## AN ACT

- Amending the act of April 14, 1972 (P.L.233, No.64), entitled "An act relating to the manufacture, sale and possession of 3 controlled substances, other drugs, devices and cosmetics; conferring powers on the courts and the secretary and Department of Health, and a newly created Pennsylvania Drug, Device and Cosmetic Board; establishing schedules of 7 controlled substances; providing penalties; requiring registration of persons engaged in the drug trade and for the 9 revocation or suspension of certain licenses and registrations; and repealing an act," adding controlled 10 substances; and further providing for penalties. 11 12 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows: 13 14 Section 1. - 3 approved under section 505(i) of the Federal Food, Drug, and
- 4 Cosmetic Act (52 Stat. 1040, 21 U.S.C. § 301 et seq.) shall,
- 5 notwithstanding any other provision of this act, be classified
- 6 as a controlled substance in Schedule III of this section.

- (f) Any person who violates clause (12), (14) or (30) of

- 18 (1.1) Phencyclidine; methamphetamine, including its salts,
- 19 isomers and salts of isomers; coca leaves and any salt,
- 20 compound, derivative or preparation of coca leaves; any salt,
- 21 compound, derivative or preparation of the preceding which is
- 22 chemically equivalent or identical with any of these substances,
- 23 except decocanized coca leaves or extracts of coca leaves, which
- 24 extracts do not contain cocaine or ecgonine; 3, 4-
- 25 <u>methylenedioxymethamphetamine or 3, 4-methylenedioxyamphetamine</u>
- 26 or 4-bromo-2, 5-dimethoxyamphetamine or 4-bomo-2, 5-
- 27 dimethoxyhenethylamine or paramethoxyamphetamine or
- 28 paramethoxyethylamphetamine and marihuana in a quantity in
- 29 excess of one thousand (1,000) pounds, is guilty of a felony and
- 30 upon conviction thereof shall be sentenced to imprisonment not

- 1 exceeding ten years, or to pay a fine not exceeding one hundred
- 2 thousand dollars (\$100,000), or both, or such larger amount as
- 3 is sufficient to exhaust the assets utilized in and the profits
- 4 obtained from the illegal manufacture or distribution of these
- 5 substances.

- Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days. 7
