- 15 Section 2. United States Navy Petty Officer 1st Class A. Louis 16 De Lancey Memorial Highway.
- 17 Findings. -- The General Assembly finds and declares as 18 follows:
 - (1) A. Louis "Lou" De Lancey was born March 8, 1936, in Newport to Sherman and Dorothy Adams De Lancey.
 - (2) In June 1954, De Lancey joined the Navy and served aboard the USS Midway and the USS Hanson during the Korean War era.
 - (3) While aboard the USS Midway, Petty Officer De Lancey assisted in the evacuation of more than 18,000 civilians and 15,000 of Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist troops to Formosa, now known as Taiwan, as they fled from the Communist People's Liberation Army advancing on the Dachen (Tachen) Islands.
 - (4) In recognition of his service, Petty Officer De Lancey received the China Service Medal, the Good Conduct Medal and the National Defense Service Medal.
- 32 (5) Petty Officer De Lancey was a lifelong member and 33 Post Commander of William H. Saylor VFW #34, Newport American 34 Legion Post #177, Commander of the Perry Council VFW, 35 cofounder and President of the Perry County Sailors

- a member of the Navy Club of the USA and was inducted to the Chapel of the Four Chaplains Legion of Honor in 2003 for his work with the Korean War Veterans Recognition Ceremony.
- (6) In addition to his military service, Petty Officer De Lancey was a member of the Loyal Order of Moose Lodge #925 and the Plumbers and Pipefitters Local Union #520.
- (7) After a courageous battle with cancer, Petty Officer De Lancey passed away on February 23, 2014, at 77 years of age.
- (b) Designation.--The section of Pennsylvania Route 849 in Newport, Perry County, is hereby designated as the United States Navy Petty Officer 1st Class A. Louis De Lancey Memorial Highway.
- (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to traffic in both directions on the highway.
- Section 3. Edward W. Helfrick Resource Management Center.
- (a) Declaration of policy. -- The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:
 - (1) Edward W. Helfrick served as Senator from the 27th Senatorial District from 1981 to 2003.
 - (2) The Roaring Creek Tract of the Weiser State Forest in Northumberland and Columbia Counties was established in 2003.
 - (3) Senator Helfrick was widely known as an outdoors enthusiast, taking part in and promoting outdoor recreational opportunities.
 - (4) Senator Helfrick was instrumental in the transfer of land from a private company to the Commonwealth to establish the Roaring Creek Tract of the Weiser State Forest to provide additional outdoor recreational opportunities and to preserve the land in an undeveloped state.
 - (b) Designation. --

- (1) The Resource Management Center located in the Weiser State Forest in Conyngham Township, Columbia County, is designated and shall be referred to as the Edward W. Helfrick Resource Management Center.
- (2) The Department of General Services shall erect and the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources shall maintain appropriate signage to indicate the designation under paragraph (1).
- Section 4. Officers Luke Arlington Conner and J. Horace Callaghan Memorial Highway.
 - (a) Findings.--
 - (1) Officer Luke Arlington Conner.
 - (i) Officer Conner was a resident of Prospect Park and an officer of the Prospect Park Police Department for two years.
 - (ii) On October 8, 1919, Officer Conner was on foot patrol on U.S. Route 13, also known as the Chester Pike, and was struck by a vehicle, dying six hours later in a

1 local hospital. (iii) Officer Conner was survived by his wife and 2 3 five children. 4 (2) Officer J. Horace Callaghan. 5

- Officer Callaghan was a resident of Prospect Park and an officer of the Prospect Park Police Department for 15 years.
- (ii) On December 21, 1940, Officer Callaghan was directing traffic on U.S. Route 13, also known as the Chester Pike, near Stewart Avenue, when he was struck by a drunk driver.
- (iii) Officer Callaghan was survived by his wife and three children.
- (b) Designation. -- The 700 to 800 block of U.S. Route 13, also known as the Chester Pike, in Prospect Park Borough, Delaware County, is designated as the Officers Luke Arlington Conner and J. Horace Callaghan Memorial Highway.
- Signs. -- The Department of Transportation shall erect and maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to traffic in both directions on the highway. Section 5. Repeals.

The act of June 26, 2014 (P.L.790, No.77), entitled "An act 23 designating the 700 to 800 block of U.S. Route 13, also known as the Chester Pike, in Prospect Park Borough, Delaware County, as the Officers Luke Arlington Conner and John Horace Callaghan Memorial Highway," is repealed.
