A RESOLUTION

- Directing the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee to 1 conduct a study and issue a report regarding recycling in 2 this Commonwealth and the feasibility of creating targeted 3 recycling economic development zone programs in this 5 Commonwealth. 6 WHEREAS, The act of July 28, 1988 (P.L.556, No.101), known as 7 the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act, required municipalities with specified populations to implement 8 9 recycling programs; and 10 WHEREAS, Currently, 1,930 of Pennsylvania's 2,700 11 municipalities have a recycling program, serving 94% of the 12 population of this Commonwealth; and 13 WHEREAS, The Recycling Partnership's 2020 State of Curbside 14 Recycling Report found that only 32% of materials are being 15 recycled nationally; and 16 WHEREAS, While that recycling rate might seem to be
- 17 acceptable, it does not approach the levels that many
- 18 policymakers hoped for and it masks some of the severe
- 19 challenges currently facing the recycling industry; and

- 1 WHEREAS, There is widespread agreement among business owners
- 2 in the recycling industry, recycling professionals, municipal
- 3 officials and environmental advocates that the recycling
- 4 industry now confronts a multitude of issues, including
- 5 dwindling markets, material contamination and escalating program
- 6 costs; and
- 7 WHEREAS, There are reports that recyclable materials are
- 8 simply being placed in landfills because markets for collected
- 9 materials are lacking; and
- 10 WHEREAS, The difficulties facing the recycling industry
- 11 nationally are consistent with the difficulties in this
- 12 Commonwealth, and this reality does not make sense economically
- 13 or environmentally; therefore be it
- 14 RESOLVED, That the Senate direct the Legislative Budget and
- 15 Finance Committee to conduct a study and issue a report
- 16 regarding recycling in this Commonwealth and the feasibility of
- 17 creating targeted recycling economic development zone programs
- 18 in this Commonwealth; and be it further
- 19 RESOLVED, That the study explore ways of improving the
- 20 economic and environmental viability of recycling in this
- 21 Commonwealth, including enhancing markets for recycled materials
- 22 and developing recycling economic development programs in this
- 23 Commonwealth as other states have done; and be it further
- 24 RESOLVED, That the study address how other states, such as
- 25 California, Colorado, Florida, Indiana, Maine, Michigan,
- 26 Minnesota, Missouri and Ohio, have recycling assistance
- 27 resources for businesses; and be it further
- 28 RESOLVED, That the study:
- 29 (1) explore best practices in local government
- 30 contracting, such as zero waste authorities;

- 1 (2) examine methods of investing in local recycling 2 infrastructure;
- 3 (3) research how recycling can be structured to better 4 benefit local economies;
- 5 (4) examine material collection policy to address 6 highest and best use of materials, such as guidelines as to 7 what packaging producers can label as "recycled"; and
- 8 (5) examine public education strategies to reduce 9 contamination of materials in the recycling stream, which 10 makes it difficult for material recovery facilities to 11 economically bring materials to market;
- 12 and be it further
- 13 RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee
- 14 prepare a report of the findings and recommendations of the
- 15 study and submit the report to the Secretary of the Senate and
- 16 the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives within one year
- 17 of the adoption of this resolution.
