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| 5 | The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania |
| 6 | hereby enacts as follows: |
| 7 | Section 1. Short title. |
| 8 | This act shall be known and may be cited as the Pennsylvania |
| 9 | Agricultural Fair Act. |
| 10 | Section 2. Declaration of purpose. |
| 11 | The General Assembly declares that agricultural fairs are a |
| 12 | part of Pennsylvania's rich heritage and the public policy of |
| 13 | this Commonwealth should be to continue their contribution to |
| 14 | agriculture and agribusiness by encouraging related careers, |
| 15 | fostering production and product improvements and promoting |
| 16 | increased investments. Agricultural fairs also enrich the life |
| 17 | of the community by showcasing agricultural and agribusiness |
| 18 | achievements, offering recreational opportunities and promoting |

tourism. The purpose of this act is to make funds available to
 encourage the further development and improvement of

3 Pennsylvania's agricultural fairs.

4 Section 3. Definitions.

5 The following words and phrases when used in this act shall 6 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the 7 context clearly indicates otherwise:

8 "ACTIVITY DAY." THE CONDUCTING OF A MINIMUM OF SIX HOURS OF9 EVENTS, ACTIVITIES OR PROGRAMS WITHIN A CALENDAR DAY.

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10 "Agricultural fair." An annual agricultural exhibition 11 contributing to the development of several or many phases of 12 agriculture or agribusiness by the conduct of educational 13 programs, activities, demonstrations, contests and exhibits.

14 "Class A fair." An annual agricultural event which operates 15 on 40 acres or more of land and pays \$14,000 \$10,000 or more in 16 premiums to winners of agricultural or agribusiness contests or 17 exhibits.

18 "Class B fair." An annual agricultural event which operates 19 on 30 acres or more of land and pays \$12,000 to \$13,999 \$7,500 <-20 TO \$9,999 in premiums to winners of agricultural or agribusiness 21 contests or exhibits.

22 "Class C fair." An annual agricultural event which operates 23 on 20 acres or more of land and pays \$9,500 to \$11,999 \$5,000 TO <---24 \$7,499 in premiums to winners of agricultural or agribusiness 25 contests or exhibits.

26 "Class D fair." An annual agricultural event which operates 27 on 10 acres or more of land and pays \$7,000 to \$9,499 \$2,500 TO <--28 \$4,999 in premiums to winners of agricultural or agribusiness 29 contests or exhibits.

30 "Class E fair." An annual agricultural event which operates
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on fewer than 10 acres of land and pays \$2,500 to \$6,999 LESS
 THAN \$2,500 in premiums to winners of agricultural or
 agribusiness contests or exhibits.

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4 "Department." The Department of Agriculture of the5 Commonwealth.

6 "Open Class." An event for which agricultural or
7 agribusiness premiums are paid and which is open to participants
8 who need not be associated with any particular organization.

9 "Secretary." The Secretary of the Department of Agriculture10 of the Commonwealth.

11 Section 4. Advisory committee.

12 (a) Committee established.--There is established within the 13 department an advisory committee composed of seven members as 14 follows: the Secretary of Agriculture, who shall be chairman; 15 the Chairman of the Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committee of 16 the House of Representatives OR HIS DESIGNEE; the Chairman of 17 the Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committee of the Senate OR HIS 18 DESIGNEE; and four additional members to be appointed by the 19 secretary, including three representatives of agricultural fairs 20 and one member who shall represent the public at large. The 21 appointed members shall serve for terms of two years. 22 Appointments to the committee shall be made within 60 days of 23 this act.

(b) Quorum.--No business shall be transacted by the advisory committee in the absence of a quorum, which shall consist of five FOUR members.

(c) Expenses.--The members of the advisory committee shall not be entitled to compensation for their services as members, but may be entitled to receive the amount of reasonable traveling, lodging and other necessary expenses incurred in the 19860S1298B2174 - 3 - performance of their duties in accordance with Commonwealth
 regulations.

3 (d) Duties.--The advisory committee shall assist and advise 4 the secretary, review any proposed departmental regulations and 5 the annual plan for the administration of this act, and 6 periodically review the operation of the program and make 7 recommendations on the disbursement of funds.

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8 Section 5. Authorization for and approval to make grants.
9 GRANTS.

10 The department is authorized to make grants in amounts 11 approved by the secretary in the following manner:

(1) On or before February 1, annually, to eligible
county agricultural societies, independent agricultural
societies and other organizations which conduct an annual
agricultural fair to assist the organizations as follows:

16 (i) Financing their operating costs, including, but
17 not limited to, the cost of exhibiting agribusiness
18 products, materials and equipment, conducting
19 agricultural or agribusiness educational activities and
20 demonstrations, and awarding premiums to contest and
21 exhibit winners at the fairs.

