A RESOLUTION

- 1 Memorializing the Congress of the United States to amend laws
- 2 relating to the United States decennial census to change the
- manner in which incarcerated persons are counted.
- 4 WHEREAS, Obtaining an accurate count of the population is so
- 5 vital to a representative democracy that the framers of the
- 6 Constitution of the United States addressed the issue of the
- 7 census and apportionment in the opening paragraphs of that
- 8 governing document; and
- 9 WHEREAS, The right to vote and the right to representation
- 10 are fundamental civic rights; and
- 11 WHEREAS, The United States Census Bureau applies the "usual
- 12 residence" rule when it tabulates where people reside, which
- 13 means that the United States Census Bureau generally counts
- 14 people according to where they live and sleep most of the time;
- 15 and
- 16 WHEREAS, Prisoners are therefore tabulated as residents of
- 17 the counties of their incarceration rather than residents of the

- 1 counties in which they resided prior to incarceration, locations
- 2 where they likely have significant ties and interests; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Prisons in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania are
- 4 overwhelmingly located in rural counties, yet the majority of
- 5 prisoners in the State reside in urban counties prior to
- 6 incarceration; and
- 7 WHEREAS, The "usual residence" method of tabulation therefore
- 8 results in a population shift to locations where prisons are
- 9 situated; and
- 10 WHEREAS, This population shift is in direct contravention to
- 11 the democratic principle of "one person, one vote"; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Current census practices deprive urban areas of the
- 13 benefits that accrue to a jurisdiction as a result of population
- 14 size, such as voting and funding; and
- 15 WHEREAS, Such population distortions affect the United States
- 16 congressional districts and have an even greater impact on State
- 17 legislative districts; and
- 18 WHEREAS, This policy has led to a serious undercount of
- 19 Philadelphia's population, since 12% of the State's population
- 20 is in Philadelphia, but 40% of the State's prisoners are from
- 21 that city and 99% of the State's prison cells are located
- 22 outside of Philadelphia; and
- 23 WHEREAS, Application of the "usual residence" rule has a
- 24 negative impact on the political strength of African-American
- 25 residents, because 55% of the State's prisoners are African
- 26 American while 93% of the State's prison cells are located in
- 27 legislative districts that are Caucasian; and
- 28 WHEREAS, The method the United States Census Bureau is
- 29 authorized to employ to count residents could easily be adjusted
- 30 to fix this problem by allowing people in prison to be counted

- 1 as residents of their last known address; therefore be it
- 2 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the
- 3 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania memorialize Congress to amend laws
- 4 relating to the United States decennial census to change the
- 5 manner in which incarcerated persons are counted; and be it
- 6 further
- 7 RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to
- 8 the presiding officers of each house of Congress and to each
- 9 member of Congress from Pennsylvania.
