An Act amending Title 75 (Vehicles) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, relating to the reduction of certain speed limits.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Mr. WASS offered the following amendments No. A1240:

Amend Sec. 1, page 1, line 5, by striking out "Section 3363" and inserting

Sections 3363 and 3365(b)

Amend Sec. 1, page 1, line 6, by striking out "is" and inserting
are

Amend Sec. 1, page 2, by inserting between lines 13 and 14 § 3365. Special speed limitations.

(b) School zones.—When passing a school zone as defined and established under regulations of the department, no person shall drive a vehicle at a speed greater than 15 miles per hour. An official traffic-control device shall indicate the beginning and end of each school zone to traffic approaching in each direction, and, on a State highway having a designated speed of 55 miles per hour, at least 1,500 feet of highway immediately approaching the indicated school zone from either direction shall have a reduced speed limit of not more than 45 miles per hour. Establishment of a school zone, including its location and hours of operation, shall be approved by the department.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendments?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Indiana, Mr. Wass, on his amendment.

Mr. WASS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the amendment I present today to HB 453 will add another dimension to the safety of handling our school children on the roads.

Mr. Speaker, in the area of a school zone where the traffic is lowered to 15 miles per hour according to the law, it is impossible for moving vehicles that are traveling 55 miles an hour to reduce to that school zone limit of 15 miles. So my amendment to the legislation will stipulate that for 1,500 feet on either side of the school zone, the traffic zone will be 45 miles an hour; it will not exceed 45 miles an hour.

I would appreciate the support of the House.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, we have just had a conference—that is, Mr. Manderino, myself, Mr. Hutchinson, and Mr. Dininni—and we would ask that this bill be held over temporarily while we check some information out on it.

The SPEAKER. Mark the bill over temporarily.

The SPEAKER. The Chair is delighted to welcome to the hall of the House for his last time as a guest and as an ordinary taxpaying citizen—the next time you see him here he will be sworn in and will be part of this gang—Mr. James Roebuck. He will be sworn in on Monday following this session. Welcome, Mr. Roebuck.

Enjoy the applause, because from now on you probably will not hear much.

ANNOUNCEMENT BY SPEAKER

The SPEAKER. For those members who, along with the Speaker, have been concerned with the possible extinction of Cheyney University, the Chair is delighted to let you know that the interim president has called the Speaker's Office. Middle States has extended Cheyney's life for at least 30 months; 30 months.

But the Chair advises the House that a great deal of work must be done to keep Cheyney alive, and the Speaker will be asking a great deal of the House of Representatives in that direction in the very near future.

SB 36 PASSED OVER

The SPEAKER. SB 36, which we marked over temporarily, must be marked over for today. Mark it over for today, without objection. The Chair hears no objection.

ANNOUNCEMENT BY MAJORITY LEADER

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. MANDERINO. Mr. Speaker, for the information of the members of the House, there has been introduced into the House of Representatives a budget for the next fiscal year. Copies of the bill will be available for the Republican and the Democratic caucuses that will take place this afternoon. I urge the other side and I understand they will be caucusing this afternoon on the budget matter. Printouts will be available showing the various line items in the budget.

The bill is expected to be reported from the Appropriations Committee and placed on the calendar at a later time this afternoon. We will begin the amendment process Monday. We are urging all members with amendments, draft the same and have them submitted to the Democratic caucus chairman, Ivan Itkin, who will be placing them in packets as we have done in the past for your more facile use on the floor of the House.

We are scheduled for 3 days of session next week, and if we would work diligently on the amendment process, we may well be completed within those 3 days. If we are not completed with the amendment process in the first 3 days of next week, we will remain in session until the amendment process in the House has been completed and we have passed a budget to the Senate. So I am asking the caucuses and the individual members to cooperate in getting the amendments to the Democratic caucus chairman so they may be arranged. Be prompt for sessions next week; be prompt in getting your amendments to the gentleman, Mr. Itkin. I would urge that all amendments be given to Mr. Itkin or at least that he be informed if they are not returned from the Reference Bureau by at least midday Tuesday; midday Tuesday. If you do that, we have a very good chance of keeping to our 3-day schedule. Otherwise, we may be here and, likely, if you do not cooper-

ate, we will be here Thursday and Friday of next week and as long as it takes to pass a bill to the Senate.

Mr. Speaker, I would urge the caucus chairmen to announce their respective caucuses and the Appropriations Committee chairman to announce his committee meeting and that we be in recess but ask that the Chair be left open for the report of the Appropriations Committee.

REPUBLICAN CAUCUS

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the minority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, I would like to echo the words of Mr. Manderino. Next week is the beginning of the most important several weeks we will have this year. Having been a majority leader, having watched the process for many years, I urge you to cooperate with the majority leader in trying to get this matter brought to a head next week. We would ask, in addition to the amendments being given to Mr. Itkin, that copies of these amendments be given to Mr. Noye so that our side might also have copies of these amendments.

We will have a caucus as soon as we adjourn today, which should be very shortly, and I would ask that all of our members attend caucus. We do not have copies of the bill yet. We will have printouts for you but not the actual bill, and we will review and highlight the changes from the Governor's budget that are being suggested by the majority party, which has been PR'ed earlier today without our having had an opportunity, really, to review it. So I think that all of our members should be in caucus, that the amendment process be started today if you find items not to your liking, and hopefully we will be able to conclude at least this part of the process early next week.
