## AN ACT

Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," providing for mandatory programs; providing for education assessment testing as a prerequisite for receipt of diploma; and making editorial changes.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
hereby enacts as follows:
Section 1. Section 290.1 of the act of March 10, 1949
(P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949, is repealed.

Section 2. Section 1511 of the act, amended July 31, 1968 (P.L.1020, No.301), is amended to read:

Section 1511. [Subjects of Instruction; Flag Code.--In every elementary public and private school, established and maintained in this Commonwealth, the following subjects shall be taught, in the English language and from English texts: English, including spelling, reading and writing, arithmetic, geography, the
history of the United States and of Pennsylvania, civics, including loyalty to the State and National Government, safety education, and the humane treatment of birds and animals, health, including physical education, and physiology, music and art. Other subjects shall be taught in the public elementary schools and also in the public high schools as may be prescribed by the standards of the State Board of Education. All such subjects, except foreign languages, shall be taught in the English language and from English texts: Provided, however, That, at the discretion of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the teaching of subjects in a language other than English may be permitted as part of a sequence in foreign language study or as part of a bilingual education program if the teaching personnel are properly certified in the subject fields. Each school district shall provide and distribute to each pupil, enrolled in the eighth grade of the public schools, one illustrated copy of the National Flag Code, and shall, from time to time, make available such copies as are necessary for replacements from year to year. It shall be the duty of each teacher in the public schools to make such use of the code as may, from time to time, seem proper.] Programs or Courses of Study.--The mandatory required programs or courses of study to be offered are as follows:
(1) At the elementary school level: English, to include spelling, reading and writing; arithmetic; science; geography; history of the United States and Pennsylvania; civics; safety education, including regular instruction in the dangers and prevention of fires; health and physical education; music; art and remedial programs.
(2) At the secondary school level: English, to include
language, literature, speech and composition; science, to include biology, physics and chemistry; geography; social studies, to include civics, economics, world history, United States history and Pennsylvania history; foreign languages; mathematics, to include general mathematics and statistics, algebra, geometry, trigonometry and computer science; industrial arts; home economics; art; music; health and physical education and remedial programs. The program of health and physical education shall include instruction concerning the causes, effects, prevention and treatment of drug and alcohol abuse and the undesirability of the abuse of these substances.
(3) All subjects, except foreign languages, shall be taught in the English language and from English texts in compliance with State board regulations and department standards. The teaching of subjects in a language other than English may be permitted as part of a sequence in foreign language study if the teaching personnel are properly certified in the subject fields.
(4) Each school district shall provide and distribute to each student, enrolled in the eighth grade of the public schools, one illustrated copy of the National Flag Code and it shall be the duty of each teacher in the public schools to make such use of the code as may, from time to time, seem proper.
(5) The State board shall designate which of the mandated programs or courses of study shall be required of all students or of all students in certain grade levels.
(6) Notwithstanding the provisions of clause (5), the following minimum courses in grades nine (9) through twelve (12) are established as a requirement for high school graduation:
(i) Four (4) years of English.
(ii) Three (3) years of mathematics.
(iii) Three (3) years of science. (iv) Three (3) years of social studies. (v) One-half (1/2) year of computer science. (vi) Two (2) years of foreign language studies. The offering of such courses shall begin in school year 19841985 and the requirement for graduation shall apply to students graduating in 1989, and thereafter.
(7) Local school boards shall have the authority to establish written policies pertaining to the assignment of student homework and other out of class requirements.

Section 3. The act is amended by adding a section to read: Section 1511.1. Education Assessment Testing; Prerequisite for Receipt of Diploma.--(a) The Department of Education, within one (1) year of the effective date of this act shall develop, cause to be developed or select commercially available tests designed to measure objectively cognitive development and educational performance in reading, writing, arithmetic or mathematics and science. These tests shall be administered to all public school students in this Commonwealth in the third, fifth, eighth and eleventh grades. Except for mentally gifted students as defined in regulations of the Department of Education, those students defined as exceptional under section 1371 shall be exempt from the provisions of this section but may participate at the written request of a parent or guardian.
(b) Tests administered at the third, fifth and eighth grade levels shall be utilized by all school districts to measure relative student performance and to assist in the development of and placement of students in remedial educational programs as prescribed by the State Board of Education.
(c) Satisfactory performance as determined by the department
on the test administered in the eleventh grade shall be a basic prerequisite for all public, private and parochial school students receiving a high school diploma in Pennsylvania. A student failing the eleventh grade test shall immediately be placed in appropriate remedial programs to enable successful performance on the test. A student failing the eleventh grade test the first time shall be permitted to retake the test on a minimum of three (3) separate occasions, when the district shall offer it, during the student's senior year of high school. If a student fails to pass the test on all of these occasions, the student shall not receive a high school diploma. The graduation requirements established herein shall be applicable to the school year commencing four (4) years after the development or selection by the department of appropriate testing instruments.
(d) Results of the test administered in the third, fifth, eighth and eleventh grades shall be provided to parents or guardians. The board of school directors in each school district shall determine which school district personnel may have access to the test results.

Section 4. The Department of Education's Educational Quality Assessment Program and that program's goals of quality education are rescinded.

Section 5. This act shall take effect immediately except section 1511 which shall take effect beginning the 1984-1985 school year.
