7	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
8	hereby enacts as follows:
9	Section 1. The act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known
0	as the Public School Code of 1949, is amended by adding an

_5	Section 2001-L. Definitions.
- 6	The following words and phrases when used in this article
_7	shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
8 .	<pre>context clearly indicates otherwise:</pre>
9	"Academic year." A complete school year commencing on or

- 1 after August 1 of the calendar year.
- 2 "Cost of attendance." The direct and indirect costs relating
- 3 to attendance at an institution. The term includes tuition and
- 4 fees, room and board or living expenses, books, supplies,
- 5 transportation, loan fees, the documented cost of a personal
- 6 computer and other school-related miscellaneous expenses,
- 7 <u>allowance for child care or other dependent care, costs related</u>
- 8 to a disability, eliqible study-abroad programs, costs related
- 9 to student teaching and any other cost approved by the
- 10 <u>department</u>.
- 11 "Department." The Department of Education of the
- 12 <u>Commonwealth.</u>
- 13 <u>"Eligible student." An individual who meets the eligibility</u>
- 14 <u>criteria specified in section 2006-L.</u>
- 15 "Emergency grant." A grant to a student by the State system
- 16 to cover emergency funding needs of a student such as textbook
- 17 expenses, small outstanding balances on a scholarship
- 18 recipient's account with an institution or other emergency needs
- 19 <u>deemed acceptable by the institution.</u>
- 20 "FAFSA" or "application." The Free Application for Federal
- 21 <u>Student Aid.</u>
- 22 "Financial aid." Money paid by an entity on behalf of a
- 23 student enrolled in higher education to help pay for college or
- 24 career school. The term includes grants, work study, loans and
- 25 <u>scholarships.</u>
- 26 "Full-time enrollment." A course load of credited classes
- 27 that add up to 12 or more credits per academic semester.
- 28 "Funding award." A transfer of funds from the account to the
- 29 State system to fund scholarship awards and emergency grants.
- 30 "Institution." A State-owned college or university within

- 1 the State system established and listed in section 2002-A(a).
- 2 "Institutional aid." Financial aid offered to a student of
- 3 an institution directly by the institution. The term includes
- 4 merit aid, gift aid and athletic awards.
- 5 <u>"Private scholarship."</u> Financial aid awards funded by
- 6 <u>entities other than the Federal Government, the Commonwealth or</u>
- 7 <u>an institution, including awards by companies, service groups,</u>
- 8 <u>foundations</u>, <u>organizations</u> and <u>individuals</u>.
- 9 "Program." The Affordability of College Education
- 10 Scholarship (ACES) Program established under section 2002-L.
- 11 <u>"Program administration agreement." The written agreement</u>
- 12 between the department and the State system that governs the
- 13 <u>administration of the program.</u>
- 14 "Scholarship agreement." The written agreement between the
- 15 institution and a scholarship recipient when a scholarship award
- 16 is made.
- 17 <u>"Scholarship award."</u> An award of program funds made by the
- 18 State system to an eligible student toward the costs of
- 19 attendance.
- 20 "Scholarship recipient." An eligible student who is awarded
- 21 a scholarship or emergency grant.
- 22 "State system." The State System of Higher Education
- 23 established under Article XX-A.
- 24 Section 2002-L. Affordability of College Education Scholarship
- 25 Program.
- 26 (a) Establishment. -- The Affordability of College Education
- 27 Scholarship (ACES) Program is established within the department.
- 28 (b) Funding award. -- The department shall make a funding
- 29 <u>award to the State system. The State system shall use the</u>
- 30 funding award to make scholarship awards and emergency grants to

