13 "Eligible entity" shall mean a city of the third class, a hospital, a church, a synagogue, a volunteer fire company, a 14 15 volunteer ambulance company, a volunteer rescue squad, a unit of a nationally chartered club which has been issued a club liquor 16 17 license, a club which has been issued a club liquor license and 18 which, as of December 31, 2002, has been in existence for at 19 least 100 years, a library, a nationally accredited Pennsylvania nonprofit zoological institution licensed by the United States 20 21 Department of Agriculture, a nonprofit agricultural association 22 in existence for at least ten years, a bona fide sportsmen's 23 club in existence for at least ten years, a nationally chartered 24 veterans' organization and any affiliated lodge or subdivision 25 of such organization, a fraternal benefit society that is 26 licensed to do business in this Commonwealth and any affiliated 27 lodge or subdivision of such fraternal benefit society, a museum 28 operated by a nonprofit corporation, a nonprofit corporation 29 engaged in the performing arts, an arts council, a nonprofit 30 corporation that operates an arts facility or museum, a nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the 31 32 Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (Public Law 99-514, 26 U.S.C. § 33 501(c)(3)) whose purpose is to protect the architectural 34 heritage of a municipality and which has been recognized as such 35 by a resolution of the municipality, a nonprofit organization as

36 37 defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of

1986 (Public Law 99-514, 26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)) conducting a

regatta in a city of the second class with the permit to be used on State park grounds or conducting a family-oriented celebration as part of Welcome America in a city of the first class on property leased from that city for more than fifty years, a nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)) 7 whose purpose is to raise funds for the research and treatment of cystic fibrosis, a nonprofit organization as defined under 9 section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)) whose purpose is to educate the public on 10 11 issues dealing with watershed conservation, a nonprofit 12 organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal 13 Revenue Code of 1986 (Public Law 99-514, 26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)) whose purpose is to provide equine assisted activities for 14 15 children and adults with special needs, a nonprofit economic 16 development agency in a city of the second class with the primary function to serve as an economic generator for the 17 18 greater southwestern Pennsylvania region by attracting and supporting film, television and related media industry projects 19 20 and coordinating government and business offices in support of a 21 production, a county tourist promotion agency as defined in 22 section 2 of the act of July 4, 2008 (P.L.621, No.50), known as the "Tourism Promotion Act," a junior league that is a nonprofit 23 organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal 24 25 Revenue Code of 1986 (26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)) that is comprised 26 of women whose purpose is exclusively educational and charitable 27 in promoting the volunteerism of women and developing and 28 participating in community projects and that has been in 29 existence for over seventy years, a nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 30 31 1986 and whose purpose is the education and promotion of 32 American history, a nonprofit organization as defined under 33 section 501(c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 whose 34 purpose is to support business and industry, a brewery which has 35 been issued a license to manufacture malt or brewed beverages 36 and has been in existence for at least 100 years or a club 37 recognized by Rotary International and whose purpose is to 38 provide service to others, to promote high ethical standards and 39 to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through its fellowship of business, professional and community leaders or a 40 41 nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the 42 Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (Public Law 99-514, 26 U.S.C. § 43 501(c)(3)) whose purpose is to promote mushrooms while 44 supporting local and regional charities, a museum operated by a not-for-profit corporation in a city of the second class A, a 45 nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the 46 Internal Revenue Code of 1986 which is located in a city of the 47 48 second class A and has as its purpose economic and community 49 development, a nonprofit organization as defined under section 50 501(c)(3) or (6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 that is located in a city of the third class in a county of the fifth 51

class, a nonprofit social service organization defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 located in a county of the third class whose purpose is to serve individuals and families in that county of the third class, a nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 whose main purpose is to 7 temporarily foster stray and unwanted animals and match them to suitable permanent homes or a nonprofit organization as defined 9 under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 who operates either a Main Street Program or Elm Street Program 10 11 recognized by the Commonwealth, the National Trust for Historic 12 Preservation or both, a nonprofit radio station that is a member of the National Public Radio network, a nonprofit public 13 television station that is a member of the Pennsylvania Public 14 15 Television Network or a nonprofit organization as defined under 16 section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 whose purpose is to promote awareness, education and research and to 17 18 provide a support system for patients with neutropenia and their 19 families through a national resource network, a nonprofit 20 organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal 21 Revenue Code of 1986 whose main purpose is to stimulate community development by facilitating residential and retail 22 23 growth in a city of the second class located in a county of the 24 second class or a nonprofit community development corporation 25 organized under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 that serves an adjoining borough and township in a 26 27 county of the second class and whose main purpose is to 28 facilitate commercial development and foster neighborhood 29 stabilization, a nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 whose purpose is 30 31 to provide young people with a program to build character, to 32 teach the responsibilities of citizenship and to develop 33 personal fitness with a goal of creating future leaders, a 34 nonprofit as defined in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 whose main purpose is to assist children 35 36 and their families who are facing financial hardship due to the 37 death of a parent, a nonprofit as defined under section 501(c) 38 (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 whose purpose is to 39 allocate funds for research to expedite a cure achromatopsia, a nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the 40 41 Internal Revenue Code of 1986 that is located in a city of the 42 first class, was organized [in 1995] as a community development 43 [corporation] organization to promote health, safety and welfare 44 of the residents, businesses and institutions of a neighborhood of a city of the first class, and whose works include public 45 promotions, neighborhood improvement projects and commercial 46 corridor improvements, including a business improvement 47 district, or a nonprofit organization as defined under section 48 49 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 that is 50 responsible for providing services to members of the armed 51 forces of the United States and relief to disaster victims in

- 1 the United States and abroad, or any neighborhood improvement
- 2 district management association as defined in section 3 of the
- 3 act of December 20, 2000 (P.L.949, No.130), known as the
- 4 "Neighborhood Improvement District Act," that has been
- 5 established as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization under section
- 6 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, a nonprofit
- 7 organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal
- 8 Revenue Code of 1986 located in a city of the first class whose
- 9 purpose is to support initiatives to enrich the lives of
- 10 children, teens and families especially those in need, to reach
- 11 their full potential as productive and responsible citizens and
- 12 has been in existence for at least seventy-five years, or a
- 13 nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the
- 14 Internal Revenue Code of 1986 located in a city of the second
- 15 class and incorporated as a nonprofit in 1982 that offers adult
- 16 education and family literacy, or a nonprofit organization as
- 17 defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of
- 18 1986 located in a city of the third class and county of the
- 19 sixth class, whose purpose is primary and secondary education
- 20 and educational ministry of the Diocese of Erie, or a nonprofit
- 21 organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal
- 22 Revenue Code located in a county of the fourth class that had a
- 23 population between 142,000 and 144,000 based on the 2010
- 24 Decennial Census of the Bureau of the Census and provides
- 25 rewards for information that leads to the arrest of individuals
- 26 that may have committed a crime.
