## A RESOLUTION

Directing the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee to conduct a comprehensive study and make a report on the impact of the 10% reduction in funding for county-managed community 3 mental health services implemented during fiscal year 2013 on the availability of mental health treatment and services; and establishing an advisory committee. 6 7 WHEREAS, One in five persons in the United States needs treatment for mental illness during his or her lifetime; and 9 WHEREAS, Fifty percent of mental health cases in our nation 10 begin by 14 years of age; and 11 WHEREAS, Seventy-five percent of these cases begin by 24 12 years of age; and 13 WHEREAS, Delayed treatment of mental disorders increases severity of symptoms and difficulty of treatment; and 14 15 WHEREAS, Each year tens of thousands of families in this 16 Commonwealth struggle to access services and supports for family members with serious mental illness; and 17 18 WHEREAS, Since 1966, county-managed community mental health

- 2 rehabilitation and a range of other support and treatment
- 3 services in response to the closure of beds in the State mental
- 4 hospital system; and
- 5 WHEREAS, The cost of providing treatment and services in
- 6 community-based settings is significantly less than the cost of
- 7 treatment in State mental hospitals or private psychiatric
- 8 hospitals; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Without sufficient residential rehabilitation and
- 10 mental health treatment services in our communities, people with
- 11 serious mental illness all too often become homeless or become
- 12 inmates in county jails; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Funding for county-managed community mental health
- 14 services was frozen for several years prior to fiscal year 2012,
- 15 in spite of increasing demands for mental health treatment and
- 16 services; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Funding for county-managed community mental health
- 18 services was reduced by 10%, or more than \$60 million, for
- 19 fiscal year 2013; therefore be it
- 20 RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee
- 21 conduct a comprehensive study of the impact resulting from the
- 22 10% reduction in funding for county-managed community mental
- 23 health services implemented during fiscal year 2013 on the
- 24 availability of mental health treatment and services; and be it
- 25 further
- 26 RESOLVED, That, in furtherance of its study, the Legislative
- 27 Budget and Finance Committee determine, at a minimum, the
- 28 following:
- 29 (1) the amount allocated by each county for contracted
- 30 services in fiscal year 2012 and fiscal year 2013 for each of

1 the major community mental health services, including, but

2 not limited to, community residential rehabilitation,

3 inpatient psychiatric services, emergency and crisis

4 intervention, peer counseling, drop-in centers, outpatient

services, partial hospitalization, day treatment, community

employment, facility-based vocational rehabilitation,

7 psychiatric rehabilitation, long-term residential services,

social rehabilitation, intensive case management, community

treatment teams, family-based services and family support

services, and set forth a Statewide summary of this data;

- (2) the number of units of service provided by each contracted entity in each county in fiscal year 2012 and fiscal year 2013 for each of the above community mental health services and set forth a Statewide summary of this data;
- (3) the number of people receiving each of the above community mental health services in each county in fiscal year 2012 and fiscal year 2013 and set forth a Statewide summary of this data;
  - (4) the amount spent by each county mental health agency to administer the county mental health program in fiscal year 2012 and fiscal year 2013;
- (5) follow-up information on the living conditions and mental health status of individuals transferred out of community residential rehabilitation services as a result of the reduction in funding for county-managed community mental health services in each county and set forth a Statewide summary of this data;
- 29 (6) information on the use of short-term private 30 psychiatric facilities in fiscal year 2012 and fiscal year

- 2 (7) information on delays, if any, in access to intake
- 3 for new admissions to mental health treatment services and
- delays, if any, in access to psychiatric evaluations and
- 5 medications in each county's community mental health system;
- 6 and
- 7 (8) data on the number of inmates with mental illness
- 8 incarcerated in county jails in fiscal year 2012 and fiscal
- 9 year 2013;
- 10 and be it further
- 11 RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee
- 12 seek information regarding access in mental health treatment and
- 13 services, comparing fiscal years 2012 and 2013, from the
- 14 following entities in each county:
- 15 (1) county jail wardens;
- 16 (2) county probation officers;
- 17 (3) school superintendents;
- 18 (4) county homeless program managers;
- 19 (5) representatives of mental health consumer groups;
- 20 (6) representatives of mental health associations;
- 21 (7) local representatives of the National Alliance for
- 22 Mental Illness;
- 23 (8) local representatives of psychiatric associations;
- 24 (9) local representatives of pediatric associations; and
- 25 (10) representatives of primary care physicians;
- 26 and be it further
- 27 RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee
- 28 be authorized to establish an advisory committee of
- 29 stakeholders, including, but not limited to:
- 30 (1) county mental health administrators;

- 1 (2) providers of community-based mental health services;
- 2 (3) advocates for people with mental illness; and
- 3 (4) members of families that include people with mental
- 4 illness;
- 5 and be it further
- 6 RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee
- 7 submit a report of its findings to the House of Representatives
- 8 by May 1, 2015.
