6 all of line 1 on page 2 and inserting

7 Section 1. The definition of "eligible entity" in section
8 102 of the act of April 12, 1951 (P.L.90, No.21), known as the
9 Liquor Code, is amended to read:

10 Section 102. Definitions.--The following words or phrases,
11 unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, shall have the
12 meanings ascribed to them in this section:

13 * * *

14 "Eligible entity" shall mean a city of the third class, a
15 hospital, a church, a synagogue, a volunteer fire company, a
16 volunteer ambulance company, a volunteer rescue squad, a unit of
17 a nationally chartered club which has been issued a club liquor
18 license, a club which has been issued a club liquor license and
19 which, as of December 31, 2002, has been in existence for at
20 least 100 years, a library, a nationally accredited Pennsylvania
21 nonprofit zoological institution licensed by the United States
22 Department of Agriculture, a nonprofit agricultural association
23 in existence for at least ten years, a bona fide sportsmen's
24 club in existence for at least ten years, a nationally chartered
25 veterans' organization and any affiliated lodge or subdivision
26 of such organization, a fraternal benefit society that is
27 licensed to do business in this Commonwealth and any affiliated
28 lodge or subdivision of such fraternal benefit society, any
29 nationally recognized community-based voluntary health
30 organization committed to fighting cancer, which has been in
31 existence for at least 100 years, a museum operated by a
32 nonprofit corporation, a nonprofit corporation engaged in the
33 performing arts, an arts council, a nonprofit corporation that
34 operates an arts facility or museum, a nonprofit organization as
35 defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of
36 1986 (Public Law 99-514, 26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)) whose purpose is

1 to protect the architectural heritage of a municipality and
2 which has been recognized as such by a resolution of the
3 municipality, a nonprofit organization as defined under section
4 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (Public Law 99-
5 514, 26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)) conducting a regatta in a city of
6 the second class with the permit to be used on State park
7 grounds or conducting a family-oriented celebration as part of
8 Welcome America in a city of the first class on property leased
9 from that city for more than fifty years, a nonprofit
10 organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal
11 Revenue Code of 1986 (26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)) whose purpose is to
12 raise funds for the research and treatment of cystic fibrosis, a
13 nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the
14 Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)) whose
15 purpose is to educate the public on issues dealing with
16 watershed conservation, a nonprofit organization as defined
17 under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986
18 (Public Law 99-514, 26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)) whose purpose is to
19 provide equine assisted activities for children and adults with
20 special needs, a nonprofit economic development agency in a city
21 of the second class with the primary function to serve as an
22 economic generator for the greater southwestern Pennsylvania
23 region by attracting and supporting film, television and related
24 media industry projects and coordinating government and business
25 offices in support of a production, a county tourist promotion
26 agency as defined in section 2 of the act of July 4, 2008
27 (P.L.621, No.50), known as the "Tourism Promotion Act," a junior
28 league that is a nonprofit organization as defined under section
29 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (26 U.S.C. §
30 501(c)(3)) that is comprised of women whose purpose is
31 exclusively educational and charitable in promoting the
32 volunteerism of women and developing and participating in
33 community projects and that has been in existence for over
34 seventy years, a nonprofit organization as defined under section
35 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 and whose purpose
36 is the education and promotion of American history, a nonprofit
37 organization as defined under section 501(c)(6) of the Internal
38 Revenue Code of 1986 whose purpose is to support business and
39 industry, a brewery which has been issued a license to
40 manufacture malt or brewed beverages and has been in existence
41 for at least 100 years or a club recognized by Rotary
42 International and whose purpose is to provide service to others,
43 to promote high ethical standards and to advance world
44 understanding, goodwill and peace through its fellowship of
45 business, professional and community leaders or a nonprofit
46 organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal
47 Revenue Code of 1986 (Public Law 99-514, 26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3))
48 whose purpose is to promote mushrooms while supporting local and
49 regional charities, a museum operated by a not-for-profit
50 corporation in a city of the second class A, a nonprofit
51 organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal

1 Revenue Code of 1986 which is located in a city of the second
2 class A and has as its purpose economic and community
3 development, a nonprofit organization as defined under section
4 501(c)(3) or (6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 that is
5 located in a city of the third class in a county of the fifth
6 class, a nonprofit social service organization defined under
7 section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 located
8 in a county of the third class whose purpose is to serve
9 individuals and families in that county of the third class, a
10 nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the
11 Internal Revenue Code of 1986 whose main purpose is to
12 temporarily foster stray and unwanted animals and match them to
13 suitable permanent homes or a nonprofit organization as defined
14 under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 who
15 operates either a Main Street Program or Elm Street Program
16 recognized by the Commonwealth, the National Trust for Historic
17 Preservation or both, a nonprofit radio station that is a member
18 of the National Public Radio network, a nonprofit public
19 television station that is a member of the Pennsylvania Public
20 Television Network or a nonprofit organization as defined under
21 section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 whose
22 purpose is to promote awareness, education and research and to
23 provide a support system for patients with neutropenia and their
24 families through a national resource network, a nonprofit
25 organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal
26 Revenue Code of 1986 whose main purpose is to stimulate
27 community development by facilitating residential and retail
28 growth in a city of the second class located in a county of the
29 second class or a nonprofit community development corporation
30 organized under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code
31 of 1986 that serves an adjoining borough and township in a
32 county of the second class and whose main purpose is to
33 facilitate commercial development and foster neighborhood
34 stabilization, a nonprofit organization as defined under section
35 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 whose purpose is
36 to provide young people with a program to build character, to
37 teach the responsibilities of citizenship and to develop
38 personal fitness with a goal of creating future leaders, a
39 nonprofit as defined in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal
40 Revenue Code of 1986 whose main purpose is to assist children
41 and their families who are facing financial hardship due to the
42 death of a parent, a nonprofit as defined under section 501(c)
43 (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 whose purpose is to
44 allocate funds for research to expedite a cure achromatopsia, a
45 nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the
46 Internal Revenue Code of 1986 that is located in a city of the
47 first class, was organized in 1995 as a community development
48 corporation to promote health, safety and welfare of the
49 residents, businesses and institutions of a neighborhood of a
50 city of the first class, and whose works include public
51 promotions, neighborhood improvement projects and commercial

corridor improvements, including a business improvement district, or a nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 that is responsible for providing services to members of the armed forces of the United States and relief to disaster victims in the United States and abroad, or any neighborhood improvement district management association as defined in section 3 of the act of December 20, 2000 (P.L.949, No.130), known as the "Neighborhood Improvement District Act," that has been established as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, a nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 located in a city of the first class whose purpose is to support initiatives to enrich the lives of children, teens and families especially those in need, to reach their full potential as productive and responsible citizens and has been in existence for at least seventy-five years, or a nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 located in a city of the second class and incorporated as a nonprofit in 1982 that offers adult education and family literacy, or a nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 located in a city of the third class and county of the sixth class, whose purpose is primary and secondary education and educational ministry of the Diocese of Erie, or a nonprofit organization as defined under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code located in a county of the fourth class that had a population between 142,000 and 144,000 based on the 2010 Decennial Census of the Bureau of the Census and provides rewards for information that leads to the arrest of individuals that may have committed a crime.