- 1 eligible students. The department shall allocate the funds
- 2 appropriated to the department for the program as follows:
- 3 (1) One-quarter of 1% for reimbursement for the
- 4 <u>administrative program costs incurred by the department</u>,
- 5 <u>including costs for data collection, audits and reviews under</u>
- 6 <u>section 2003-L(e).</u>
- 7 (2) Three-quarters of 1% for reimbursement for the
- 8 <u>administrative program costs incurred by the State system</u>,
- 9 <u>including costs incurred by the State system under section</u>
- 10 2004-L(d)(5).
- 11 (3) One percent for funding by the State system of
- 12 <u>emergency grants.</u>
- 13 (4) Nighty-eight percent for funding by the State system
- of scholarship awards.
- 15 <u>(c) Available funds.--The department shall make a funding</u>
- 16 award to the State system from funds appropriated to the
- 17 department for that purpose.
- 18 Section 2003-L. Duties of department.
- 19 (a) Program administration agreement. -- The department shall
- 20 enter into a program administration agreement with the State
- 21 system which shall include the following:
- 22 (1) The amount of the funding award being made by the
- department to the State system.
- 24 (2) The timing of the funding award.
- 25 <u>(3) The responsibilities of the State system as an</u>
- administrator of the program, as prescribed in section 2004-
- 27 <u>L, including data reporting requirements and performance</u>
- 28 benchmarks.
- 29 <u>(4) Posting of the application for the program on the</u>
- department's publicly accessible Internet website.

- 1 (5) Other terms and conditions as deemed necessary by
- 2 <u>the department through regulations.</u>
- 3 (b) Termination of program administration agreement. -- The
- 4 <u>department may terminate the program administration agreement</u>
- 5 with the State system if the department determines any of the
- 6 <u>following:</u>
- 7 (1) The State system breached a material term or
- 8 <u>condition of the program administration agreement, including</u>
- 9 <u>failure to meet performance benchmarks, accountability</u>
- 10 <u>standards or data reporting requirements.</u>
- 11 (2) The State system misused a funding award as
- determined by an audit by the department, the Auditor General
- or an auditor contracted by the State system or an
- 14 <u>institution</u>.
- 15 (3) The State system violated a condition specified by
- the department in regulations.
- 17 (c) Administration after termination.--If the department
- 18 terminates a program administration agreement with the State
- 19 system under subsection (b), the department may administer the
- 20 program or may contract with a third party to provide program
- 21 administration.
- 22 (d) Form of scholarship agreement. -- The department, in
- 23 coordination with the State system, shall develop the form of
- 24 scholarship agreements to be used by the State system when
- 25 awarding a scholarship.
- 26 (e) Audits, review and collection of data. -- The department
- 27 may conduct audits and reviews and collect data of the
- 28 scholarship awards and emergency grants made by the State system
- 29 <u>as the department determines to be necessary or appropriate.</u>
- 30 (f) Regulations. -- The department shall promulgate

- 1 regulations as necessary to implement, administer and enforce
- 2 this article.
- 3 (g) Temporary regulations. -- The following provisions shall
- 4 apply:
- 5 (1) In order to facilitate the prompt implementation of
- 6 this article, the department shall promulgate temporary
- 7 <u>regulations that shall expire no later than three years</u>
- 8 <u>following the effective date of this section. The temporary</u>
- 9 <u>regulations shall not be subject to:</u>
- 10 (i) Sections 201, 202, 203, 204 and 205 of the act
- of July 31, 1968 (P.L.769, No.240), referred to as the
- 12 <u>Commonwealth Documents Law.</u>
- (ii) Section 204(b) of the act of October 15, 1980
- 14 (P.L.950, No.164), known as the Commonwealth Attorneys
- 15 Act.
- (iii) The act of June 25, 1982 (P.L.633, No.181),
- 17 known as the Regulatory Review Act.
- 18 (2) The department shall transmit notice of the
- 19 temporary regulations to the Legislative Reference Bureau for
- 20 publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.
- 21 (h) Guidelines for awards. -- The department shall develop
- 22 written quidelines, in consultation with the State system, for
- 23 the implementation of this article. The guidelines may
- 24 prioritize scholarship awards for students pursuing certain
- 25 degree programs or career pathways identified using labor market
- 26 data.
- 27 <u>Section 2004-L. Duties of State system.</u>
- 28 (a) Administration. -- The State system shall administer the
- 29 program in accordance with the program administration agreement.
- 30 (b) Assign rights. -- At the request of the department, the

