block Grant. The Small
19	Communities Development Block Grant (SCDBG) is to assist small
20	cities and communities that have a high concentration of
21	impoverished citizens and substandard housing to expand their
22	low income and moderate income housing opportunities and to meet
23	community development needs.
24	(c) Community Services Block Grant. The Community Services
25	Block Grant (CSBG) is to provide a range of services and
26	activities having a measurable and potentially major impact on
27	the causes of poverty in the community or those areas of the
28	community where poverty is a particularly acute problem. In
29	addition, new focus may be placed on the unemployed, both old
30	and new. Local agencies may lower their eligibility requirements
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for recipients to three months to allow greater flexibility to
 assure proper consideration of each recipient.

3 (d) Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant. The
4 Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant (PHHSBG) is
5 for the provision of preventive health and other health services
6 related to emergency medical systems, health initiative grants,
7 comprehensive public health, hypertension, fluoridation, health
8 education, risk reduction, home health, rape crisis and domestic
9 violence services.

10 (e) Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant. The 11 Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant (MCHSBG) is to enable states to maintain and strengthen their leadership in 12 13 planning, promoting, coordinating and evaluating health care for 14 pregnant women, mothers, infants and children, and children with 15 special health care needs, and in providing health services for 16 mothers and children who do not have access to adequate health 17 <del>care.</del>

18 (f) Low Income Home Energy Assistance Block Grant. The Low-19 Income Home Energy Assistance Block Grant (LIHEABG) is to help lessen the impact of the high cost of energy on low income 20 21 families and individuals, including energy efficiency grants for 22 low income dwellings. No less than 15% of the LIHEABG funds 23 received shall be used for weatherization. LIHEABG funds 24 received pursuant to a Presidential release of contingency funds 25 shall be exempt from the 15% requirement. Unexpended 26 weatherization funds which would result in LIHEABG funds being 27 returned to the Federal Department of Health and Human Services may be spent for assistance grants at the discretion of the 28 29 Secretary of the Budget. The Secretary of the Budget shall 30 notify the chairman and the minority chairman of the

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Appropriations Committee of the Senate and the chairman and the 1 minority chairman of the Appropriations Committee of the House 2 3 of Representatives of the intent to reallocate any such funds 4 ten days prior to any reallocation. 5 (q) Social Services Block Grant. The Social Services Block Grant (SSBG) is for the provision of social services to eligible 6 7 persons. 8 (h) Mental Health Services Block Grant. The Mental Health 9 Services Block Grant (MHSBG) provides funds for the provision of 10 services to adults with serious mental illness or children with 11 serious emotional disturbance. 12 (i) Substance Abuse Block Grant. The Substance Abuse Block 13 Grant (SABG) provides funds to establish and maintain programs 14 to combat alcohol and drug abuse. 15 (j) Child Care and Development Fund Block Grant. The Child 16 Care and Development Fund Block Grant (CCDFBG) is for the provision of direct child care or to increase the quality and 17 18 availability of child care for low income families. 19 (k) Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Block Grant. 20 The Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Block Grant (TANFBG) 21 provides funds for the provision of cash grants, child care, 22 training and support services, child welfare and administration for eligible families and individuals. 23 24 PART TT 25 GENERAL FUND AND FEDERAL APPROPRIATIONS 26 FOR 2002 2003 27 SUBPART A 28 EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT Section 201. Contracts prerequisite to encumbering or 16 committing funds.--(a) Funds available to agencies, boards, 17 departments, commissions, or other governmental entities under 18 this act for the procurement of supplies, services or 19 construction shall not be available for payment of, or to be 20 committed to or encumbered for payment of, any such procurement 21 unless and until the agency, board, department or other 22 governmental entity has complied with all of the requirements 23 applicable to the procurement that are set out in 62 Pa.C.S. 24 (relating to procurement) and in the policies, procedures and 25 regulations instituted in accordance with that code.

(b) Funds available to agencies, boards, departments, commissions or other governmental entities under this act for the procurement of real property for more than \$100,000 shall not be available for payment of, or to be committed to or encumbered for payment of, any such procurement unless and until 20020S0005B2003 - 448 -

the agency, board, department or other governmental entity has 1 published a description of the project and proposed criteria for 2 3 the selection of real property in the Pennsylvania Bulletin at 4 least 30 days before any real property contract is signed or a 5 specific property is selected. Purchases of real property through the eminent domain power of the Commonwealth or its 6 agencies, boards, departments, commissions or other governmental 7 8 agencies or during a declared major disaster or emergency in 9 this Commonwealth are exempt from the publication requirement. 10 Section 1904. Minority business set-asides.--(a) Each 11 department or other instrumentality of the Commonwealth listed in Subpart A of Part II authorized to contract for buildings, 12 13 highways, commodities, equipment, supplies or services shall 14 report to the General Assembly all information pertinent to 15 anticipated procurement needs at the beginning of each fiscal 16 year and each fiscal quarter thereafter.

