STATEMENT BY MR. ROZZI

The SPEAKER. Representative Rozzi, the floor is yours. Mr. ROZZI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today it is my great privilege to introduce Kelly Weikel, the House of Representatives' 2017-2018 scholarship winner from the Antietam Middle Senior High School. I am doubly honored to include Kelly's twin, Jamie, in my remarks, as she mirrors her sister in every way, and I welcome their mother, Sandy, who has raised two extraordinary young women.

Kelly was the president of the National Honor Society at Antietam and Jamie served as treasurer. Kelly was the president of the school's book club, Reading Olympics, and Jamie was

vice president. Kelly was class valedictorian and Jamie was the salutatorian. As a team, Kelly and Jamie received honorable mention in the Paradigm International STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) competition.

Academics aside, Kelly and Jamie have served on several youth and community organizations in Reading and both played 4 years of volleyball at Antietam. Imagine the assists between the sisters.

Kelly will attend Penn State University's Schreyer Honors College, majoring in chemical engineering, and Jamie will also be a Schreyer Honors College scholar, majoring in biological engineering with a minor in environmental engineering. And yes, Kelly and Jamie will be roommates. Look out, world. Here come the Weikel sisters.

Kelly, who is on the House floor today – Kelly, rise – the honor is yours today. Congratulations, Kelly.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Rozzi.

STATEMENT BY MR. KINSEY

The SPEAKER. Representative Kinsey and Representative Brown will be speaking on HR 375, which we passed just a few minutes ago.

Mr. KINSEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to thank Representative Vanessa Brown for her cosponsorship of HR 375, and I also would like to thank Representative Sue Helm for her continued push to legislate June 19.

And, Mr. Speaker, I also want to thank all the members of this chamber for commemorating June 19 as the official date in which slavery was finally abolished in all regions of the United States. An estimated 12.5 million men, women, and children were captured and forcibly transferred in bondage from their African homelands to the Americas. The human cargo on these slave ships endured weeks of horrifying conditions. Millions did not survive, but despite the progress that has been made, discrimination in our communities takes many forms. It has been said, "Those who fail to learn from history are doomed to repeat it."

I stand here today to honor our past, to celebrate the achievements of our present, and to encourage the work towards a more inclusive society to make sure that we do not repeat history.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mr. KINSEY. Mr. Speaker, I want to submit the remainder of my remarks for the record. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. KINSEY submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

From the earliest days of the African presence in the United States, they have contributed to the fiber of American culture, ranging from useful inventions to innovative policies. African-Americans served and died in defense of their homeland. The individuals that make up the whole of the Black population have offered up their talents to forward the cause of prosperity in America.

From the end of slavery to the civil rights movement, African-Americans have obtained amazing achievements and have seen numerous leaders stand up and make their dreams possible.

Let us all vow today to keep the ball rolling so that people can look back at this century the way we now look back at the 1900s and say, "Wow, look at the progress we made."

We commemorate this day to the freedom of the millions of Africans who survived their harrowing journey and to the continued education and achievement of African-Americans today. We honor our ancestors who survived the inhumane institution of bondage and left us a marvelous legacy of resistance and perseverance.

STATEMENT BY MS. BROWN

The SPEAKER. Representative Vanessa Brown.

Ms. V. BROWN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would also like to thank my cosponsor, Representative Steve Kinsey, and a true champion of Juneteenth, as we call it in our neighborhood for June 19, Representative Sue Helm, who has really kept the torch alive for so many years.

This is such an important milestone and such a heavy responsibility for me today, because it is honoring the ancestors of whom I come from. It is to honor ancestors who survived cruelty that no one could ever, ever describe or ever even think that they could go through. And to know that when the slaves were free, that it took so many years before all of the slaves actually got word that they were free, thousands of them were still working in dingy and under inhumane situations. Some of them did not make it to actually hear that they were free.

As a little girl, I remember hearing stories about my grandmother, who was a slave. Her name was just a symbol. It was not even a full name. Her name was Ma, and later, just this last year, I found out that her name was LaAlma. Through ancestry.com I found her death certificate, LaAlma. And my grandmother, Ma, said that she was a baby when the Yankees came on the big horses to free the slaves. I have carried that story with me all my life. So today it is with great honor that I get to tell you about Juneteenth, because my grandmother was one of those who were waiting for the Yankees to come and let them know that they were free.