(A) A BASIC PAYMENT FOR OPERATING EXPENSES, <-
THE SUM OF WHICH MAY NOT EXCEED \$14,000 FOR CLASS
A FAIRS, \$12,000 FOR CLASS B FAIRS, \$9,500 FOR
CLASS C FAIRS, \$7,000 FOR CLASS D FAIRS AND
\$2,500 FOR CLASS E FAIRS.

(B) FIFTY PERCENT OF MONEY PAID FOR ALL
OTHER AGRICULTURAL PREMIUMS NOT INCLUDED IN
PARAGRAPH (1), WITH A MAXIMUM PAYMENT FOR
PREMIUMS NOT TO EXCEED \$15,000.

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(ii) Financing their costs to improve buildings and
 grounds, add land or construct new facilities.

3 (iii) Reimbursing each county agricultural society 4 and each independent agricultural society conducting 5 harness horse racing during its annual fair, other than races for two and three year old colts and fillies 6 7 provided for in subparagraph (iv), in an amount of money equal to that used during its annual fair as purse money 8 for harness horse racing, track and stable maintenance, 9 10 starting gate rental and the cost of all harness horse 11 racing officials required during the annual fair. Reimbursement shall not exceed \$10,000 \$13,000, and a 12 13 minimum of $\frac{33,333}{4,000}$ shall be used for purse money.

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14 (iv) Reimbursing each county agricultural society
15 and independent agricultural society conducting races for
16 two and three year old colts and fillies at its annual
17 fair, concerning which a maximum of \$5,600 \$7,600 was
18 paid annually. Entrance fees collected for each race
19 shall not be included for purposes of determining
20 eligibility for a grant under this section.

(2) To Statewide agricultural organizations which
 contribute to the development of many phases of agriculture
 or agribusiness.

To countywide or Statewide 4-H and FFA or combined 24 (3) 25 FFA and FHA units of boys and girls under 21 years of age to 26 be used for the general operations of the units in 27 agriculture or agribusiness programs. An organization whose 28 members consist entirely of minors must apply through and be 29 represented by an adult advisory group, and both groups must 30 be recognized by their respective county governments or by - 5 -19860S1298B2174

| 9 | Section 6. Eligibility. |
| 10 | (a) Requirements. To be eligible to receive a grant from < |
| 11 | the department, an organization must conduct an annual |
| 12 | agricultural fair which meets all of the following requirements: |
| 13 | (1) Exhibits agricultural or agribusiness products, |
| 14 | materials and equipment. |
| 15 | (2) Conducts agricultural or agribusiness educational |
| 16 | activities and demonstrations. |
| 17 | (3) Awards premiums to agricultural or agribusiness |
| 18 | contest and exhibit winners with a top award for first place |
| 19 | and proportionate awards to runners up adjudged by position |
| 20 | following the winner, but not to exceed ten in number. |
| 21 | (4) Provides proper first aid through medical personnel |
| 22 | and adequate sanitary facilities which meet Commonwealth and |
| 23 | local requirements. |
| 24 | (5) Provides supervision of all activities by an |
| 25 | officially appointed committee or a board of directors of not |
| 26 | fewer than five persons. |
| 27 | (6) Files all reports, forms and applications for moneys |
| 28 | received from grants made available according to this act, |
| 29 | and maintains records required by the rules and regulations |
| 30 | promulgated by the department. |
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1 (7) Provides that at least 25% of the events for which 2 agricultural or agribusiness premiums are paid must be open 3 class events.

4 (8) Holds a program or programs contributing to the
5 development of several or many phases of agriculture or
6 agribusiness for not fewer than five days of activities for
7 Class A, B and C fairs, and not fewer than three days of
8 activities for Class D and E fairs.

9 (A) REQUIREMENTS.--TO BE ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE A GRANT FROM 10 THE DEPARTMENT, AN ORGANIZATION MUST MEET ALL OF THE FOLLOWING 11 REQUIREMENTS: <-----

12 (1) FILE APPLICATIONS FOR APPROVAL DURING THE CALENDAR13 YEAR IN WHICH THE ACTIVITY IS HELD.

14 (2) CONDUCT AN ANNUAL AGRICULTURAL FAIR WHICH MEETS THE15 FOLLOWING REQUIREMENTS:

16 (I) EXHIBITS AGRICULTURAL OR AGRIBUSINESS PRODUCTS,
 17 MATERIALS AND EQUIPMENT.

18 (II) CONDUCTS AGRICULTURAL OR AGRIBUSINESS
 19 EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES AND DEMONSTRATIONS.

20 (III) AWARDS PREMIUMS TO AGRICULTURAL OR
21 AGRIBUSINESS CONTEST AND EXHIBIT WINNERS WITH A TOP AWARD
22 FOR FIRST PLACE AND PROPORTIONATE AWARDS TO RUNNERS-UP
23 ADJUDGED BY POSITION FOLLOWING THE WINNER, BUT NOT TO
24 EXCEED TEN IN NUMBER.

