A RESOLUTION

1 2 3 4	Establishing a select committee to investigate and make recommendations concerning safety and security in public and nonpublic schools and institutions of higher education in this Commonwealth.
5	WHEREAS, One of a society's most important responsibilities
6	is the education of its citizens; and
7	WHEREAS, The citizens of this Commonwealth are educated
8	through a system of public and nonpublic schools and
9	institutions of higher education; and
10	WHEREAS, In order for students to learn, they must be
11	educated in a safe and secure environment; and
12	WHEREAS, In 1995, the General Assembly created the Office of
13	Safe Schools within the Department of Education to coordinate
14	antiviolence efforts between schools and the community; to

1 collect and disseminate information and strategies to assist in
2 the development of programs to impact school violence; to
3 provide training to schools, parents, law enforcement and the
4 community to prevent school violence; and to conduct other
5 efforts aimed at promoting school safety; and

WHEREAS, In 2000, the General Assembly created the position 6 of safe schools advocate in school districts of the first class 7 8 to monitor the school district's compliance with the Commonwealth's school safety laws, to receive inquiries from and 9 10 provide assistance to victims of acts of violence on school property and to conduct other efforts aimed at promoting school 11 12 safety in school districts of the first class; and 13 WHEREAS, It is important to ensure that the public and 14 nonpublic schools and institutions of higher education in this 15 Commonwealth, in conjunction with State and local law 16 enforcement agencies, are taking reasonable actions toward 17 making their facilities safe and secure for students, employees 18 and visitors; therefore be it

19 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives establish a
20 select committee to investigate, review and make recommendations
21 regarding:

(1) current security policies and procedures in public
and nonpublic schools and institutions of higher education in
this Commonwealth and ways in which school policies and
procedures could be improved;

(2) current State laws and regulations related to school
safety and security and ways in which State laws and
regulations could be strengthened, including a review of laws
and regulations related to school safety and security in
effect in other states;

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1 (3) early detection of potentially violent perpetrators, 2 including strategies that may be used by education, health 3 and other professionals to identify family, community and 4 environmental factors that may lead to potentially violent 5 behaviors; and

6 (4) any potential budgetary, revenue and governance 7 reforms necessary to address these matters;

8 and be it further

9 RESOLVED, That the Speaker of the House of Representatives 10 appoint, within 15 days of passage of this resolution, in consultation with the Majority and Minority Leaders of the House 11 of Representatives, the following members of the House of 12 13 Representatives to the select committee, with one member from each standing committee being appointed from the majority party 14 15 and one member from each standing committee being appointed from 16 the minority party:

17 two members from the Education Committee; (1)18 (2)two members from the Health Committee; 19 two members from the Local Government Committee; (3) two members from the Children and Youth Committee; 20 (4) 21 two members from the Judiciary Committee; (5) 22 (6) two members from the Veterans Affairs and Emergency 23 Preparedness Committee; and <---24 one TWO at-large member who MEMBERS FROM THE (7) <---25 MAJORITY PARTY, ONE OF WHOM shall act as chairperson of the 26 select committee; AND <---ONE AT-LARGE MEMBER FROM THE MINORITY PARTY WHO 27 (8) SHALL ACT AS VICE CHAIRPERSON OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE; 28 29 and be it further

30 RESOLVED, That the select committee hold hearings, take

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testimony and make its investigation at the places it deems
 necessary in this Commonwealth; and be it further

3 RESOLVED, That the select committee be empowered to call witnesses under the hand and seal of the chairperson and 4 instruct any person to appear before it to answer questions 5 touching matters properly being inquired into by the committee 6 7 and to produce books, papers, records, accounts, reports and 8 documents as the committee deems necessary; and be it further 9 RESOLVED, That, in addition to other witnesses the select 10 committee may call, the Office of Safe Schools in the Department of Education and the safe schools advocate in school districts 11 of the first class cooperate with the select committee by 12 13 providing testimony and producing documents and other information requested by the select committee; and be it further 14 15 RESOLVED, That the Speaker and the Majority Leader of the 16 House of Representatives provide staffing and assistance to the 17 select committee, including obtaining relevant data and other 18 research; and be it further

19 RESOLVED, That the ordinary and reasonable expenses incurred 20 by the select committee be paid from accounts under the control 21 of the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives; and be it 22 further

23 RESOLVED, That the select committee submit a report of its 24 findings together with its recommendations for any appropriate 25 legislation or other action to the House of Representatives not 26 later than September 30, 2013.

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
