1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9 10 11	Amending the act of December 20, 1985 (P.L.457, No.112), entitled "An act relating to the right to practice medicine and surgery and the right to practice medically related acts; reestablishing the State Board of Medical Education and Licensure as the State Board of Medicine and providing for its composition, powers and duties; providing for the issuance of licenses and certificates and the suspension and revocation of licenses and certificates; providing penalties; and making repeals," adding definitions; and providing for licensure of prosthetists, orthotists, pedorthists and orthotic fitters.
12	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
13	hereby enacts as follows:
14	Section 1. Section 2 of the act of December 20, 1985
15	(P.L.457, No.112), known as the Medical Practice Act of 1985, is
16	amended by adding definitions to read:
17	Section 2. Definitions.
18	The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
19	have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
20	context clearly indicates otherwise:
21	"Accommodative." Designed with a primary goal of conforming
22	to an individual's anatomy.

2	"Custom-fabricated device." A prosthesis, orthosis or
3	pedorthic device that is fabricated to original measurements or
4	a mold for use by a patient in accordance with a prescription or
5	work order and which requires substantial clinical and technical
6	judgment in its design and fitting.
7	"Custom-fitted device." A prefabricated prosthesis, orthosis
8	or pedorthic device that is sized or modified for use by the
9	patient in accordance with a prescription or work order and
10	which requires substantial clinical judgment and substantive
11	alteration for appropriate use.
12	* * *
13	"NCCA." The National Commission for Certifying Agencies or
14	its successor.
15	"NOCA." The National Organization for Competency Assurance
16	<u>or its successor.</u>
17	"Nontherapeutic devices." Devices that do not address a
18	medical condition.
19	"Orthotic fitter." An individual who is licensed under this
20	act to practice orthotics pursuant to a written prescription of
21	a physician, podiatrist, certified registered nurse practitioner
22	or physician assistant or pursuant to a work order.
23	"Orthotics." Evaluating, measuring, designing, fabricating,
24	assembling, fitting, adjusting or servicing an orthosis for the
25	correction or alleviation of neuromuscular or musculoskeletal
26	dysfunction, disease, injury or deformity, as provided in this
27	<u>act.</u>
28	"Orthotist." An individual other than an orthotic fitter
29	licensed under this act to practice orthotics pursuant to a
30	written prescription of a physician, podiatrist, certified
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1	registered nurse practitioner or physician assistant or pursuant
2	<u>to a work order.</u>
3	"Over-the-counter prostheses, orthoses and pedorthic
4	devices." Prefabricated, mass-produced items that are
5	prepackaged and require no professional advice or judgment in
6	either size selection or use, including fabric or elastic
7	supports, corsets, generic arch supports and elastic hose.
8	"Pedorthic device." Includes therapeutic shoes, shoe
9	modifications made for therapeutic purposes, partial foot
10	prostheses, foot orthoses and below-the-knee pedorthic
11	modalities. The term does not include nontherapeutic,
12	accommodative inlays and nontherapeutic accommodative footwear,
13	regardless of method of manufacture; unmodified, nontherapeutic
14	over-the-counter shoes; or prefabricated unmodified or
15	unmodifiable foot care and footwear products.
16	"Pedorthics." Evaluating, measuring, designing, fabricating,
17	assembling, fitting, adjusting or servicing necessary to
18	accomplish the application of a pedorthic device for the
19	prevention or amelioration of painful or disabling conditions
20	related to the lower extremities.
21	"Pedorthist." An individual licensed under this act to
22	practice pedorthics pursuant to a written prescription of a
23	physician, podiatrist, certified registered nurse practitioner
24	or physician assistant or pursuant to a work order.
25	* * *
26	"Podiatrist." An individual licensed under the act of March
27	2, 1956 (1955 P.L.1206, No.375), known as the Podiatry Practice
28	Act, to practice podiatry.
29	"Prefabricated orthosis." A brace or support designed to
30	provide for alignment, correction or prevention of neuromuscular
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1	or musculoskeletal dysfunction, disease, injury or deformity.
2	The term does not include fabric or elastic support, corsets,
3	arch supports, low-temperature plastic splints, trusses, elastic
4	hose, canes, crutches, soft cervical collars, dental appliances
5	or other similar devices carried in stock and sold as over-the-
6	<u>counter items by a drug store, department store, corset shop or</u>
7	surgical supply facility.
8	"Prosthesis." A custom-designed, custom-fabricated, custom-
9	fitted or custom-modified device to replace an absent external
10	limb for purposes of restoring physiological function or
11	cosmesis. The term does not include artificial eyes, ears,
12	fingers or toes, dental appliances, cosmetic devices, such as
13	artificial breasts, eyelashes or wigs, or other devices that do
14	not have a significant impact on the musculoskeletal functions
15	<u>of the body.</u>
16	"Prosthetics." Evaluating, measuring, designing,
17	fabricating, assembling, fitting, adjusting or servicing a
18	prosthesis.
19	"Prosthetist." An individual licensed under this act to
20	practice prosthetics pursuant to a written prescription of a
21	physician, podiatrist, certified registered nurse practitioner
22	or physician assistant or pursuant to a work order.

