AN ACT

- 1 Amending Title 42 (Judiciary and Judicial Procedure) of the
- 2 Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, further providing certain
- 3 immunity to individuals who provide limited volunteer medical
- 4 professional care.
- 5 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 6 hereby enacts as follows:
- 7 Section 1. Section 8331 of Title 42 of the Pennsylvania
- 8 Consolidated Statutes is amended to read:
- 9 § 8331. Medical good Samaritan civil immunity.
- 10 (a) General rule. -- Any physician or any other practitioner
- 11 of the healing arts or any registered nurse, licensed by any
- 12 state, who happens by chance upon the scene of an emergency or
- 13 who arrives on the scene of an emergency by reason of serving on
- 14 an emergency call panel or similar committee of a county medical
- 15 society or who is called to the scene of an emergency by the
- 16 police or other duly constituted officers of a government unit
- 17 or who is present when an emergency occurs and who, in good

- 1 faith, renders emergency care at the scene of the emergency,
- 2 shall not be liable for any civil damages as a result of any
- 3 acts or omissions by such physician or practitioner or
- 4 registered nurse in rendering the emergency care, except any
- 5 acts or omissions intentionally designed to harm or any grossly
- 6 negligent acts or omissions which result in harm to the person
- 7 receiving emergency care.
- 8 [(b) Definition.--As used in this section "good faith" shall
- 9 include, but is not limited to, a reasonable opinion that the
- 10 immediacy of the situation is such that the rendering of care
- 11 should not be postponed until the patient is hospitalized.]
- 12 (b) Volunteer medical professional civil immunity. -- Any
- 13 medical professional who does not receive remuneration for
- 14 medical services provided to a person in a health care delivery
- 15 <u>site shall not be liable for any civil damages as a result of</u>
- 16 any acts or omissions by the medical professional in rendering
- 17 <u>health care, except for recklessness or wanton conduct.</u>
- 18 (c) Definitions.--As used in this section, the following
- 19 words and phrases shall have the meanings given to them in this
- 20 <u>subsection:</u>
- 21 <u>"Good faith." Shall include, but is not limited to, a</u>
- 22 reasonable opinion that the situation is such that the rendering
- 23 of care should not be postponed until the patient is
- 24 <u>hospitalized</u>.
- 25 <u>"Healing arts." The science and skill of diagnosis,</u>
- 26 prevention or treatment, in any manner whatsoever, of disease or
- 27 any ailment of the human body.
- 28 <u>"Health care delivery site." A location at which health care</u>
- 29 professionals provide medical care, including, but not limited
- 30 to, hospitals, clinics, satellite clinics, community health

- 1 centers not affiliated with hospitals, or location of a
- 2 <u>Department of Health sponsored program.</u>
- "Medical professional." An individual who is authorized to 3
- 4 practice some component of the healing arts by a license,
- 5 permit, certificate or registration issued by a Commonwealth
- 6 <u>licensing agency or board.</u>
- Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days. 7
