AN ACT

1 Amending the act of May 22, 1933 (P.L.853, No.155), entitled "An
2 act relating to taxation; designating the subjects, property
3 and persons subject to and exempt from taxation for all local
4 purposes; providing for and regulating the assessment and
5 valuation of persons, property and subjects of taxation for
6 county purposes, and for the use of those municipal and
7 quasi-municipal corporations which levy their taxes on county
8 assessments and valuations; amending, revising and
9 consolidating the law relating thereto; and repealing
10 existing laws," further providing for appeals from
11 assessments.

12 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
13 hereby enacts as follows:

14 Section 1. The last paragraph of section 518.1, act of May
15 22, 1933 (P.L.853, No.155), known as "The General County
16 Assessment Law," added October 5, 1978 (P.L.1142, No.269), is
17 amended to read:

18 Section 518.1. Appeal to Court from Assessments; Collection
19 Pending Appeal; Payment into Court; Refunds.--* * *

20 If a taxpayer has filed an appeal from an assessment, so long
21 as the appeal is pending before the board or before a court on
22 appeal from the determination of the board, as provided by

1 statute, the appeal will also be taken as an appeal by the
2 taxpayer on the subject property for any valuation for any
3 assessment subsequent to the filing of such appeal with the
4 board and prior to the determination of the appeal by the board
5 or the court. [The board shall hold its hearings and make its
6 final determination of the subsequent years in question in the
7 same manner as for the year or years for which the original
8 appeal was filed.] This provision shall be applicable to all
9 pending appeals as well as future appeals.

10 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