- 1 State system shall assign rights in the scholarship agreements
- 2 to the department.
- 3 (c) Accountability. -- The State system shall meet benchmarks
- 4 and accountability standards as prescribed by the department in
- 5 the regulations or program administration agreement.
- 6 (d) Powers and duties. -- The powers and duties of the State
- 7 system under the program shall include:
- 8 (1) Entering into a program administration agreement
- 9 <u>with the department.</u>
- 10 (2) Developing, in coordination with the department, the
- form of scholarship agreements to be used by the State system
- when awarding a scholarship.
- 13 (3) Awarding scholarships and executing scholarship
- 14 agreements with eligible students on a form prescribed by the
- department.
- 16 (4) Enforcing scholarship agreements.
- 17 (5) Preparing reports and compiling program data as
- 18 requested by the department in a form and manner as
- 19 prescribed by the department.
- 20 (6) Coordinating with the institutions and the
- 21 department on the administration of the program.
- 22 (7) Collaborating with the department and institutions
- on outreach to promote the program.
- 24 (8) Performing other responsibilities needed for the
- 25 <u>administration of the program as determined by the</u>
- department.
- 27 <u>Section 2005-L. Duties of institutions.</u>
- 28 (a) Coordinate administration. -- The institutions shall
- 29 <u>coordinate with the State system in the administration of the</u>
- 30 program.

- 1 (b) Duties. -- The institutions shall have the following 2 powers and duties: (1) Determining whether an individual qualifies as an 3 eligible student under section 2006-L. 4 (2) Determining the amount of the scholarship award or 5 emergency grant for which an eligible student qualifies. 6 (3) Preparing a financial need analysis for each 7 eligible student using the FAFSA or another institutional 8 9 form approved by the department. 10 (4) Counseling eligible students about the requirements 11 of the program. 12 (5) Making required refunds to the State system under 13 section 2007-L. 14 (6) Collaborating with the department and the State system on outreach to promote the program. 15 16 (7) Confirming standards of academic progress for scholarship recipients. 17 18 (8) Performing other program duties and responsibilities 19 as determined by the department or State system. 20 (c) Local branding. -- Institutions may adopt local branding 21 for the program to align and assist with their recruitment and retention strategies. Local branding shall be consistent with 22 23 the regulations and guidelines established by the department, 24 the eligibility qualifications under section 2006-L and the 25 duties of institutions under subsection (b), and must be 26 approved by the State system.
- 27 Section 2006-L. Qualifications of scholarship recipients.
- (a) Oualifications. -- To receive a scholarship award, a 28
- 29 scholarship recipient must meet the following qualifications:
- 30 (1) Graduate from high school or earn a general

- 1 educational development (GED) diploma or equivalent. 2 (2) Receive acceptance and matriculate at an 3 institution. (3) Once enrolled at an institution, work toward the 4 5 eligible student's first undergraduate baccalaureate degree. (4) Maintain full-time enrollment per semester. 6 7 (5) Complete the FAFSA. (6) Have a household income of no more than 400% of the 8 9 Federal poverty level for a family of four as specified in 10 poverty quidelines issued annually by the United States 11 Department of Health and Human Services. 12 (7) Have received a scholarship award under the program 13 for less than eight full-time semesters. 14 (8) Maintain standards of academic progress as 15 determined by the department. 16 (b) Renewal requirements. -- For a scholarship recipient to receive a renewal of a scholarship award, the scholarship 17 18 recipient shall: 19 (1) Complete the FAFSA, or an institution's equivalent, 20 annually. 21 (2) Have a household income of no more than 400% of the 22 Federal poverty level for a family of four as specified in 23 poverty quidelines issued annually by the United States 24 Department of Health and Human Services. (3) Maintain full-time enrollment per semester in an undergraduate degree program at an institution for a period
- 25 26 27 not exceeding more than eight full-time semesters.
- (4) Complete at least 24 credits per academic year. 28
- 29 (c) Scholarship agreement. -- An eligible student shall enter
- into a scholarship agreement with an institution for each year 30

