AN ACT

1 2 3 4 5 6	Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," providing for access to Advanced Placement for all students.
7	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
8	hereby enacts as follows:
9	Section 1. The act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known
10	as the Public School Code of 1949, is amended by adding an
11	article to read:
12	<u>ARTICLE XVII-C</u>
13	ACCESS TO ADVANCED PLACEMENT COURSES
14	FOR ALL STUDENTS ACT
15	Section 1701-C. Short title.
16	This act shall be known and may be cited as the Access to
17	Advanced Placement Courses for All Students Act.
18	Section 1702-C. Definitions.

1	The following words and phrases when used in this article
2	shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
3	context clearly indicates otherwise:
4	"Advanced Placement course." A high school-level preparatory
5	course for a college Advanced Placement test that:
6	(1) incorporates all topics specified by the College
7	Board on its standards syllabus for a given subject area; and
8	(2) is authorized by the College Board.
9	"Department." The Department of Education of the
10	Commonwealth.
11	"Eligible teacher." A professional employee that is
12	certified in the subject area of the Advanced Placement course
13	that the teacher will be teaching.
14	"Four core academic areas." Advanced Placement courses in
15	English, mathematics, science and social science.
16	"Poverty level." The percentage of students in a school
17	district eligible for free or reduced price lunch.
18	"Program." The Advanced Placement Teacher Training Program.
19	"School entity." Any public school district, intermediate
20	unit, area vocational-technical school, charter school or cyber
21	<u>charter school.</u>
22	"Teacher training entities." Institutions of higher
23	education, intermediate units or organizations endorsed by the
24	College Board to train teachers to teach Advanced Placement
25	<u>courses.</u>
26	"Virtual learning instruction." Providing academic courses
27	to students via the Internet and the use of technology in
28	providing instruction to students.
29	Section 1703-C. Advanced Placement Teacher Training Program.
30	(a) PurposeThe purpose of the Advanced Placement Teacher
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1	Training Program is to provide access to Advanced Placement
2	courses in the four core academic areas for all students by
3	training teachers in Advanced Placement course instruction at
4	all high schools that do not presently provide Advanced
5	Placement courses in one or more of these disciplines.
6	(b) EstablishmentBeginning in the 2011-2012 school year,
7	the Advanced Placement Teacher Training Program shall be
8	established in the department to train teachers in eligible
9	entities to teach Advanced Placement courses in the four core
10	<u>academic areas.</u>
11	(c) Eligible school entitiesEligible school entities are
12	those that do not have in each of their high schools at least
13	one Advanced Placement course in the four core academic areas or
14	will no longer have an Advanced Placement course in one of the
15	four core academic areas due to the retirement of a teacher who
16	teaches an Advanced Placement course.
17	(1) A school entity that has an Advanced Placement
18	course in one or more of the four core academic areas but not
19	in all four core academic areas is only eligible to have a
20	teacher trained in those core academic areas in which the
21	school entity does not have an Advanced Placement course.
22	(2) No more than one teacher per core academic area in
23	each high school of an eligible school entity shall be
24	trained under this program.
25	(3) More than one eligible school entity may apply
26	jointly to the program to train a teacher in Advanced
27	Placement course instruction if that teacher is to provide
28	such instruction in more than one school entity either
29	through classroom instruction or through virtual learning
30	instruction.

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1	(d) Application requirements for eligible school entities
2	The application by an eligible school entity seeking funding for
3	the program shall include the following:
4	(1) The subject areas that currently have Advanced
5	Placement courses in each of the school entity's high
6	<u>schools.</u>
7	(2) The subject areas among the four core academic areas
8	that the school entity does not have an Advanced Placement
9	course in each of the school entity's high schools.
10	(3) The names of the eligible teachers including the
11	high schools where they are teaching and the Advanced
12	Placement academic subject area that each of the teachers
13	will be providing instruction, and whether the instruction
14	will be in a classroom or through virtual learning
15	instruction.
16	(4) The names of the eligible teacher training entities
17	that shall be providing the training for teachers in Advanced
18	<u>Placement instruction.</u>
19	(5) Agreement to provide the Advanced Placement course
20	for high school students for at least three years.
21	(6) Guidelines the school entity will use in determining
22	which students may be eligible to enroll in an Advanced
23	Placement course. In developing its guidelines, a school
24	entity shall eliminate barriers that restrict access to
25	Advanced Placement courses for student populations that have
26	been traditionally underserved and shall make every effort to
27	ensure that Advanced Placement classes reflect the diversity
28	of the student population. The school entity shall not
29	discriminate on any basis in enrollment of the students that
30	<u>is illegal under Federal or State law.</u>

