## A RESOLUTION

Designating the week of September 27 through October 3, 2015, as 1 "Civic Education Awareness Week" in Pennsylvania. 2 3 WHEREAS, This Commonwealth is where the Constitutional government for the United States of America began nearly 240 4 5 years ago; and 6 WHEREAS, In order to ensure that "the government of the 7 people, by the people and for the people long endures" as so 8 eloquently stated by President Abraham Lincoln at Gettysburg, it is necessary to ensure that each succeeding generation of 9 Americans understands the principles of American self-governance 10 11 and the ideals and principles on which our representative 12 democracy is based and from which its institutions derive their 13 legitimacy and power; and 14 WHEREAS, National testing shows an unfortunate ignorance among eighth grade students about civics, geography and American

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history, while at the same time national polling shows Americans
 strongly support the role of public schools in teaching young
 people how to become responsible citizens; and

WHEREAS, This Commonwealth currently requires civic education 4 in the form of social studies from kindergarten through 12th 5 6 grade, and the Department of Education is authorized to test 7 students for civic knowledge on the Keystone Exam, once the questions have been developed, making the importance of civic 8 education known in this Commonwealth and indicating the 9 10 seriousness with which the Department of Education views the 11 role of public schools in educating citizens on their rights and 12 responsibilities; and

13 WHEREAS, American adults could also benefit from civic
14 education to encourage greater civic engagement and involvement
15 in our electoral and political process; and

16 WHEREAS, Civics education and participation in 17 extracurricular activities are indicators for future civic 18 engagement and involvement in our American democracy, and high 19 quality civics education can help students learn to listen to 20 differing points of view, take greater responsibility for their 21 own role in the government of "we the people" and work toward 22 improving their own communities; therefore be it 23 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate the 24 week of September 27 through October 3, 2015, as "Civic 25 Education Awareness Week" in Pennsylvania; and be it further 26 RESOLVED, That all citizens of this Commonwealth be urged to celebrate all efforts to educate and inform American citizens 27 28 about their rights and responsibilities and the importance of 29 civic engagement.

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