Yesterday we held a Juneteenth celebration, and we were able to have one of the originators commemorating Juneteenth here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Mr. Ron Brown. I invited him to come today, but he was unable because he is at the United Nations today speaking about Juneteenth and its importance.

I am just so thankful for all of my colleagues today to understand the plight that my ancestors have gone through and to just take a moment and just honor them for all of their struggles to help make this United States of America what it is today. It is those same Africans that were at Camp William Penn that helped to win the War of 1812, those same Africans that helped to win the American Revolutionary War, and those same Africans that helped with Lincoln to fight to free the slaves. We have been ingrained in this culture of the United States of America. We have contributed with our lives, our blood, our sweat, and our tears.

So today again I must say it is with great honor to stand here and celebrate and educate you about why Juneteenth is so important. So, Mr. Speaker, just thank you so much for letting us take this time, and to all the members of the House, thank you for your unanimous vote on House Resolution – I do not have the number in front of me – 375. Thank you. I am glad I have a great partner here. Thank you so much, Mr. Speaker.

STATEMENT BY MR. PYLE

The SPEAKER. Representative DeLuca and Representative Pyle, the floor is yours.

Mr. PYLE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I stand to thank the membership for their support of HR 371, recognizing this August as "Kidney Cancer Awareness Month."

As many people here are aware, I have personally been affected by this and lost my kidney over 12 years ago. Mr. Speaker, every year more than 63,000 people in the United States are diagnosed with kidney cancer and among us are 200,000 survivors. The cause is not exactly known in that there are many, many suspected causes. Breakthroughs in research over the last few years have given renewed hope to patients who previously had very few treatment options and therefore the need for this resolution.

Mr. Speaker, I have asked my friend from Penn Hills to join me up here. Many do not know that we share a common problem, and on that note, I am going to turn it over to Representative/Chairman Tony DeLuca.

STATEMENT BY MR. DeLUCA

Mr. DeLUCA. Thank you, Representative Pyle.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I hope you would pay attention, because the fact is, we introduce these resolutions and they are very important, and especially with cancer, and there is a lot of cancer out there.

As you know, I personally am a cancer survivor so far, thank God, and my wife is also a cancer survivor. She got cancer right after me.

So I want to thank Representative Pyle for sponsoring HR 371, which designates August as "Kidney Cancer Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.

Now, Mr. Speaker, it is no secret that cancer touches the lives of every person in this chamber. It is an unwelcome visitor but one that needs no special clearance to get through the door.

Across this city, this State, this nation, and the world, cancer remains one of the last puzzles for medical science to solve, and while many pieces of that puzzle have been put in place, we are still working on completing a full picture. By such resolutions as Kidney Cancer Awareness Month, we hope we are bringing attention to another vital – we have to have another vital tool in the fight against cancer – the importance of early detection. Those signs include lumps, sores that fail to heal, abnormal bleeding, persistent indigestion, and chronic hoarseness. We cannot stress enough the importance of early detection.

Now, let me give you an example. When colon cancer is caught early, it has a 91-percent chance of a 5-year survival rate, but if it is caught late and has spread to other organs, the survival rate drops to 11 percent.

I know it is my hope and Representative Pyle's hope that the scourge known as cancer can be cured in this lifetime.

Please close the doors to the House. Sergeants at Arms, please close the doors to the House. If anybody has to exit, please do so at this time.

Mr. DeLuca, if you could, please.

Mr. DeLUCA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As I said, it is our hope that the scourge known as cancer can be cured in our lifetime, but if not, that we do not wait another 40 years for the future generation. Bringing attention to this important issue, recognizing the symptoms and getting help early, as we are doing today with HR 371, may minimize someone else's loss and pain.

