AN ACT

- Amending Title 35 (Health and Safety) of the Pennsylvania
 Consolidated Statutes, providing for long-term infectious
- 3 disease control.
- 4 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 5 hereby enacts as follows:
- 6 Section 1. Title 35 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated
- 7 Statutes is amended by adding a chapter to read:

- 15 § 5901. Definitions.
- The following words and phrases when used in this chapter
- 17 shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless

- 1 context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 2 "Commission." The Infectious Disease Advisory Commission
- 3 established under section 5902(h) (relating to response to
- 4 <u>emergency</u>).
- 5 "Department." The Department of Health of the Commonwealth.
- 6 "Disaster emergency." A declaration by the Governor of
- 7 <u>disaster emergency under section 7301(c) (relating to general</u>
- 8 <u>authority of Governor) relating to public health.</u>
- 9 <u>"Facility." Any of the following:</u>
- 10 (1) A domiciliary care as defined in section 2202-A of
- 11 <u>the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.177, No.175), known as The</u>
- 12 <u>Administrative Code of 1929.</u>
- 13 (2) A personal care home as defined in section 1001 of
- the act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31, No.21), known as the Human
- 15 <u>Services Code</u>.
- 16 <u>(3) An assisted living residence as defined in section</u>
- 17 1001 of the Human Services Code.
- 18 (4) Any of the following entities as defined in section
- 19 802.1 of the act of July 19, 1979 (P.L.130, No.48), known as
- 20 <u>the Health Care Facilities Act:</u>
- 21 (i) Home care agency.
- 22 <u>(ii) Home care registry.</u>
- 23 <u>(iii) Home health care agency.</u>
- 24 <u>(iv) Hospice.</u>
- 25 <u>(v) Long-term care nursing facility.</u>
- 26 <u>(5) An older adult daily living center as defined in</u>
- 27 <u>section 2 of the act of July 11, 1990 (P.L.499, No.118),</u>
- 28 known as the Older Adult Daily Living Centers Licensing Act.
- 29 <u>(6) A PACE provider as defined in section 1894 of the</u>
- 30 Social Security Act (49 Stat. 620, 42 U.S.C. § 301 et seq.).

- 1 (7) Any other public or private organization, entity or
- 2 part of a private organization or entity, that uses public
- funds and is paid, in part, to provide care to care-dependent
- 4 individuals.
- 5 <u>"Infectious disease coordinator." An employee of the</u>
- 6 <u>facility designated to implement the infectious disease plan</u>
- 7 required under section 5904 (relating to facilities).
- 8 "Organization." An organization that supplies or
- 9 <u>manufactures personal protective equipment.</u>
- 10 "Personal protective equipment" or "PPE." Gloves, hand
- 11 <u>sanitizer</u>, <u>respirators</u>, <u>face masks</u>, <u>gowns</u>, <u>face shields and</u>
- 12 other protective equipment designed to be worn or used by
- 13 <u>individuals to prevent or contain contact with, or to prevent</u>
- 14 transmission of, a communicable illness or the pathogens that
- 15 cause communicable illness.
- 16 <u>"Plan" or "infectious disease plan." The infectious disease</u>
- 17 plan required under section 5904(a).
- 18 <u>"PPE stockpile" or "stockpile."</u> The PPE stockpile
- 19 established under section 5902(b).
- 20 "Recipient." An individual who receives care, services or
- 21 <u>treatment in or from a facility.</u>
- 22 "Relative." An individual who is related within the fifth
- 23 <u>degree of consanguinity or affinity to a recipient in a</u>
- 24 facility.
- 25 § 5902. Response to emergency.
- 26 (a) Selection of organization. -- The Governor, or the
- 27 Governor's designee, shall select an organization, by
- 28 competitive bid, for successive terms of five years each to
- 29 oversee the procurement, manufacturing and distribution of PPE
- 30 in this Commonwealth.