24	"Therapeutic devices." Devices that address a medical
25	condition.
26	* * *
27	Section 2. The act is amended by adding a section to read:
28	Section 13.4. Prosthetists, orthotists, pedorthists and
29	orthotic fitters.
30	(a) Licensure qualificationsTo qualify for licensure to
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1	practice prosthetics, orthotics, pedorthics or orthotic fitting,
2	an applicant shall:
3	(1) Be of good moral character.
4	(2) Possess a high school diploma or its equivalent.
5	(3) Have fulfilled all educational and training required
6	for certification by a prosthetic, orthotic, pedorthic and
7	orthotic fitting credentialing organization recognized by
8	NOCA and accredited by NCCA and any additional requirements
9	as required by the board.
10	(4) Pass all examinations that are required for
11	certification by a prosthetic, orthotic, pedorthic or
12	orthotic fitting credentialing organization recognized by
13	NOCA and accredited by NCCA.
14	(5) Submit an application and fee as prescribed by the
15	board by regulation.
16	(6) Not be addicted to alcohol, narcotics or other
17	habit-forming drugs.
18	(7) Not been convicted of a felony under the act of
19	April 14, 1972 (P.L.233, No.64), known as The Controlled
20	Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act, or of an offense
21	under the laws of another jurisdiction which, if committed in
22	this Commonwealth, would be a felony under The Controlled
23	Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act, unless the
24	following apply:
25	(i) Ten years have elapsed from the date of
26	conviction.
27	(ii) The applicant satisfactorily demonstrates to
28	the board that the applicant has made significant
29	progress in personal rehabilitation since the conviction
30	and the licensure of the applicant is not expected to
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1	create a substantial risk of harm to the health and
2	safety of the applicant's clients or the public or a
3	substantial risk of further criminal violations.
4	(iii) The applicant otherwise satisfies the
5	qualifications required under this act.
6	(b) Term of licenseA license issued pursuant to this
7	section shall be valid for two years and may be renewed
8	biennially with the board as provided in subsection (g).
9	(c) Treatment requirements Prior to administering the
10	first treatment, a prosthetist, orthotist, pedorthist or
11	orthotics fitter shall do all of the following:
12	(1) Ensure the patient has secured a prescription or
13	work order for treatment using prosthetics, orthotics,
14	pedorthics or orthotic fitting from a physician, podiatrist,
15	certified registered nurse practitioner or physician
16	assistant. A prescription or work order under this paragraph
17	shall place conditions and restrictions on the course of
18	treatment if required as a matter of sound medical practice.
19	(2) Ensure the patient has undergone a medical
20	diagnostic examination or has had the results of a recently
21	performed medical diagnostic examination reviewed by a
22	physician, podiatrist, certified registered nurse
23	practitioner or physician assistant.
24	(3) Keep a copy of the prescription or work order and,
25	if provided, the results of the medical diagnostic
26	examination in the patient's file.
27	(d) Exceptions
28	(1) Nothing in this section shall prohibit students
29	enrolled in a prosthetics, orthotics, pedorthics or orthotics
30	fitter educational program from performing prosthetics,

