DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE OF BILL

House Bill 1054 amends the Engineer, Land Surveyor, and Geologist Registration Law to allow retired professional engineers, land surveyors and geologists to obtain a retired-status license that does not require any continuing education.

In order to qualify for a retired-status license, a licensee must certify to the State Registration Board for Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors and Geologists that he no longer receives any payment for the practice of his profession. Upon such certification, the licensee shall be exempt from the continuing education required to renew licenses, and the Board shall issue the applicant a retired-status license.

The retired-status licensee must identify himself as being retired when using his professional title. If the retired licensee desires to return to active practice, he must complete up to two years of continuing education credits in order to obtain an active license.

The act takes effect in 60 days.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The provisions of the bill will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth.