- 1 (b) Duties of selected organization. -- The organization
- 2 <u>selected under subsection (a) shall perform the following</u>
- 3 duties:
- 4 (1) Purchase and keep up-to-date a stockpile of PPE to
- 5 <u>be used by a facility in the event of a disaster emergency in</u>
- 6 <u>accordance with subsection (c).</u>
- 7 (2) Select three manufacturers of PPE from which the
- 8 <u>organization shall procure PPE.</u>
- 9 (3) Contract with manufacturers of PPE to provide PPE to
- facilities within this Commonwealth and supply the PPE
- 11 <u>stockpile under paragraph (4). A manufacturer must be</u>
- domiciled and manufacture PPE in this Commonwealth in order
- to be eligible for a contract under this paragraph.
- 14 (4) Determine four locations within this Commonwealth to
- 15 <u>store PPE as follows:</u>
- (i) One-fourth of the stockpile shall be located in
- 17 the northwest area of this Commonwealth.
- 18 (ii) One-fourth of the stockpile shall be located in
- 19 the northeast area of this Commonwealth.
- 20 (iii) One-fourth of the stockpile shall be located
- in the southwest area of this Commonwealth.
- 22 (iv) One-fourth of the stockpile shall be located in
- 23 the southeast area of this Commonwealth.
- 24 (c) Required amount of PPE.--The amount of PPE stored in the
- 25 stockpile shall be determined by the Governor, or the Governor's
- 26 designee, the first year. For each subsequent year, the PPE
- 27 <u>stored in the stockpile shall equal the amount of PPE purchased</u>
- 28 the previous year at a minimum, but may not be more than
- 29 <u>quadruple the volume.</u>
- 30 (d) Funding of stockpile. -- The stockpile shall be funded by

- 1 a 50% fee on purchased PPE until the required amount of PPE
- 2 stored in the stockpile under subsection (c) is met. For
- 3 subsequent PPE stored in the stockpile, the fee shall be reduced
- 4 to 7% to fund the stockpile operations. Facilities shall
- 5 purchase all PPE from the organization. The amount that each
- 6 <u>facility purchases is the amount that will be available to the</u>
- 7 <u>facility during a disaster emergency.</u>
- 8 (e) Access to PPE.--A facility may access the stockpile to
- 9 obtain the PPE purchased by the facility for the stockpile
- 10 during a disaster emergency.
- 11 (f) Testing. -- The following shall apply:
- 12 (1) The Governor shall require the testing of recipients
- and employees of a facility during a disaster emergency. If a
- 14 <u>test to identify a virus or communicable disease causing the</u>
- disaster emergency is available, the Governor, in
- 16 <u>consultation with the Secretary of Health, shall order the</u>
- 17 testing for recipients and employees at each facility to
- 18 gather baseline data within the facilities. At a minimum, the
- 19 testing shall be completed in:
- 20 (i) the most cost-effective manner available; and
- 21 <u>(ii) laboratories capable of returning the results</u>
- 22 electronically within 24 hours after receiving the
- sample.
- 24 (2) The Governor shall provide funding to at least three
- 25 <u>laboratories located within this Commonwealth permitted to</u>
- 26 perform the testing required under paragraph (1).
- 27 (3) Upon collecting the baseline data under paragraph
- 28 (1), the department, in consultation with the Department of
- Human Services, shall create a system to randomly test a
- 30 subset of recipients, employees and visitors at each

1	<u>facility.</u>
2	(4) If an at-home test kit for individual use to
3	identify a virus or communicable disease causing the disaster
4	emergency is available, the Governor, in consultation with
5	the department, the Department of Human Services and
6	Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency, shall develop a
7	distribution method to prioritize distribution of the test to
8	visitors of a relative in a facility.
9	(g) Vaccine distribution If a vaccination to cure, prevent
10	or otherwise provide acquired immunity against a communicable
11	disease that is the cause of the disaster emergency is
12	developed, the Governor shall prioritize vaccine distribution to
13	employees, recipients and employees in facilities.
14	(h) Infectious Disease Advisory Commission The following
15	<pre>shall apply:</pre>
16	(1) The Governor shall establish the Infectious Disease
17	Advisory Commission.
18	(2) The commission shall be composed of the following
19	<pre>members:</pre>
20	(i) Six members knowledgeable and experienced in
21	issues relating to operations in facilities as follows:
22	(A) Three members of the Senate, appointed by
23	the President pro tempore of the Senate, in
24	consultation with the Majority Leader of the Senate
25	and the Minority Leader of the Senate.
26	(B) Three members of the House of
27	Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the
28	House of Representatives, in consultation with the
29	Majority Leader of the House of Representatives and
30	the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives.

