       "Business reopening plan." A multiple phase plan developed

   by the Commonwealth for the gradual reopening of businesses that
   are subject to a business closure order pursuant to a

   declaration of public health emergency.

       "CARES Act." The Federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and

   Economic Security Act (Public Law 116-136, 134 Stat. 281).

      "COVID-19." The novel coronavirus, otherwise known as COVID-

       "Employee." An individual employed by a business.

      "Infectious disease." A disease that is caused by a

   microorganism, such as a bacterium, virus, or protozoan, that is

   not normally found in the human body and is capable of causing

   infection. Some, but not all, infectious diseases are

   contagious, meaning they can spread from person to person,

   including COVID-19 or the coronavirus. Other infectious diseases
   can spread from animals or insects to humans, but not from

   person to person.

      "Intermediate reopening phase." A phase of a business

   reopening plan developed to address business operations during a
   public health emergency where specific non-life-sustaining
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businesses within a specified county of the Commonwealth are
   authorized to reopen and conduct limited in-person and physical

   operations in compliance with quidance issued by the Centers for
   Disease Control and Prevention for businesses to plan and
   respond to COVID-19 or any other infectious disease, and the
   quidance on business practices issued by the Department of
   Health to address COVID-19 or any other infectious disease.

       "Life-sustaining business." A business that is designated as

   a life-sustaining business pursuant to a declaration of public
   health emergency issued by the Governor and any subsequent

       "Public health emergency." An emergency declaration by the

   Governor of an occurrence or imminent threat of a disease or