1	(7) Agreement to annually report to the department for
2	each of the four core academic areas that were taught by
3	teachers whose training was funded by this program shall
4	include the following information:
5	(i) the number of students taking Advanced Placement
6	<u>courses;</u>
7	(ii) the grade levels where Advanced Placement is
8	<pre>being taught;</pre>
9	(iii) the number of students who took Advanced
10	Placement examinations; and
11	(iv) the number of students scoring a three or
12	higher on Advanced Placement examinations.
13	Section 1704-C. Powers and duties of department.
14	(a) GuidelinesThe department shall promulgate rules,
15	regulations and procedures necessary for the implementation of
16	this article, including, but not limited to, the following:
17	(1) In consultation with the College Board, certify
18	those teacher training entities that are endorsed by the
19	College Board to provide training of teachers to teach
20	Advanced Placement courses in the four core academic areas.
21	(2) In certifying teacher training entities for this
22	program, the department shall ensure that the training times
23	and locations will be geographically accessible for teachers
24	from eligible school entities to attend.
25	(3) The department, in consultation with the College
26	Board, shall ensure that training provided by teacher
27	training entities must provide teachers of Advanced Placement
28	courses with the necessary content knowledge and
29	instructional skills to prepare students for success in
30	Advanced Placement courses and examinations.

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1	(4) Starting at the end of the first year of the program
2	and every year thereafter the department shall issue a report
3	to the General Assembly on the program that shall include,
4	but not be limited to:
5	(i) The number of teachers receiving training in
6	Advanced Placement instruction in school entities, school
7	districts and high schools in each of the four core
8	academic areas.
9	(ii) The number and percentage of high schools that
10	offer Advanced Placement in the four core academic areas.
11	(iii) The number and percentage of students taking
12	Advanced Placement courses at school entities in each of
13	the four core academic areas.
14	(iv) The number and percentage of students scoring a
15	three or more on an Advanced Placement examination at
16	school entities in each of the four core academic areas.
17	(v) The remaining unmet need for trained teachers in
18	school entities that do not offer Advanced Placement
19	<u>courses.</u>
20	(vi) The number of teachers trained outside the four
21	core academic areas teaching other Advanced Placement
22	<u>courses.</u>
23	(b) (Reserved).
24	Section 1705-C. Funding to teacher training entities.
25	To the extent funds are appropriated for this program, the
26	department shall provide \$1,200 per eligible teacher to the
27	certified teacher training entities that provide training to
28	teachers to teach Advanced Placement courses upon completion of
29	the training program.
30	Section 1706-C. Program funding.

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1	(a) FundingFunding for this program shall be made from
2	annual appropriations made by the General Assembly to the
3	department for that purpose.
4	(b) Funding prioritiesIn the event that insufficient
5	moneys are appropriated in any fiscal year to provide funding
6	for all eligible school entities applying to the program, the
7	department shall prioritize funding of eligible school entities
8	based on the poverty level of the school districts in which high
9	school students who will be taking the Advanced Placement
10	<u>courses reside.</u>
11	Section 1707-C. Availability of Advanced Placement courses.
12	(a) EligibilityAny school entity offering Advanced
13	Placement courses to students shall notify parents of their
14	availability and the guidelines the school entity uses in
15	determining which students may be eligible to enroll in an
16	Advanced Placement course.
17	(b) Publication and guidelinesAny school entity offering
18	Advanced Placement courses to students shall publish on the
19	school entity's Internet website the names of the Advanced
20	Placement courses being offered to students and the guidelines
21	the school entity uses in determining which students may be
22	eligible to enroll in an Advanced Placement course.
23	Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

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
