3 ; designating the bridge on Stoughstown Road over Interstate 81 4 in Cumberland County (bridge number 21-3007-0020-0865) as the 5 Private Raymond Lafayette Naugle Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge on Maple Avenue over the Yellow Breeches Creek in 6 7 Walnut Bottom Township, Cumberland County (bridge number 21-8 3009-0012-0000), as the Sergeant Kenneth Lee "Buck" Devor 9 Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge on that portion of U.S. Route 219 South, over U.S. Route 22, also known as the 10 11 Admiral Peary Highway, in Cambria Township, Cambria County, 12 as the PFC Nick Kozorosky Memorial Bridge; designating a 13 portion of Pennsylvania Route 54 in West Mahanoy Township, 14 Schuylkill County, as the Francis V. "Angie" McAndrew Memorial Highway; and designating a portion of State Route 15 2026, in Upper Moreland Township, Montgomery County, as the 16 17 Corporal Michael Dennis Cooke Memorial Highway.

19 Section 3. Private Raymond Lafayette Naugle Memorial Bridge. 20 Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as (a) 21 follows:

22 (1) Private Raymond Lafayette Naugle, a native of 23 Carlisle, enlisted in the United States Army on July 17, 24 1917.

25 While serving with G Company, 2nd Battalion, 112th (2) 26 Infantry Regiment, 28th Infantry Division, Private Naugle was 27 killed in action on November 8, 1918, in France.

28 (b) Designation. -- The bridge on Stoughstown Road in 29 Cumberland County over Interstate 81 (bridge number 21-3007-30 0020-0865) is designated the Private Raymond Lafayette Naugle 31 Memorial Bridge.

32 (C) Signs. -- The Department of Transportation shall erect and 33 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to 34 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

35 Section 1. Sergeant Kenneth Lee "Buck" Devor Memorial Bridge. 36 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as 37 follows:

(1) Sergeant Kenneth Lee "Buck" Devor, a native of 1 Carlisle, was drafted into the United States Army on December 2 3 2, 1966. 4 (2) While serving with Troop C, 3rd Squadron, 4th 5 Cavalry Regiment, 25th Infantry Division (Tropic Lightning 6 Division), during the Tet Offensive, Sergeant Devor was 7 killed in action on February 10, 1968. 8 (3) Sergeant Devor was awarded the Bronze Star medal, 9 the Purple Heart, the Combat Infantryman's Badge and the Republic of Vietnam Military Merit Medal. 10 11 Designation. -- The section of Maple Avenue over the (b) 12 Yellow Breeches Creek in Walnut Bottom Township, Cumberland County (bridge number 21-3009-0012-0000), is designated the 13 Sergeant Kenneth Lee "Buck" Devor Memorial Bridge. 14 15 (C) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to 16 17 traffic in both directions on the bridge. 18 Section 4. PFC Nick Kozorosky Memorial Bridge. 19 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as 20 follows: 21 PFC Nick Kozorosky, a native of Nanty Glo Borough, (1)22 served his country in the United States Army, 101st Airborne 23 Division, 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment during World War 24 II. 25 (2) On May 4, 1945, PFC Kozorosky was killed in action 26 near Berchtesgaden, Germany, where Nazi leaders were planning 27 a last stand. 28 (3) PFC Nick Kozorosky was posthumously awarded the 29 Purple Heart. (b) Designation.--The bridge located on U.S. Route 219 30 South, over U.S. Route 22, also known as the Admiral Peary 31 32 Highway, in Cambria Township, Cambria County, is designated as 33 the PFC Nick Kozorosky Memorial Bridge. 34 (C) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and 35 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to 36 traffic in both directions on the bridge. Section 5. Francis V. "Angie" McAndrew Memorial Highway. 37 38 Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as (a) 39 follows: (1) Francis V. "Angie" McAndrew lived a life of service 40 41 to the residents of Schuylkill County and to the Commonwealth 42 of Pennsylvania. 43 (2) Born December 29, 1944, in Shenandoah, he was a 1962 44 graduate of the former J.W. Cooper High School, Shenandoah, 45 and a 1977 graduate of The Pennsylvania State University, 46 Schuylkill Campus. 47 (3) He was a decorated Army veteran, having served 48 during the Vietnam era. 49 (4) After his honorable discharge from the Army, he 50 graduated from the Pennsylvania State Police Academy, 51 Hershey, and became a Pennsylvania State Trooper and State

Police investigator.

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(5) During his 25-year career with the Pennsylvania State Police, he served in numerous roles as a patrol officer, a Statewide vice and narcotics investigator, a corruption probe investigator and a criminal investigator.

(6) He received many accolades and commendations for his work and skills in helping to solve and prosecute numerous criminal cases and received a special citation in True Detective Magazine.

10 (7) Upon his retirement from the Pennsylvania State 11 Police, he worked as a detective for the Schuylkill County 12 District Attorney's Office and was elected Schuylkill County 13 Sheriff in 1993.

14 (8) He served as county sheriff for 14 years and was 15 instrumental in establishing a central booking office to 16 quickly and efficiently provide fingerprinting and 17 recordkeeping for suspects.

(9) He also implemented security at the courthouse, established a prison inmate work detail and revamped procedures for attaining a hunting license in the county.

(10) In 2007, he was elected Schuylkill County
Commissioner, helping the Democratic Party take majority
control of the county board of commissioners for the first
time in 37 years. He served as commissioner from 2008 to
2011.

(11) During his career, he also served as a commissioner
for the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency, a
delegate to the Pennsylvania State Troopers Association, a
board member of the Pennsylvania State Police Camp Cadet
program and served on numerous other boards and associations.

(12) He was also a member of Divine Mercy Parish,
Anthony P. Damato American Legion Post 792, AMVETS Post 7,
Shenandoah East End Field and Stream Club, Saint Clair Fish
and Game, Veterans of the Vietnam War Post 29, BPOE Lodge
1533, Ancient Order of Hibernians in America, John F. Kennedy
Division 1 and a lifelong member of the former West End Fire
Company in Lost Creek.

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(13) He died on November 27, 2016.

(b) Designation.--The portion of Pennsylvania Route 54 in West Mahanoy Township, Schuylkill County, is designated as the Francis V. "Angie" McAndrew Memorial Highway.

42 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and 43 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to 44 traffic in both directions on the highway.

45 Section 6. Corporal Michael Dennis Cooke Memorial Highway.
46 (a) Findings.--

47 (1) Corporal Michael Dennis Cooke was born and raised in48 Upper Moreland Township, Montgomery County.

49 (2) Corporal Cooke enlisted in the United States Marine
50 Corps in 1987 and served in 3rd Platoon, C Company, 2nd
51 Reconnaissance Battalion, Second Marine Division.

1 (3) Corporal Cooke died of massive trauma after an 2 accidental grenade explosion on February 22, 1991, after 3 completing a heroic operation against the enemy serving as 4 team scout and photographer during Operation Desert Storm. He 5 was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star.

6 (b) Designation.--The section of State Route 2026 in Upper 7 Moreland Township, Montgomery County, from Pennsylvania Route 8 611 to Pennsylvania Route 63 is designated the Corporal Michael 9 Dennis Cooke Memorial Highway.

10 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and 11 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to 12 traffic in both directions on the highway.