Τ.	(11) Three Members appointed by the Governor as
2	<u>follows:</u>
3	(A) One member shall be a member of the general
4	public.
5	(B) One member shall be a member of an
6	organization who is directly involved in managing a
7	facility.
8	(C) One member shall be a member of an advocacy
9	or services organization who is directly involved in
10	providing services to older adults.
11	(iii) The Secretary of Health, or a designee.
12	(iv) The Secretary of Human Services, or a designee.
13	(v) The Secretary of Aging, or a designee.
14	(3) The commission shall meet as necessary, but no fewer
15	than three times within the first 90 days of the disaster
16	emergency.
17	(4) The commission shall be responsible for examining
18	and analyzing the practices, processes and procedures
19	relating to the prevention of and response to infectious
20	diseases in facilities.
21	(5) The commission shall develop best practices on
22	disease prevention, education, training requirements and any
23	other operations that may be altered for facilities during a
24	disaster emergency.
25	(i) Civilian volunteer corps The Governor shall establish
26	a civilian volunteer corps to be utilized to assist facilities
27	during a disaster emergency. The Governor, in consultation with
28	the department and the Department of Human Services, shall
29	promulgate regulations to create training requirements as
30	necessary for volunteers participating in the civilian volunteer

- 2 § 5903. Inspection and review.
- 3 (a) Inspections and surveys. -- The department, in
- 4 consultation with the Department of Human Services, shall:
- 5 (1) Review and align all facility inspections and
- 6 surveys conducted by each department with best practices for
- 7 reducing the spread of infectious diseases.
- 8 (2) Determine the priority order for inspecting or
- 9 <u>surveying facilities during an infectious disease outbreak.</u>
- 10 (3) Determine a list of protocols for inspection and
- 11 intervention.
- 12 <u>(b) Regulation review.--The Governor shall submit a report</u>
- 13 to the General Assembly reviewing all regulations for
- 14 <u>facilities. The report shall include, but not be limited to, the</u>
- 15 following:
- 16 (1) An outline of the regulations for facilities.
- 17 (2) A comparison of the regulations for facilities that
- 18 existed prior to a declaration of a disaster emergency and
- 19 any regulations that were suspended or altered during the
- 20 <u>state of disaster emergency.</u>
- 21 (3) An executive summary of the differences between the
- 22 regulations for facilities as determined under paragraph (2).
- 23 <u>(c) Data reporting.--The department, in consultation with</u>
- 24 the Department of Human Services, shall develop a single
- 25 reporting system for facilities to submit new cases and
- 26 information that the department determines necessary during a
- 27 disaster emergency.
- 28 (d) Living wills and end-of-life guidelines.--The
- 29 department, in consultation with the Department of Human
- 30 Services, shall determine how many individuals died due to

- 1 complications related to COVID-19 during the proclamation of
- 2 <u>disaster emergency issued by the Governor on March 6, 2020,</u>
- 3 published at 50 Pa.B. 1644 (March 21, 2020), or any renewal of
- 4 the state of disaster emergency, and had a living will with a
- 5 <u>do-not-resuscitate or similar order. This report shall be</u>
- 6 <u>submitted to the General Assembly.</u>
- 7 (e) Sample infectious disease plan. -- The department, in
- 8 <u>consultation with the Department of Human Services, shall</u>
- 9 <u>develop and make available on the department's publicly</u>
- 10 accessible Internet website a sample infectious disease plan for
- 11 <u>a facility to implement. The model infectious disease plan shall</u>
- 12 fulfill the requirement under section 5904(a) (relating to
- 13 <u>facilities</u>). At a minimum, the infectious disease plan shall
- 14 include:
- 15 (1) The data reporting requirements under subsection
- 16 <u>(c)</u>.
- 17 (2) A mechanism for complaints or feedback regarding the
- 18 <u>infectious disease plan.</u>
- 19 (3) A method to obtain a one-year supply of PPE from the
- organization under section 5902(a) (relating to response to
- 21 <u>emergency</u>).
- 22 (4) A method to cohort recipients within the facility.
- 23 (5) A method to screen each employee before the
- 24 employee's shift begins.
- 25 <u>(6) A schedule that assigns staff to certain areas of</u>
- 26 the facility.
- 27 <u>(7) A notification system to alert relatives of</u>
- 28 recipients in the facility of the measures the facility is
- 29 taking to prevent and respond to the communicable disease or
- 30 virus.