25 (IV) PROVIDES PROPER FIRST AID THROUGH MEDICAL
26 PERSONNEL AND ADEQUATE SANITARY FACILITIES WHICH MEET
27 COMMONWEALTH AND LOCAL REQUIREMENTS.

28 (V) PROVIDES SUPERVISION OF ALL ACTIVITIES BY AN
29 OFFICIALLY APPOINTED COMMITTEE OR A BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF
30 NOT FEWER THAN FIVE PERSONS.

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1 (VI) FILES ALL REPORTS, FORMS AND APPLICATIONS FOR MONEYS RECEIVED FROM GRANTS MADE AVAILABLE ACCORDING TO 2 3 THIS ACT, AND MAINTAINS RECORDS REQUIRED BY THE RULES AND 4 REGULATIONS PROMULGATED BY THE DEPARTMENT.

PROVIDES THAT AT LEAST 25% OF THE EVENTS FOR 5 (VII) WHICH AGRICULTURAL OR AGRIBUSINESS PREMIUMS ARE PAID MUST 6 BE OPEN CLASS EVENTS. 7

(VIII) HOLDS A PROGRAM OR PROGRAMS CONTRIBUTING TO 8 THE DEVELOPMENT OF SEVERAL OR MANY PHASES OF AGRICULTURE 9 10 OR AGRIBUSINESS FOR NOT FEWER THAN FIVE ACTIVITY DAYS FOR 11 CLASS A, B AND C FAIRS, AND NOT FEWER THAN THREE ACTIVITY DAYS FOR CLASS D AND E FAIRS. 12

13 (b) Commencement of benefits. -- An organization conducting an 14 annual agricultural fair hereafter incorporated or recognized by 15 a county government or the Commonwealth shall not be entitled to 16 the benefits of this act until the organization has conducted three consecutive annual exhibitions of the character designated 17 18 in this section. The organization shall, upon its inception, 19 file with the secretary a declaration of its intention to apply 20 for a grant for its fourth year. The organization must also file 21 its report during the first three years in the same manner as an 22 eligible organization. This subsection shall not apply to an 23 eligible organization heretofore or hereafter incorporated which 24 shall resume the holding of annual exhibitions of the character 25 designated in this section, which exhibitions have been 26 temporarily discontinued for a period of not more than two 27 years.

28 Section 7. Appropriation.

29 The department shall make grants from moneys appropriated 30 annually by the General Assembly as follows: 19860S1298B2174

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(1) A basic payment for operating expenses, the sum of
 which may not exceed \$14,000 for Class A fairs, \$12,000 for
 Class B fairs, \$9,500 for Class C fairs, \$7,000 for Class D
 fairs and \$2,500 for Class E fairs.

5 (2) Fifty percent of money paid for all other 6 agricultural premiums not included in paragraph (1), with a 7 maximum payment for premiums not to exceed \$15,000. FOR THE 8 PURPOSES STATED HEREIN.

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9 Section 8. Regulations and annual plan.

(a) Power to promulgate. -- The secretary shall have the power 10 11 and the authority to promulgate, adopt and use any rules and regulations necessary for the administration of this act and 12 13 shall, with the advice and assistance of the advisory committee, 14 adopt an annual plan for the awarding of grants under this act. 15 The annual plan shall be submitted for publication in the 16 Pennsylvania Bulletin as a notice pursuant to 45 Pa.C.S. § 17 725(6) (relating to additional contents of Pennsylvania 18 Bulletin).

19 (b) Continuation of certain rules and regulations.--All 20 rules and regulations promulgated under the provisions of section 225 of the act of December 17, 1981 (P.L.435, No.135), 21 22 known as the Race Horse Industry Reform Act, shall remain in effect except to the extent that they are inconsistent with this 23 act. The secretary may amend, revise or alter rules and 24 25 regulations promulgated under section 225 of that act to make 26 the rules and regulations consistent with this act.

27 Section 9. Repeals.

(a) Section 225 of the act of December 17, 1981 (P.L.435,
No.135), known as the Race Horse Industry Reform Act, is
repealed.

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(b) Section 1 of the act of August 22, 1961 (P.L.1049,
No.479), entitled "An act authorizing the State Treasurer under
certain conditions to transfer sums of money between the General
Fund and certain funds and subsequent transfers of equal sums
between such funds, and making appropriations necessary to
effect such transfers," is repealed insofar as it relates to the
Pennsylvania Fair Fund.

8 (c) All other acts and parts of acts are repealed insofar as 9 they are inconsistent with this act.

10 Section 10. Effective date.

11 This act shall take effect July 1, 1986.
