AN ACT

Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," further providing for Office for Safe Schools; and encouraging the establishment of pupil harassment, bullying and intimidation policies.

8 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

9 hereby enacts as follows:

10 Section 1. Section 1302-A(c) of the act of March 10, 1949

11 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949,

12 amended June 26, 1999 (P.L.394, No.36), is amended to read:

13 Section 1302-A. Office for Safe Schools.--* * *

14 (c) In addition to the powers and duties set forth under

15 subsection (a), the office is authorized to make targeted grants

16 to schools to fund programs which address school violence,

1 including, but not limited to, the following programs:

2 (1) Conflict resolution or dispute management.

3 (2) Peer helpers programs.

4 (3) Risk assessment, safety-related or violence prevention5 curricula.

6 (4) Classroom management.

7 (5) Student codes of conduct.

8 (6) Training to undertake a districtwide assessment of risk 9 factors that increase the likelihood of problem behaviors among 10 students.

11 (7) Development and implementation of research-based 12 violence prevention programs that address risk factors to reduce 13 incidents of problem behaviors among students, including 14 <u>harassment</u>, bullying and intimidation.

15 (8) Comprehensive, districtwide school safety and violence 16 prevention plans.

17 (9) Security planning, purchase of security-related 18 technology which may include metal detectors, protective 19 lighting, surveillance equipment, special emergency 20 communications equipment, electronic locksets, deadbolts and 21 theft control devices and training in the use of security-22 related technology. Security planning and purchase of securityrelated technology shall be based on safety needs identified by 23 the school entity's board of directors. 24

(10) Institution of student, staff and visitoridentification systems.

27 (11) Establishment or enhancement of school security28 personnel, including school resource officers.

(14) Counseling services for students enrolled in 6 7 alternative education programs. * * * 8 Section 2. The act is amended by adding a section to read: 9 Section 1303.1-A. Prevention of Harassment, Bullying and 10 11 Intimidation.--(a) School entities are hereby encouraged to adopt or amend if necessary policies prohibiting the harassment, 12 bullying or intimidation of any student and to share such 13 policies with the parents, guardians, students, volunteers, 14 15 vendors and school employes of the school entity. 16 (b) The policies may contain the following, but shall not be 17 limited to: 18 (1) A definition of conduct that constitutes harassment, 19 bullying and intimidation. 20 (2) A statement prohibiting harassment, bullying and 21 intimidation while on school property, at school-sponsored 22 activities and while traveling to or from school or school-23 sponsored activities. 24 (3) A statement of consequences for engaging in harassment, 25 bullying or intimidation. 26 (c) Within one hundred eighty (180) days of the effective 27 date of this section, the Department of Education shall 28 establish a clearinghouse of materials related to harassment, bullying and intimidation, including training materials, a 29 30 system for reviewing and evaluating harassment, bullying and 20050H0178B0183 - 3 -

1	intimidation policies and materials submitted by school entities
2	for World Wide Web site distribution, and a computer database to
3	make the information on harassment, bullying and intimidation
4	available for review by school entities. At a minimum, policies
5	and training materials shall be provided to school entities
6	either through the Office for Safe Schools or through the
7	Department of Education's World Wide Web site.
8	(d) School entities may submit materials related to
9	harassment, bullying and intimidation to the Department of
10	Education for clearinghouse incorporation and distribution. At
11	its discretion, the Department of Education may include such
12	materials in the computer database required under subsection
13	<u>(c).</u>
14	(e) A school entity may provide opportunities for school
15	employes to participate in programs or other activities designed
16	to develop the knowledge and skills to prevent and respond to
17	acts covered by their policy.
18	(f) As used in this section, the term "school entity" means
19	<u>a school district, intermediate unit, area vocational-technical</u>
20	school or charter school operating within this Commonwealth
21	under the provisions of this act.

22 Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
