## A RESOLUTION

1 2 3 4	Honoring and recognizing Pennsylvania's Native American peoples and communities and recognizing the first Saturday in October of every year, which this year is October 2, 2015, as "Indigenous Peoples Day" in Pennsylvania.
5	WHEREAS, The indigenous peoples of North America, the first
6	Americans, have woven rich and diverse threads into the tapestry
7	of the heritage and history of the United States and this
8	Commonwealth and, throughout their history in this great land,
9	have faced moments of triumph and tragedy alike; and
10	WHEREAS, Native Americans have inhabited the land which is
11	now known as Pennsylvania for 5,000 years; and
12	WHEREAS, Former Secretary of the Pennsylvania Historical and
13	Museum Commission, Dr. George P. Donehoo, acknowledged that, "No
14	state in the entire nation is richer in Indian names or in fact
15	Indian history than Pennsylvania"; and
16	WHEREAS, Some of the many great nations that inhabited the
17	territory known as Pennsylvania were and are the Lenape,
18	Cherokee, Susquehanna, Erie, Mohawk, Huron, Allegany, Shawnee,

Susquehannock, Oneida, Cayuga, Seneca, Chippewa and Ottawa
Indians, as well as many others who sustained themselves in the
natural environment of the Keystone State; and

WHEREAS, Precolonial Native American villages and ancient 4 burial mounds, which were plentiful and spread en masse across 5 the territory now known as Pennsylvania, were destroyed or lost 6 7 due to agricultural development and industrialization; and 8 WHEREAS, McKees Rocks Mound in McKeesport is one of those ancient burial mounds in this Commonwealth that stands as a 9 testament to the highly civilized societies of indigenous 10 American peoples and is reported as one of the oldest places of 11 12 human habitation in eastern North America; and

13 WHEREAS, Many of Pennsylvania's busiest highways, such as Route 1, Route 40, Route 30, Route 611 and Route 590 started as 14 15 Native American paths that were used for trade and hunting; and 16 WHEREAS, Native American culture and society have contributed to the agricultural development, medicinal discoveries, 17 18 environmental preservation, commerce, governmental institutions 19 and structure and many other facets of our country, State and 20 cities; and

21 WHEREAS, According to the 2010 census, many Native American 22 peoples live in our urban cities, including 4,000 residents in 23 Philadelphia and more than 81,092 residents in Pennsylvania; and 24 WHEREAS, Many of the Native Americans living in our counties, 25 cities, townships, boroughs and towns have gone through great 26 adversities to maintain their cultural and ethnic identities; 27 and

28 WHEREAS, From the 1800s through the 1900s, many southern and 29 northern Native Americans were mislabeled "colored," "Negro," 30 "mulatto" and "white," resulting from the dilution of their

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1 identities; and

2 WHEREAS, Many have persevered through trauma and tragedy to 3 preserve culture and traditions to become beacons of light for 4 future generations; and

5 WHEREAS, Native American culture and Native Americans are to 6 be respected and honored; and

7 WHEREAS, The Commonwealth acknowledges the importance of 8 educating the residents of this Commonwealth about the heritage, 9 history, art, archeology and traditions of the Native American 10 peoples and communities in Pennsylvania; and

11 WHEREAS, Native Americans continue to contribute to the 12 culture of this Commonwealth through the ancestral preservation 13 of their heritage; and

14 WHEREAS, Their dedicated efforts to honor their proud 15 heritage have been instrumental in developing a deeper 16 understanding within Pennsylvania of the vibrant and ancient 17 customs of the indigenous peoples living in this Commonwealth 18 today; and

WHEREAS, "Indigenous Peoples Day" properly notes the influences of indigenous culture throughout our history; and WHEREAS, "Indigenous Peoples Day" commemorates the contributions and resiliency of indigenous communities while also celebrating the preservation of their unique cultural heritage and ethnic identities; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the first Saturday in October of every year, which this year is October 2, 2015, as "Indigenous Peoples Day" in Pennsylvania; and be it further

29 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize and 30 honor the myriad of contributions of Native Americans, recognize

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1 the strong and living traditions of the first peoples to call 2 our land home and look forward to working with Native Americans 3 in an effort to further preserve their heritage within this 4 Commonwealth.
