A RESOLUTION

Recognizing May 25, 2014, as "National Missing Children's Day" 1 in Pennsylvania. 2 WHEREAS, Between 1979 and 1981, a series of high-profile 3 missing children cases became national headlines; and 4 5 WHEREAS, Three such cases contributed to the shock of the nation's consciousness, bringing attention to the seriousness of 6 child victimization and forever changing the response by law 7 8 enforcement agencies to reports of missing children; and 9 WHEREAS, The massive search and media attention that followed 10 the disappearance of Etan Patz in 1979 focused the nation's 11 attention on the problem of child abduction and lack of plans to 12 address it; and 13 WHEREAS, From 1979 through 1981, national media attention was 14 focused on Atlanta, Georgia, where 29 bodies of young boys and 15 girls were discovered in lakes, marshes and ponds along roadside 16 trails; and

17 WHEREAS, On July 27, 1981, 6-year-old Adam Walsh disappeared

1 from a Florida shopping mall; and

2 WHEREAS, The tragedies of these children and others exposed a 3 fundamental flaw; and

4 WHEREAS, There was no coordinated effort among Federal, state 5 and local law enforcement, no national response system in place 6 and no central resource to help searching families; and 7 WHEREAS, The momentum that began with the disappearance of 8 Etan, Adam and the 29 missing and murdered children of Atlanta, 9 Georgia, led to photographs of missing children on milk cartons 10 and, ultimately, a nationwide movement; and

11 WHEREAS, In 1983, President Ronald Reagan proclaimed May 25 12 as "National Missing Children's Day"; and

WHEREAS, "National Missing Children's Day" is a reminder to all parents and guardians of the need for high-quality photographs of their children for use in case of an emergency and for the need for everyone to pay close attention to the posters and photographs of missing children; and WHEREAS, "Take 25" is a campaign created by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children that asks families,

20 educators, law enforcement officers and trusted adults to take
21 25 minutes to talk to children about safety; and

22 WHEREAS, Created in honor of National Missing Children's Day, 23 "Take 25" helps educate communities on safety risks and ways to 24 better protect the children in their lives; and

25 WHEREAS, During the months of April and May, communities are 26 invited to join the National Center for Missing and Exploited 27 Children in this grassroots effort by promoting ongoing safety 28 conversations between children and their families; therefore be 29 it
