A RESOLUTION

- Designating the month of May 2017 as "Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) is better known
- 4 as Lou Gehrig's disease; and
- 5 WHEREAS, ALS is a fatal neurodegenerative disease
- 6 characterized by degeneration of cell bodies of the lower motor
- 7 neurons in the gray matter of the anterior horn of the spinal
- 8 cord; and
- 9 WHEREAS, The initial symptom of ALS is weakness of the
- 10 skeletal muscles, especially those of the extremities; and
- 11 WHEREAS, As ALS progresses, the patient experiences
- 12 difficulty in swallowing, talking and breathing; and
- 13 WHEREAS, ALS eventually causes muscles to atrophy, and the

- 1 patient becomes a functional quadriplegic; and
- 2 WHEREAS, ALS does not affect a patient's mental capacity,
- 3 leaving the patient alert and aware of their loss of motor
- 4 functions and the inevitable outcome of continued deterioration
- 5 and death; and
- 6 WHEREAS, ALS occurs in adulthood, most commonly between 40
- 7 and 70 years of age, with the greatest age for risk being
- 8 approximately 55 years of age; and
- 9 WHEREAS, ALS affects men two to three times more often than
- 10 women; and
- 11 WHEREAS, More than 5,000 new ALS patients are diagnosed
- 12 annually; and
- 13 WHEREAS, On average, patients diagnosed with ALS only survive
- 14 two to five years from the time of diagnosis; and
- 15 WHEREAS, ALS has no known cause, prevention or cure; and
- 16 WHEREAS, "Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness Month"
- 17 increases the public's awareness of ALS patients' circumstances
- 18 and acknowledges the terrible impact this disease has on the
- 19 patient and their family and recognizes the research being done
- 20 to eradicate this horrible disease; therefore be it
- 21 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate the
- 22 month of May 2017 as "Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness
- 23 Month" in Pennsylvania.
