1 2 3 4	Amending the act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31, No.21), entitled "An act to consolidate, editorially revise, and codify the public welfare laws of the Commonwealth," providing for adoption opportunities.
5	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
6	hereby enacts as follows:
7	Section 1. Article VII, act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31,
8	No.21), known as the "Public Welfare Code," is amended by adding
9	a subarticle heading and sections to read:

L3	(e) Adoption Opportunities Act
L 4	Section 771. Declaration of Purpose This subarticle shall
L5	be interpreted and construed so as to effect the following
L6	purpose: to encourage and promote the placement in adoptive
L7	homes of children whose mental, emotional or physical handicap,
L8	or size of sibling group imposes an obstacle to placement.

- 1 adoptive parents, who are otherwise suitable to provide a good
- 2 <u>Section 772. Definitions.--As used in this subarticle:</u>
- 3 <u>"Adoption opportunity" may include maintenance cost, medical</u>
- 4 and surgical expenses and other costs incident to the adoption
- 5 placement.
- 6 "Child" means an individual who is under the age of eighteen
- 7 years.
- 8 <u>"Eliqible child" means a child in the legal custody of local</u>
- 9 authorities where parental rights have been terminated pursuant
- 10 to the procedure set forth in Article III of the act of July 24,
- 11 1970 (P.L.620, No.208), known as the "Adoption Act," and such
- 12 child has been in foster placement for a period of not less than
- 13 six months and where the child has been shown to be a difficult
- 14 adoption placement because of the child's physical, emotional or
- 15 mental handicap, or because the child is a member of a sibling
- 16 group, which should be kept intact.
- 17 <u>"Local authorities" means county institution districts or</u>
- 18 their successors.
- 19 Section 773. Rules and Regulations. -- (a) The Department of
- 20 Public Welfare shall establish and develop criteria and
- 21 promulgate necessary regulations for public child welfare
- 22 agencies to implement an adoption opportunity in accordance with
- 23 the provisions of this subarticle (e).
- 24 (b) The regulations shall include, but not be limited to,
- 25 criteria for identifying eligible children and adoptive homes,
- 26 procedures for implementing the subsidy, and reporting
- 27 requirements by public child welfare agencies.
- 28 (c) All regulations established pursuant to this section
- 29 shall be adopted pursuant to the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L.769,
- 30 No.240), known as the "Commonwealth Documents Law," and the

- 1 hearings referred to in section 202 of that act shall be
- 2 <u>mandatory</u>.
- 3 <u>Section 774. Adoption Opportunity Payments and</u>
- 4 Reimbursement.--(a) The department shall reimburse local
- 5 <u>authorities for at least one hundred percent (100%) of the cost</u>
- 6 <u>of an adoption subsidy OPPORTUNITY provided by local authority</u>
- 7 pursuant to the provisions of this subarticle (e), provided the
- 8 local authority complies with the reporting requirements
- 9 <u>established by the department pursuant to section 773.</u>
- 10 (b) No public funds shall be expended under this subarticle
- 11 (e) on behalf of an eligible child until all available benefits
- 12 under existing or future private, public, local, State, or
- 13 Federal programs have been exhausted. Notwithstanding any other
- 14 provision of law, adoptive children PARENTS subsidized under the <---
- 15 provisions of this subarticle (e) shall not be liable pursuant
- 16 to the provisions of the act of October 20, 1966 (3rd Sp. Sess.,
- 17 P.L.96, No.6), known as the "Mental Health and Mental
- 18 Retardation Act of 1966," or the act of June 24, 1937 (P.L.2045,
- 19 No.397), known as "The Support Law," in the event that the
- 20 <u>adopted child needs services or assistance under the provisions</u>
- 21 of Article IV of this act or under the provisions of the "Mental
- 22 Health and Mental Retardation Act of 1966."
- 23 Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately so as to
- 24 permit the Department of Public Welfare to establish
- 25 regulations, but no payments shall be made prior to July 1,
- 26 1975.