- 1 § 5904. Facilities.
- 2 (a) Infectious disease plan. -- Each facility shall develop an
- 3 infectious disease plan to implement upon the declaration of a
- 4 <u>disaster emergency</u>. At a minimum, the infectious disease plan
- 5 shall include the requirements listed under section 5903(e)
- 6 (relating to inspection and review). Nothing in this subsection
- 7 <u>shall be construed to prevent a facility from taking additional</u>
- 8 measures to prevent and respond to an infectious or communicable
- 9 <u>disease during a disaster emergency.</u>
- 10 (b) Infectious disease coordinator. -- Each facility shall
- 11 <u>designate an employee to serve as the infectious disease</u>
- 12 coordinator within the facility during a disaster emergency to
- 13 <u>ensure that the infectious disease plan requirements under</u>
- 14 <u>subsection (a) are met.</u>
- 15 (c) Staffing requirements. -- Notwithstanding any other law to
- 16 the contrary, facility staffing requirements during a disaster
- 17 emergency shall be as follows:
- 18 (1) The total number of hours of general nursing care
- 19 provided in each 24-hour period at a health care facility
- shall, when totaled for the entire health care facility, be a
- 21 <u>minimum of two and seven tenths hours of direct recipient</u>
- 22 <u>care for each recipient.</u>
- 23 (2) The total number of hours of assisted living
- 24 services in each 24-hour period at an assisted living
- 25 <u>residence shall, when totaled for the entire assisted living</u>
- facility, be a minimum of one hour per day of assisted living
- 27 <u>services to each mobile recipient and be a minimum of two</u>
- hours per day of assisted living services to each recipient
- 29 who has mobility needs.
- 30 (3) The total number of hours of personal care services

- 1 <u>in each 24-hour period at a personal care residence shall,</u>
- 2 <u>when totaled for the entire personal care home, be a minimum</u>
- 3 of one hour per day of personal care services to each mobile
- 4 <u>recipient and be a minimum of two hours per day of personal</u>
- 5 <u>care services to each recipient who has mobility needs.</u>
- 6 (d) Inability to meet requirements. -- The following shall
- 7 apply if a facility is not able to meet the staffing
- 8 requirements of subsection (c):
- 9 (1) The facility shall report the facility's inability
- 10 to meet the staffing requirements to the department.
- 11 (2) The Governor shall deploy the Pennsylvania National
- 12 Guard to aid the facility, implement components of the
- 13 <u>infectious disease plan and train staff on appropriate</u>
- 14 <u>protocols.</u>
- 15 (e) Limitation of liability. -- A facility shall not be
- 16 <u>subject to civil liability for a medical professional liability</u>
- 17 claim arising out of an act or omission made in good faith
- 18 compliance with any order, directive or other quidance issued by
- 19 the Governor, the Secretary of Health or the Secretary of Human
- 20 Services in response to the proclamation of disaster emergency
- 21 issued by the Governor on March 6, 2020, published at 50 Pa.B.
- 22 1644 (March 21, 2020), or any renewal of the state of disaster
- 23 emergency.
- 24 (f) Nonliability. -- This section shall not be construed as
- 25 establishing any liability.
- 26 (q) Nonapplication. -- This section shall not apply to any
- 27 criminal act or to an injury or death to an individual that
- 28 results from an act or omission of the individual constituting
- 29 recklessness or intentional conduct.
- 30 (h) Definitions.--As used in this section, the following

- 1 words and phrases shall have the meanings given to them in this
- 2 subsection unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 3 "Assisted living residence." As defined in section 1001 of
- 4 the act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31, No.21), known as the Human
- 5 Services Code.
- 6 <u>"Health care facility." Any of the following entities as</u>
- 7 defined in section 802.1 of the act of July 19, 1979 (P.L.130,
- 8 No.48), known as the Health Care Facilities Act:
- 9 <u>(1) Home care agency.</u>
- 10 (2) Home care registry.
- 11 <u>(3) Home health care agency.</u>
- 12 <u>(4) Hospice.</u>
- 13 <u>(5) Long-term care nursing facility.</u>
- "Personal care home." As defined in section 1001 of the
- 15 Human Services Code.
- 16 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
