AN ACT

Amending Title 75 (Vehicles) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in general provisions, adding definitions for "attendance officer" and "habitually truant"; and, in licensing of drivers, further providing for persons ineligible for licensing, license issuance to minors, junior driver's license, learners' permits, for notice of change of name or address, for suspension of operating privilege and for driving while operating privilege is suspended or revoked.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. Section 102 of Title 75 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes is amended by adding definitions to read: § 102. Definitions.

Subject to additional definitions contained in subsequent provisions of this title which are applicable to specific provisions of this title, the following words and phrases when used in this title shall have, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, the meanings given to them in this section: * * *
"Attendance officer." An attendance officer appointed under
sections 1341 and 1342 of the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30,
No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949.
"Habitually truant." As defined under section $1333(\mathrm{~b})(5)$ of
the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L. 30 , No.14), known as the Public
School Code of 1949.
Section 2. Section $1503(b)$ is amended and subsection (a) is
amended by adding a paragraph to read:
§ 1503. Persons ineligible for licensing; license issuance to
minors; junior driver's license.
(a) Persons ineligible for licensing.--The department shall
not issue a driver's license to, or renew the driver's license
of, any person:
(10) Who is deemed to be habitually truant by an
attendance officer.
(b) License issuance to minors.--The department shall issue
a driver's license to a person 17 years of age who:
(1) has successfully completed a driver's training
course approved by the department; [and]
(1.1) has received certification from an attendance
officer of the school in which the person is a student that
the person is not habitually truant. If at any time the
person becomes habitually truant, the attendance officer
shall notify the department in writing that the person is
habitually truant. The department shall immediately suspend
the driver's license or learner's permit for the length of
time provided under this title; and
(2) for a period of 12 months after passing the
examination under section $1505(e)$ (relating to learners'
permits) and receiving a junior driver's license:
(i) has not been involved in an accident reportable under section $3746(a)$ (relating to immediate notice of accident to police department) for which they are partially or fully responsible in the opinion of the department; or
(ii) has not been convicted of any violation of this title.

Section 3. Section $1505(e)$ of Title 75 is amended to read: § 1505. Learners' permits.

(e) Authorization to test for driver's license and junior driver's license.--A person with a learner's permit is authorized to take the examination for a regular or junior driver's license for the class of vehicle for which a permit is held. Before a person under the age of 18 years may take the examination for a junior driver's license, including a Class M license to operate a motorcycle, the minor must:
(1) Have held a learner's permit for that class of vehicle for a period of six months.
(1.1) Present to the department a certification from an attendance officer of the school in which the person is a student that the person is not habitually truant. If at any time the person becomes habitually truant, the attendance officer shall notify the department in writing that the person is habitually truant. The department shall immediately suspend the driver's license or learner's permit for the length of time provided under this title.
(2) Present to the department a certification form signed by the father, mother, guardian, person in loco parentis or spouse of a married minor stating that the minor applicant has:
(i) completed 65 hours of practical driving experience accompanied as required under subsection (b); and
(ii) except for a Class M license to operate a motorcycle, the 65 hours included no less than ten hours of nighttime driving and five hours of inclement weather driving.
(3) Have the certification form completed when the minor is ready for the licensing examination. The certification form shall be developed by the department and will be provided by the department when the original application for a learner's permit is processed. The department will make this form readily available through the mail or electronic means.
(4) For a Class M license to operate a motorcycle, present evidence of successful completion of the departmentapproved motorcycle safety course.

Section 4. Sections 1515, 1532 and 1543 of Title 75 are amended by adding subsections to read: § 1515. Notice of change of name or address. * * *
(a.1) Drivers of compulsory school age.--Any driver of compulsory school age who moves from the address named in the application or on the driver's license shall, within 30 days of moving, notify the department of the old and new addresses and
the old and new school districts and submit an updated
certification signed by the attendance officer of the old and
new school districts stating that the driver is not habitually
truant.

§ 1532. Suspension of operating privilege.
(e) Persons who are habitually truant. --The department shall
suspend the operating privilege of any person upon receiving
notification from an attendance officer of the school which the
person attends that the person is habitually truant from school.
The department shall immediately suspend the driver's license or
learner's permit until the person attains 21 vears of age, is
able to provide a certification from the attendance officer that
the person is no longer habitually truant, graduates from high
school, legally withdraws from school, earns a general
educational development diploma or joins the military.
§ 1543. Driving while operating privilege is suspended or
revoked.
* * *
(e) Reinstatement relating to habitually truant drivers.--
(1) Any driver's license that is suspended or revoked
under this chapter as a result of habitual truancy shall be
reinstated upon:
(i) The driver attaining 21 vears of age, graduating
from high school, legally withdrawing from school,
earning a general educational development diploma or
joining the military.
(ii) Payment of an administrative fee of $\$ 100$ to the
department.
(2) Where a driver's license is suspended or revoked under this chapter as a result of habitual truancy and an additional suspension or revocation has been imposed on the driver under subsection (c), the department shall reinstate the license, regardless of any additional period of suspension or revocation imposed under section 1544, upon: (i) The driver graduating from high school, earning a general educational development diploma or joining the military.
(ii) Payment of an administrative fee of $\$ 100$ to the department.

Section 5. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