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1	orthotics, pedorthics or orthotic fitting in the course of
2	their instruction, provided that a physician or podiatrist is
3	readily available for consultations and that a prosthetist,
4	orthotist, pedorthist or orthotic fitter, respectively, is on
5	site and responsible for the direct supervision of students.
6	(2) Nothing in this section shall prohibit an individual
7	from engaging in the practice for which that individual is
8	licensed or certified to practice or to act within the scope
9	of that license or certification held in this Commonwealth.
10	Nothing in this act shall prohibit an individual who is
11	employed by the Federal Government from engaging in the
12	practice of a prosthetist, orthotist, pedorthist or orthotic
13	fitter while in the discharge of the employee's official
14	<u>duties.</u>
15	(3) Nothing in this section shall prohibit the sale of
16	over-the-counter prostheses, orthoses or pedorthic devices.
17	(4) Nothing in this section shall prohibit a
18	representative of a medical device manufacturer registered
19	with the United States Food and Drug Administration from
20	measuring, fitting and adjusting orthoses when the
21	representative is supervised by a physician or other licensed
22	health care professional.
23	(e) License requirement effectiveCommencing two years
24	after the effective date of this section, individuals shall not
25	practice or hold themselves out as being able to practice
26	prosthetics, orthotics, pedorthics or orthotic fitting in this
27	Commonwealth unless the individuals are licensed in accordance
28	with this section.
29	(f) License without examinationWithin two years after the
30	effective date of this section, an individual may be granted a
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1	prosthetic, orthotic, pedorthotic or orthotic fitting license by
2	the board if the individual:
3	(1) Complies with subsection (a)(1), (2), (5), (6) and
4	<u>(7); and</u>
5	(2) Complies with one of the following:
6	(i) Holds a national certification as a prosthetist,
7	<u>orthotist, pedorthist or orthotic fitter.</u>
8	(ii) Has been in active, continuous practice for the
9	three years immediately preceding the effective date of
10	this section.
11	(g) License renewalTo renew a license, a licensee must:
12	(1) File a renewal application with the board.
13	(2) Pay a fee established by regulation by the board.
14	(3) Complete continuing education as required by the
15	board. The following apply:
16	(i) Certification of continuing education credit
17	hours submitted by the prosthetist, orthotist, pedorthist
18	or orthotic fitter shall be verified as being correct and
19	<u>true.</u>
20	(ii) No credit may be given for courses in office
21	management or practice building.
22	(iii) The board may waive all or part of the
23	continuing education requirements to a licensee who shows
24	to the satisfaction of the board that the licensee was
25	unable to complete the requirement due to illness,
26	emergency or hardship.
27	(h) Orthotic fitter scope of practiceThe scope of
28	practice of an orthotic fitter is limited to measuring, fitting,
29	dispensing and adjusting prefabricated devices not requiring
30	more than minor modification of:

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1	(1) Cervical soft foam collars.
2	(2) Thoraco-lumbo-sacral orthoses.
3	(3) Lumbo-sacral orthoses.
4	(4) Knee orthoses.
5	(5) Ankle foot orthoses.
6	(6) Foot orthoses.
7	(7) Elbow orthoses.
8	(8) Shoulder orthoses.
9	(9) Abdominal and pelvic:
10	<u>(i) Trusses.</u>
11	(ii) Flexible supports.
12	<u>(iii) Maternity supports.</u>
13	(10) Compression devices:
14	(i) Lymphedema garments.
15	(ii) Compression garments.
16	<u>(iii) Burn garments.</u>
17	(11) Breast prosthesis and ancillary supplies.
18	(i) Liability insurance coverageAn individual licensed to
19	practice prosthetics, orthotics, pedorthics or orthotic fitting
20	<u>in this Commonwealth shall maintain a level of professional</u>
21	liability insurance coverage in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000
22	per occurrence or claims made and shall verify to the board the
23	required coverage. Failure to maintain insurance coverage as
24	required shall subject the licensee to disciplinary proceedings.
25	The licensee must provide proof of coverage to the board upon
26	request. The board shall accept from a licensee as satisfactory
27	evidence of insurance coverage any of the following:
28	(1) Personally purchased liability insurance.
29	(2) Professional liability insurance coverage provided
30	by the individual licensee's employer or similar insurance

1 <u>coverage acceptable to the board.</u>

2 (j) Practice by unregistered persons. -- Any person who is not licensed as a prosthetist, orthotist, pedorthist or orthotic 3 fitter shall not practice prosthetics, orthotics, pedorthics or 4 orthotic fitting nor in any written or printed circular or in 5 any business card, letterhead or sign or otherwise assume the 6 title "Prosthetist," "Orthotist," "Pedorthist" or "Orthotic 7 Fitter" nor any other title, abbreviation, name or description 8 9 implying or calculated to lead to the belief that the person is qualified to practice prosthetics, orthotics, pedorthics or 10 11 orthotic fitting. 12 Section 3. The board shall promulgate regulations to 13 implement the amendment or addition of sections 2 and 13.4 of 14 the act within 18 months of the effective date of this section. The amendment or addition of sections 2 and 13.4 of the act 15 shall not be enforceable by the State Board of Medicine until 16 17 the publication of final regulations under this section or 24 18 months following the effective date of this section, whichever 19 occurs first.

20 Section 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

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
