A RESOLUTION

1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9	Urging the Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the President of the United States and the Secretary of the United States Department of Homeland Security to discontinue the resettlement of Syrian refugees in this Commonwealth until such time as systems are in place to conduct effective and thorough security and background checks on Syrian refugees and to send a report detailing the increased measures to the states that are under consideration to receive Syrian refugees.
10	WHEREAS, In order to address the migrant crisis in Syria, the
11	Federal Government has indicated that the United States will
12	accept at least 10,000 Syrian refugees during fiscal year 2016;
13	and
14	WHEREAS, This Commonwealth has an abundant and successful
15	history of embracing immigrants; and
16	WHEREAS, The most important responsibility of government is
17	to protect the safety and security of its residents; and
18	WHEREAS, On November 13, 2015, coordinated terror attacks
19	were carried out in Paris, France, killing at least 129 people
20	and injuring more than 350 people; and

- 1 WHEREAS, On November 14, 2015, the Islamic State (ISIS), a
- 2 deadly terrorist organization based in Ragga, Syria, claimed
- 3 responsibility for the attacks and pledged further attacks
- 4 worldwide; and
- 5 WHEREAS, French police discovered a Syrian passport belonging
- 6 to a Syrian asylum seeker who entered Europe through Greece near
- 7 the body of a suicide bomber; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Despite our sympathy for the plight of innocent
- 9 Syrians trying to escape the horrors of their war-torn region,
- 10 this raises concerns that the security vetting procedures used
- 11 in addressing the Syrian migrant crisis are completely
- 12 inadequate; and
- WHEREAS, On February 11, 2015, Francis X. Taylor, Under
- 14 Secretary for Intelligence and Analysis for the United States
- 15 Department of Homeland Security, stated, "We are concerned about
- 16 any group of people coming to the United States who may be
- 17 coming to the United States for nefarious purposes"; and
- 18 WHEREAS, Under Secretary Taylor also testified that officials
- 19 "want to make sure that if we are asked to vet individuals from
- 20 any part of the world to come to the United States, that we have
- 21 applied the most rigorous screening that's available within the
- 22 U.S. government"; and
- 23 WHEREAS, On February 11, 2015, Nicholas J. Rasmussen,
- 24 Director of the National Counterterrorism Center, testified in
- 25 front of the United States House of Representatives' Committee
- 26 on Homeland Security that Syrian refugees are
- clearly a population of concern and, as Under Secretary
- Taylor said, what we want to be able to do is apply the
- 29 full weight of U.S. intelligence community holdings to
- 30 the vetting and screening process so that we can unearth

- any information that we may have in our holdings that
- 2 gives us concern about particular individuals;
- 3 and
- WHEREAS, On February 11, 2015, Michael B. Steinbach,
- 5 Assistant Director, Counterterrorism Division, Federal Bureau of
- 6 Investigation, United States Department of Justice, testified in
- 7 front of the United States House of Representatives' Committee
- 8 on Homeland Security that
- 9 You have to have information to vet, so the concern in
- 10 Syria is that we don't have systems in place on the
- 11 ground to collect the information to vet. That would be
- 12 the concern we would be vetting--databases don't hold the
- information on those individuals, and that is the
- 14 concern;
- 15 and
- 16 WHEREAS, Pennsylvanians recognize the desperate plight of the
- 17 hundreds of thousands of refugees and want to aid those who are
- 18 fleeing war and terror, however, at the same time, increased
- 19 security measures are necessary following the recent terror
- 20 attacks in order to protect the security, safety and basic
- 21 freedoms of the residents of this Commonwealth; therefore be it
- 22 RESOLVED, That the Senate of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 23 urge the Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the
- 24 President of the United States and the Secretary of the United
- 25 States Department of Homeland Security to discontinue the
- 26 resettlement of Syrian refugees in this Commonwealth until such
- 27 time as systems are in place to conduct effective and thorough
- 28 security and background checks on Syrian refugees and to send a
- 29 report detailing the increased measures to the states that are
- 30 under consideration to receive Syrian refugees; and be it
