AN ACT

Amending the act of December 20, 1985 (P.L.457, No.112), 1 entitled "An act relating to the right to practice medicine 2 and surgery and the right to practice medically related acts; 3 reestablishing the State Board of Medical Education and Licensure as the State Board of Medicine and providing for 5 its composition, powers and duties; providing for the issuance of licenses and certificates and the suspension and 7 revocation of licenses and certificates; provided penalties; 8 and making repeals," further providing for definitions, for State Board of Medicine; and providing for recreational 10 therapists. 11 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 12 13 hereby enacts as follows: 14 Section 1. Section 2 of the act of December 20, 1985 15 (P.L.457, No.112), known as the Medical Practice Act of 1985, is 16 amended by adding definitions to read: Section 2. Definitions. 17 18 The following words and phrases when used in this act shall 19 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the 20 context clearly indicates otherwise: * * * 21 "Recreational therapist." An individual licensed to practice 22

- 1 <u>recreational therapy or therapeutic recreation.</u>
- 2 "Recreational therapy." A service designed to treat an
- 3 <u>individual affected by an illness or disabling condition in</u>
- 4 order to accomplish any of the following:
- 5 <u>(1) Restore, remediate or rehabilitate the individual's</u>
- 6 level of functioning and independence in play, leisure,
- 7 <u>recreation and community activities.</u>
- 8 (2) Promote health and wellness through engagement in
- 9 play, leisure, recreation and community activities.
- 10 (3) Reduce or eliminate limitations and restrictions to
- participation in play, leisure, recreation and community
- 12 <u>activities.</u>
- 13 * * *
- 14 Section 2. Section 3(a), (b) and (f) of the act, amended
- 15 July 4, 2008 (P.L.580, No.45) and December 22, 2011 (P.L.572,
- 16 No.124), are amended to read:
- 17 Section 3. State Board of Medicine.
- 18 (a) Establishment.--The State Board of Medicine shall
- 19 consist of the commissioner or his designee, the Secretary of
- 20 Health or his designee, two members appointed by the Governor
- 21 who shall be persons representing the public at large and seven
- 22 members appointed by the Governor, six of whom shall be medical
- 23 doctors with unrestricted licenses to practice medicine and
- 24 surgery in this Commonwealth for five years immediately
- 25 preceding their appointment and one who shall be a nurse
- 26 midwife, physician assistant, certified registered nurse
- 27 practitioner, respiratory therapist, licensed athletic trainer
- 28 [or] perfusionist or recreational therapist licensed or
- 29 certified under the laws of this Commonwealth. All professional
- 30 and public members of the board shall be appointed by the

- 1 Governor, with the advice and consent of a majority of the
- 2 members elected to the Senate.
- 3 (b) Terms of office. -- The term of each professional and
- 4 public member of the board shall be four years or until his or
- 5 her successor has been appointed and qualified, but not longer
- 6 than six months beyond the four-year period. In the event that
- 7 any of said members shall die or resign or otherwise become
- 8 disqualified during his or her term, a successor shall be
- 9 appointed in the same way and with the same qualifications and
- 10 shall hold office for the unexpired term. No member shall be
- 11 eligible for appointment to serve more than two consecutive
- 12 terms. The Governor shall assure that nurse midwives, physician
- 13 assistants, certified registered nurse practitioners,
- 14 perfusionists [and], respiratory therapists, athletic trainers
- 15 and recreational therapist are appointed to four-year terms on a
- 16 rotating basis so that, of every four appointments to a four-
- 17 year term, one is a nurse midwife, one is a physician assistant,
- 18 one is a certified registered nurse practitioner and one is a
- 19 respiratory therapist.

- 21 [(f) Sunset.--The board is subject to evaluation, review and
- 22 termination in the manner provided in the act of December 22,
- 23 1981 (P.L.508, No.142), known as the Sunset Act.]

- 25 Section 3. The act is amended by adding a section to read:
- 26 Section 13.6. Recreational therapist.
- 27 <u>(a) Licensure qualifications.--To be eligible to apply for</u>
- 28 <u>licensure as a recreational therapist, an applicant must fulfill</u>
- 29 the following requirements:
- 30 <u>(1) Be at least 18 years of age.</u>

Τ	(2) Be of good moral character.
2	(3) Complete a bachelor level program or higher in
3	recreational therapy or therapeutic recreation, or a bachelor
4	level program or higher in a related field which includes
5	courses pertaining to recreational therapy or therapeutic
6	recreation as required for certification by the National
7	Council for Therapeutic Recreation Certification.
8	(4) Submit a completed application and fee as required
9	by the board by regulation.
10	(5) Complete all certification requirements for and
11	maintain certification by the National Council for
12	Therapeutic Recreation Certification.
13	(6) Not be addicted to alcohol, narcotics or other
14	habit-forming drugs.
15	(7) Have not been convicted of a felony under the act of
16	April 14, 1972 (P.L.233, No.64), known as The Controlled
17	Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act, or of an offense
18	under the laws of another jurisdiction which, if committed in
19	this Commonwealth, would be a felony under The Controlled
20	Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act, unless the
21	<pre>following apply:</pre>
22	(i) Ten years have elapsed from the date of
23	conviction.
24	(ii) The applicant satisfactorily demonstrates to
25	the board that the applicant has made significant
26	progress in personal rehabilitation since the conviction
27	and the licensure of the applicant is not expected to
28	created a substantial risk of harm to the health and
29	safety of the applicant's clients or the public or a
30	substantial risk of further criminal violations.

