Amending Titles 35 (Health and Safety) and 75 (Vehicles) of the 1 Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, providing for emergency 2 responder mental wellness and stress management; establishing 3 the Statewide Critical Incident Stress Management Program; 4 providing for duties of the Secretary of Health and the 5 Department of Health; in emergency medical services system, further providing for support of emergency medical services; 6 7 in operation of vehicles general provisions, further 8 providing for EMS costs; and, in driving after imbibing 9 alcohol or utilizing drugs, further providing for Accelerated 10 Rehabilitative Disposition. 11 12 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 13 hereby enacts as follows: 14 Section 1. 12	Commission. Required initial and continuing education for
13	<u>emergency responders shall include trauma awareness training as</u>
14	established, as applicable, by the department and cooperating
15	officials and agencies.
16	(b) Training topics. Trauma awareness training shall
17	include education on stress management, critical incidents,
18	signs and symptoms of posttraumatic stress injury, vicarious
19	trauma, substance abuse and addiction, warning signs of
20	depression and suicide and any other topics as determined by the
21	department. The training shall also include the availability of
22	<u>resources under this chapter.</u>

28	investigation before any governmental agency.
29	(b) Coparticipants. Except as provided under subsection
30	(c), a coparticipant who is present during the offering of

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1	trained peer support services may not be compelled or allowed,
2	without the consent of the affected emergency responder, to
3	disclose any communication made during the offering of the
4	services in a legal proceeding, trial or investigation before a
5	governmental agency.
6	(c) Exceptions. The privilege established under subsections
7	(a) and (b) shall not apply if any of the following apply:
8	(1) The communication indicates clear and present danger
9	to the emergency responder who received trained peer support
10	services or helpline assistance or to other individuals.
11	(2) The emergency responder who received trained peer
12	support services or helpline assistance gives express consent
13	to the disclosure.

15	support services or helpline assistance is deceased and the
