INTRODUCED AS NONCONTROVERSIAL RESOLUTION UNDER RULE 35, MAY 8, 2019

A RESOLUTION

- Recognizing the 10th anniversary of the Pennsylvania Innocence Project and its efforts to free the convicted innocent.
- 3 WHEREAS, Since the Pennsylvania Innocence Project opened its
- 4 doors in 2009, it has focused on identifying and exonerating
- 5 those convicted of crimes they did not commit; and
- 6 WHEREAS, In that time, the Pennsylvania Innocence Project
- 7 office has grown from two paid staff members to nine and
- 8 expanded from a single office with Temple University's Beasley
- 9 School of Law to an additional office at Duquesne University
- 10 School of Law in Pittsburgh; and
- 11 WHEREAS, By engaging hundreds of lawyers, law students,
- 12 undergraduate students and community members all over this
- 13 Commonwealth, this Statewide organization has reversed 14
- 14 wrongful convictions; and
- 15 WHEREAS, In doing so, Pennsylvania Innocence Project staff
- 16 and volunteers have prevented their clients, who have so far

- 1 served a combined total of 415 years in prison, from spending
- 2 another minute locked away from their lives and society for
- 3 crimes they did not commit; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Pennsylvania Innocence Project staff and pro bono
- 5 partners are currently litigating more than 22 cases for
- 6 individuals who have strong claims of innocence all over this
- 7 Commonwealth; and
- 8 WHEREAS, The Pennsylvania Innocence Project also works toward
- 9 criminal justice reform by educating stakeholders on the reasons
- 10 for wrongful convictions; and
- 11 WHEREAS, According to the Pennsylvania Innocence Project,
- 12 factors leading to wrongful convictions include eyewitness
- 13 misidentifications (72% of all exonerations), unvalidated and
- 14 improper forensic evidence (50% of all cases), false
- 15 "confessions" and incriminating statements (25% of all cases)
- 16 and false informant or incentivized witness testimony (19% of
- 17 all cases); and
- WHEREAS, As a result of wrongful convictions, nationwide 82
- 19 sexual assaults and 35 murders were committed by true
- 20 perpetrators while the innocent individuals remained in jail;
- 21 and
- 22 WHEREAS, To prevent this, the Pennsylvania Innocence Project
- 23 works directly with law enforcement agencies to encourage
- 24 training in and adoption of best practices for eyewitness
- 25 identification and suspect interrogation recording procedures;
- 26 and
- 27 WHEREAS, The Pennsylvania Innocence Project also provides
- 28 support, training and guidance to lawyers litigating
- 29 postconviction claims of innocence; and
- 30 WHEREAS, The Pennsylvania Innocence Project seeks to prepare

- 1 tomorrow's criminal justice professionals by providing clinical
- 2 training and experience to students in the fields of law,
- 3 journalism, criminal justice and forensic science; and
- 4 WHEREAS, The Pennsylvania Innocence Project has also
- 5 established programs in law schools throughout this
- 6 Commonwealth, including the Temple University Beasley School of
- 7 Law, Villanova University Charles Widger School of Law, Drexel
- 8 University Thomas R. Kline School of Law, University of
- 9 Pennsylvania Law School, Penn State Law School, Penn State
- 10 Dickinson Law School, University of Pittsburgh School of Law and
- 11 Duquesne University School of Law; and
- 12 WHEREAS, In addition to collaborating with today's
- 13 stakeholders and educating tomorrow's, the Pennsylvania
- 14 Innocence Project allows convicted individuals a fair chance of
- 15 having evidence of their innocence presented in court by
- 16 advocating for updates to Pennsylvania's postconviction laws;
- 17 and
- 18 WHEREAS, The Pennsylvania Innocence Project continues to
- 19 advocate for policies that provide just compensation for victims
- 20 of wrongful conviction, extend the time inmates must file a
- 21 petition after finding evidence of innocence, allow prisoners to
- 22 request DNA testing in appropriate cases and require
- 23 accreditation of forensic science laboratories; therefore be it
- 24 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the
- 25 10th anniversary of the Pennsylvania Innocence Project and its
- 26 efforts to free the convicted innocent; and be it further
- 27 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives commend the work
- 28 that the Pennsylvania Innocence Project has done over the past
- 29 10 years to restore peace and justice to the convicted innocent
- 30 and prevent injustice through its impressive efforts to reform

1 the criminal justice system.