- 1 the eligible student receives a scholarship award.
- 2 <u>Section 2007-L. Refunding by institution.</u>
- 3 An institution shall refund the State system when a
- 4 scholarship recipient disenrolls from the institution during the
- 5 <u>institution's full refund drop period no later than the</u>
- 6 beginning of the next academic year or one year after the year
- 7 <u>during which the eligible student was enrolled.</u>
- 8 <u>Section 2008-L. Need-based eligibility tiers.</u>
- 9 (a) Priority of awards. -- The State system and institutions
- 10 shall use the following need-based priority ranking when
- 11 <u>awarding scholarships to eligible students:</u>
- 12 (1) First priority shall be given to students who have
- 13 <u>household income of up to 200% of the Federal poverty level</u>
- for a family of four as specified in poverty guidelines
- issued annually by the United States Department of Health and
- 16 <u>Human Services</u>.
- 17 (2) Second priority shall be given to students who have
- 18 household income of up to 300% of the Federal poverty level
- for a family of four as specified in poverty guidelines
- issued annually by the United States Department of Health and
- 21 Human Services.
- 22 (3) Third priority shall be given to students who have
- 23 <u>household income of up to 400% of the Federal poverty level</u>
- for a family of four as specified in poverty guidelines
- 25 <u>issued annually by the United States Department of Health and</u>
- Human Services.
- 27 (b) Order of financial aid. -- An institution shall apply the
- 28 financial aid received by an eligible student in the following
- 29 <u>order:</u>
- 30 (1) Federal Pell Grant or any successor program.

- 1 (2) Pennsylvania State grants.
- 2 <u>(3) Institutional aid.</u>
- 3 <u>(4) Private scholarships.</u>
- 4 (5) Scholarship awards under the program.
- 5 (6) Federal work study.
- 6 <u>(7) Federal student loans.</u>
- 7 (c) Base amount of awards. -- The base amount of a scholarship
- 8 <u>award for each of the priority tiers in subsection (a) shall be</u>
- 9 <u>determined annually by the department.</u>
- 10 (d) Application of award. -- The scholarship award shall be
- 11 <u>first applied against the direct charges at the institution</u>
- 12 which include tuition, fees and room and board owed by a
- 13 scholarship recipient to the institution. Remaining scholarship
- 14 <u>award funds may be used by the scholarship recipient for other</u>
- 15 <u>costs of attendance.</u>
- 16 (e) Maximum award. -- A scholarship award may not exceed the
- 17 cost of attendance after all financial aid ahead of the
- 18 scholarship awards under the program in the order of financial
- 19 aid in subsection (b) has been applied to a scholarship
- 20 recipient's account.
- 21 (f) Emergency grants.--Emergency grants shall be awarded to
- 22 eligible students by the State system upon the recommendation of
- 23 an institution's designated financial aid officer. Priority for
- 24 emergency grants shall be available to scholarship recipients.
- 25 The State system may award an eligible student an emergency
- 26 grant if the eligible student:
- 27 (1) Appeals to the financial aid office of an
- institution for emergency funding for costs of attendance or
- other costs established by the department.
- 30 (2) Requests an amount that does not exceed the base

- 1 <u>amount for emergency grants set during the academic year.</u>
- 2 (g) Award term limitations. -- The term of a scholarship award
- 3 may not exceed six continuous academic years absent extenuating
- 4 <u>circumstances established by the department.</u>
- 5 <u>Section 2009-L. Miscellaneous provisions.</u>
- 6 (a) Penalty. -- An individual who knowingly or intentionally
- 7 procures, obtains or aids another to procure or obtain a
- 8 scholarship award or emergency grant under this article through
- 9 fraudulent means shall be disqualified from participation in the
- 10 program and shall be liable to the State system for an amount
- 11 equal to three times the amount awarded.
- 12 (b) Award money not taxable income. -- Scholarship awards and
- 13 emergency grants received by a scholarship recipient shall not
- 14 <u>be considered taxable income for purposes of Article III of the</u>
- 15 act of March 4, 1971 (P.L.6, No.2), known as the Tax Reform Code
- 16 of 1971.
- 17 (c) Subject to the Pennsylvania Code. -- The provisions of
- 18 this article shall be subject to 22 Pa. Code Ch. 121 (relating
- 19 to student financial aid).
- 20 Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2022, or
- 21 immediately, whichever is later.
