## A RESOLUTION

- Recognizing the week of April 22 through 29, 2017, as "National Infant Immunization Week" in Pennsylvania. 2
- WHEREAS, Since 1994, the Centers for Disease Control and 3
- Prevention (CDC), state and local health departments, national
- 5 immunization partners, health care professionals and public
- officials have observed "National Infant Immunization Week" to 6
- 7 highlight the importance of vaccinations and call attention to
- 8 achievements in immunizations; and
- WHEREAS, Immunizations are among the most successful and
- cost-effective public health interventions for preventing 10
- disease and death in our communities; and 11
- 12 WHEREAS, According to the CDC, routine childhood
- 13 immunizations in one birth cohort prevents approximately 20
- 14 million cases of infectious disease and approximately 42,000
- deaths, saving \$13.5 billion in direct costs; and 15
- 16 WHEREAS, Immunizations reduce the risk of infection and life-

- 1 threatening diseases by working with the body's natural defenses
- 2 to safely develop immunity to diseases; and
- 3 WHEREAS, In 2014, the CDC reported that, among children born
- 4 between 1994 and 2013, vaccinations are expected to prevent an
- 5 estimated 322 million illnesses, 21 million hospitalizations and
- 6 732,000 deaths over the course of their lifetime; and
- 7 WHEREAS, Despite achievements in immunization, the United
- 8 States Department of Health and Human Services reports that
- 9 approximately 300 children die annually from vaccine-preventable
- 10 diseases; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Vaccine-preventable diseases, such as measles,
- 12 continue to appear in the United States and internationally,
- 13 making continued vaccination necessary to protect our
- 14 communities and public health; and
- 15 WHEREAS, Infants are particularly susceptible to infectious
- 16 diseases; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Vaccinations are designed to provide immunity before
- 18 exposure to life-threatening diseases occurs; and
- 19 WHEREAS, An estimated 12,000 babies are born in the United
- 20 States each day, and they need to be immunized before two years
- 21 of age to protect against 14 serious diseases, including, but
- 22 not limited to, diphtheria, influenza, measles, mumps, pertussis
- 23 (whooping cough), polio, rubella and varicella (chickenpox); and
- 24 WHEREAS, The immunization of infants and children, based on
- 25 the childhood immunization schedule recommended by the CDC, is
- 26 essential in providing the best protection to children;
- 27 therefore be it
- 28 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the
- 29 week of April 22 through 29, 2017, as "National Infant
- 30 Immunization Week" in Pennsylvania; and be it further

- 1 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives encourage
- 2 parents, caregivers and health care professionals in this
- 3 Commonwealth to participate in educational and media events to
- 4 increase the awareness of the importance of immunizing children.