- 1 (iii) The applicant otherwise satisfies the
- 2 <u>qualifications required under this act.</u>
- 3 (b) Current professionals.--It shall be unlawful four years
- 4 after the effective date of this section for any person to
- 5 practice or indicate an ability to practice recreational therapy
- 6 <u>unless licensed under this act.</u>
- 7 (c) Duration of license. -- A recreational therapist license
- 8 <u>issued under this section shall be valid for a period of two</u>
- 9 years and shall be nontransferable.
- 10 (d) Title and practice protection. -- No person may practice
- 11 or hold himself out as being able to practice recreational
- 12 therapy, use the term "recreational therapist," licensed
- 13 recreational therapist," the initials "CTRS/L" or other similar
- 14 terms or provide recreational therapy services in this
- 15 Commonwealth without being licensed under this act to do so.
- 16 (e) Recreational therapy services. -- The techniques used by
- 17 recreational therapists to treat individuals include all of the
- 18 <u>following:</u>
- 19 (1) Conducting an individualized assessment for the
- 20 purpose of collecting systematic, comprehensive and accurate
- 21 data necessary to determine the course of action and
- 22 <u>subsequent individualized treatment plan.</u>
- 23 (2) Planning and developing an individualized
- 24 recreational therapy treatment plan that identifies an
- 25 <u>individual's goals, objectives and potential treatment</u>
- 26 intervention strategies for play, recreation, leisure and
- 27 <u>community activities.</u>
- 28 (3) Implementing an individualized recreational therapy
- 29 treatment plan that is consistent with the overall treatment
- 30 plan.

Τ	(4) Systematically evaluating and comparing the
2	individual's response to the individualized recreational
3	therapy treatment plan and making modifications as
4	appropriate.
5	(5) Developing a discharge plan in collaboration with
6	the individual and the individual's family, treatment team
7	and other identified support networks where appropriate.
8	(6) Identifying and training in the use of adaptive
9	play, recreation and leisure equipment.
LO	(7) Identifying, providing and educating individuals to
L1	use play, recreation, leisure and community resources that
L2	support a healthy, active and engaged life.
L3	(8) Providing leisure education and counseling to
L 4	address issues that hinder health and engagement in play,
. 5	recreation, leisure and community activities.
. 6	(9) Providing community integration, reintegration,
.7	inclusion and transitioning services to maximize health and
.8	participation in play, recreation, leisure and community
.9	activities.
0	(10) Addressing functional skill recovery, development
1	or maintenance related to health and participation in play,
2	recreation, leisure and community activities and utilizing
3	play, recreation, leisure and community activities as
4	modalities to advance health and functioning.
5	(11) Assisting individuals in constructing a healthy
6	leisure lifestyle that supports continued recovery, health
7	promotion and quality of life.
8	(12) Providing play, recreation, leisure and community
9	opportunities for individuals with illness, disability or
30	challenges for therapeutic purposes.

1	(13) Minimizing personal and environmental contextual
2	barriers and maximizing personal and environmental contextual
3	facilitators to enhance health and participation in play,
4	recreation, leisure and community activities.
5	(14) Collaborating with and educating the individual,
6	family, caregiver and others to foster an environment that is
7	responsive to the health, play, recreation, leisure and
8	community engagement needs of the individual.
9	(15) Consulting with groups, programs, organizations or
10	communities to improve physical, social and programmatic
11	accessibility in play, recreation, leisure and community
12	activities.
13	(f) License renewal A licensee is eligible for biennial
14	renewal of a recreational therapist license if the following
15	<pre>requirements are met:</pre>
16	(1) A completed application and fee as established by
17	regulation of the board are submitted to the board.
18	(2) Continuing education requirements as established by
19	the board have been completed.
20	(3) The applicant holds current certification as a
21	therapeutic recreational specialist by the National Council
22	for Therapeutic Recreation Certification.
23	(4) Any other requirements are met as established by the
24	board.
25	(g) Referrals
26	(1) Consultation and evaluation by a recreational
27	therapist may be performed without a referral.
28	(2) Recreational therapy services provided to
29	individuals with medically related conditions shall be based
30	on a referral from a qualified health care professional who,

1	within the scope of the professional's licensure, is
2	authorized to make referrals for health care services.
3	(3) A referral shall not be required for recreational
4	therapy services related to prevention, wellness, education,
5	adaptive sports and recreation.
6	(h) Construction Nothing in this section shall be
7	<pre>construed to:</pre>
8	(1) Prohibit an individual currently holding a
9	professional license from practicing within the applicable
10	scope of practice for that individual's professional license.
11	(2) Prohibit students enrolled in a recreational therapy
12	related course of study from performing recreational therapy
13	that is incidental to their course of study or required
14	supervised work relating to their course of study.
15	(3) Prohibit an individual practicing as a music
16	therapist from providing music therapy services.
17	(4) Prohibit an individual employed by the Federal
18	Government to provide recreational therapy service while in
19	the discharge of the person's official duties.
20	Section 4. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
