**SUMMARY:** Amends Title 75 (Vehicle Code) to eliminate the mandatory escort of super-sized loads by the PA State Police (PSP) and to permit the movement of certain materials during the course of manufacture. This legislation would take effect in 60 days.

**ANALYSIS:** This legislation amends several sections of the Vehicle Code, effectively creating a "certified escort vehicle" that is authorized by PennDOT to escort super loads in PA in lieu of the PSP. The legislation also permits the movement of certain materials during the course of manufacture.

**Mandatory Escort Elimination:** A "certified escort vehicle" is defined as a vehicle that is operated to escort a super load on a highway of this Commonwealth. The vehicle shall display PennDOT's certification emblem, may use flashing or revolving yellow lights, and shall comply with other PennDOT regulations, including those pertaining to pilot cars.

A "super load" is defined as a vehicle or combination or load having a gross weight exceeding 201,000 pounds, a total length exceeding 160 feet or a total width exceeding 16 feet. The term does not include a building, a vehicle or combination moved across the highway under Sections 4965 (relating to single permits for multiple highway crossings) or 4966 (relating to permit for movement of quarry equipment), or a dragline moved across a highway under permit.

The driver of the certified escort vehicle must be certified and licensed by PennDOT and wear attire that complies with 67 PA Code §101.3(5) (relating to minimum attire). PennDOT has up to 1 year from the effective date to establish criteria for certified escort vehicles and for determining certification and licensing of drivers of certified escort vehicles within PA, and shall post the criteria on the PennDOT website.

The legislation gives PennDOT, in consultation with the PSP, the ability to determine whether a PSP escort is necessary. If it is jointly determined by PennDOT and PSP that the movement must be escorted by PSP, the permittee shall bear the total costs of the escort.

**Annual Permits for the Movement of Certain Materials:** This legislation also adds “sugar” and “rock salt” to the list of authorized commodities eligible to receive an annual permit under Section 4968 of Title 75 (relating to permits for movement during course of manufacture). The language will allow a permittee to haul a gross weight of up to 95,000 lbs. of sugar at a distance of not more than 5 miles. The language also allows a permittee to haul a gross weight of up to 95,000 lbs. of rock salt within their respective jurisdictions. No such permits for sugar or rock salt shall be issued for movement on an interstate highway.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** This legislation would have no adverse fiscal impact on Commonwealth or local funds.