And let me just say to everyone here, I came up to Harrisburg here 2 years ago. I felt good, went to have dinner, laid on the bed at 9 o'clock. I had a little tingling in my lip here, and my daughter, who happens to be a nurse, said, "You better get to the emergency room because you might be having a stroke." Well, I wish it was. Maybe a stroke would have ended a little differently than what I had. The doctors over at Pinnacle were fantastic. They gave me all the tests, and at 2 o'clock in the morning, they said, "You go right to the hospital." I said, "Well, I'm not going to go up here. My family is back home in Pittsburgh." He said, "I want you to go right to the hospital." So I was fortunate to have my son-in-law up here. I called him up and they made arrangements to go right to the hospital, and here I had lymphoma which affected my eyesight, but if I did not catch that, I probably would not even be here today. So I thank Pinnacle and my daughter for, hopefully, being here a little longer.

But you know, my mother passed away from cancer, and we all have friends and family members who passed away, and I did not realize the magnitude of this illness. I really did not until I was being treated down at the Hillman Center there. And 19, 20, 25, 30, it really is an epidemic, Mr. Speaker, and that is without the little kids in children's hospitals throughout the State and throughout this country. We are making progress, but it is taking a long time for that progress to take hold. That is why I will be introducing a meeting with the State Department tomorrow to introduce some legislation, because this illness – and I call it an illness, and probably if it was a communal disease, we probably would find some type of cure or something to deter it a little bit.

But there are people, individuals out there – I do not know how they go to sleep at night – who are collecting money from these charities, by the guys at charities for cancer, kids' cancer and that, and would you believe that only 5 to 6 percent goes to the research and development from these charities? Most of it goes for telemarketers. My wife has given out a lot of these donations, and I started looking at it. The American Breast Cancer Foundation last year took in \$80.8 million. They gave 5.30 percent to the cause. That is outrageous when we are looking for research money to fight this dreadful disease, and

there are other charities that are just as bad as them. It is about time we take the lead in Pennsylvania and say, if you are not doing the job, if you cannot provide 65 percent of the money that the people donate in this Commonwealth to the cause, you do not deserve to be out there collecting money for these causes. And we are going after them, and I hope I would have everyone's support in this chamber.

And again, I want to thank Representative Pyle, and, Representative, you know how much you have to go through when you have this dreadful disease, and I am sure we have others. I do not want to mention their names, but there are others of our colleagues out here who have it. Unfortunately, Flo Fabrizio is in Erie. He just found out he has cancer, but it is something – your life changes overnight. So we take it for granted, but hopefully we can start thinking about the next generation and not worry about waiting 40 years for our kids and our grandkids. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. PYLE. I close this up, Mr. Speaker, by thanking my dear friend from Penn Hills, and we have not talked about it, but I am sure I speak for him, he and I hope you never know this.

MOMENT OF SILENCE OBSERVED

The SPEAKER. Members, as you know, I just wanted to check through some of the incidents that have occurred over the last couple of weeks, and there have been a number of unfortunate terrorist attacks that have occurred to individuals, innocent victims, in our world.

As you know, on June 3 there was a vehicular attack and stabbing in London. A van had run over multiple pedestrians on the London Bridge, then drove to Borough Market, where they stabbed multiple people.

Then on June 14 the terrible shooting in Alexandria, Virginia, United States, the congressional baseball shooting. A gunman opened fire at a baseball field, then at least five individuals were wounded, and of course Congressman Scalise was critically injured and has undergone several operations.

And then on June 19 another vehicular attack in London. In Finsbury Park a vehicle rammed into people walking out of a mosque in the Finsbury Park neighborhood of London, and there were multiple casualties. My understanding is, it is the third vehicle attack in London in the past 3 months and the second to happen in June, as I mentioned, June 3 and June 19. Each of these victims was innocent people.

I would ask that we have a short moment of silence for all of the victims and that there is peace in the world. I know it is easy to state, and here we are in the House of Representatives in Pennsylvania, but I know that the really excellent and wonderful collaboration that we see here in the House of Representatives, even when we disagree on important policy issues, it is just always so professional and such great relations not only amongst members of both parties and from all over the Commonwealth and from people of different backgrounds, but with many of the people that come in to advocate in the Capitol here in Pennsylvania.

So I would ask if we could all just do a brief moment of silence for these victims and others throughout the world, and I think, hopefully, the example set here in Harrisburg will continue to shine and that there will be, you know, just that kind of advocacy without resorting to violence, I think is what the world needs more of. So we will have a moment of silence.

(Whereupon, a moment of silence was observed.)