(b) As used in this section, the term "minority business" means a minority business enterprise as defined in the act of July 22, 1974 (P.L.598, No.206), known as the Pennsylvania Minority Business Development Authority Act.

21 Section 1905. Appropriation of funds from miscellaneous 22 sources.--(a) In addition to the amounts appropriated by this act, moneys received in payment for food and household supplies 23 24 furnished to employees and other persons, except inmates, by an 25 institution, and moneys received from the proceeds from the sale 26 of any products of the soil, meats, livestock, timber or other 27 materials sold by the department shall be paid into the General 28 Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund to the several respective institutions for the operation and 29 maintenance of the institutions. 30

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1 (b) In addition to the amounts appropriated by this act, all 2 moneys received from any other source, except the Federal 3 Government, as contributions for the programs provided herein or 4 as payment for services or materials furnished by one 5 institution to another, except those collections designated as revenues, shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby 6 7 appropriated out of the General Fund for the purposes of the respective appropriations. 8

Section 1907. Appellate courts appropriation contingency.--The funds appropriated in Part II to the Supreme, Superior and Commonwealth Courts for justice and judge expenses are contingent upon a vouchered expense account plan being continued by the Supreme Court.

29 Section 1908. Transfer of excess funds.--(a) The Governor 30 may transfer any excess money in those funds receiving proceeds 20020S0005B2003 - 450 -

of Commonwealth of Pennsylvania general obligation bonds in 1 excess of the amount necessary for the purposes for which the 2 3 bonds were issued to the appropriate sinking fund for payment of 4 debt service due on outstanding bonds. If such excess funds, 5 together with any available balance, exceed the amount of debt service remaining to be paid, the funds shall be transferred to 6 7 the General Fund or to the appropriate special fund responsible 8 for such debt service.

In addition to the authority above, the Governor may 9 (b) 10 transfer any excess funds from any State General Fund 11 appropriation in Part II Subpart A to the Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority during the month of June 12 13 2003. Such funds shall be used for grants for sewer and water 14 infrastructure projects. Transfer of funds by the Supreme Court. -- (a)

20 The Supreme Court may transfer any excess funds appropriated in 21 sections 281, 285, 286, 287 and 291 to the Judicial Department 22 in Part II to the Judicial Computer Augmentation Account during 23 the month of June 2003. No transfer may create or increase a 24 deficiency in the appropriation from which the transfer is made. 25 Whenever the Supreme Court makes a transfer under this 26 subsection, the Supreme Court shall give written notification to 27 the Secretary of the Budget and chairman and minority chairman 28 of the Senate Committee on Appropriations and the chairman and 29 the minority chairman of the House of Representatives Committee 30 on Appropriations ten days prior to any transfer which shall 20020S0005B2003 - 451 -

also include certification that such transfer will not result in
 a deficit in any appropriation.

3 (b) The Supreme Court may transfer funds appropriated in 4 section 281 between the line items in that section provided that 5 no transfer may create or increase a deficiency in the appropriation from which the transfer is made. Tobacco settlement funds.--(a) Lapse restriction.--The Governor shall not direct and the Secretary of the Budget shall not lapse any funds under section 306 of the act of June 26, 2001 (P.L.755, No.77), known as the Tobacco Settlement Act, to any fund other than specifically set forth under section 306.

24 Transfer restriction. -- The State Treasurer shall not (b) 25 transfer any funds from the Health Account to the General Fund 26 until the Governor presents a detailed spending proposal and the 27 General Assembly enacts legislation directing the transfer of 28 Health Account funds to the General Fund for expenditure. 29 Section 1912. Pharmaceutical Assistance and Rebate Fund. --30 (a) There is created within the Treasury Department a special 20020S0005B2003 - 452 -

fund to be known as the Pharmaceutical Assistance and Rebate
 Fund.

3 (b) The fund is created for the purpose of receiving and 4 disbursing moneys in accordance with subsections (c) and (d) and 5 only after the Department of Public Welfare has been granted a waiver pursuant to section 1115 of the Social Security Act (49 6 Stat. 620, 42 U.S.C. § 301 et seq.) and/or of any other 7 applicable requirements of Title XIX of the Social Security Act 8 in order to claim Federal financial participation in a pharmacy 9 assistance program. 29 (d) The fund shall receive and consist of the following: 30 (1) The net State share of all moneys received from drug 20020S0005B2003 - 453 - rebate agreements with pharmaceutical manufacturers pursuant

4 Department of Public Welfare as a result of expenditures made

Prison privatization prohibited.--Commonwealth 13 funds appropriated to the Department of Corrections shall not be used to privatize and/or outsource prison operations. 20 Section 2001. Effective date.--This act shall take effect 21 July 1, 2002, or immediately, whichever is later.

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
