                      COVID-19 HAZARDOUS DUTY WORK
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   Section 2102-D. Work-related hazardous duty.
       (a) Presumption of work-related hazardous duty. --
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   Notwithstanding any other provision of this act or any other law
   or regulation to the contrary, an individual employed by a life-
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   sustaining business or occupation who contracts, has symptoms of
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   or is otherwise exposed to an infectious disease, including
   COVID-19 (coronavirus) or any other novel virus or infectious
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   disease during the declaration of a disaster emergency under 35
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   Pa.C.S. § 7301 (relating to general authority of Governor), the
   declaration of an epidemic or a public health emergency in this
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   Commonwealth by the Governor or a pandemic, which results in a
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   period of hospitalization, quarantine, isolation or other
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   control measures due to such infection or exposure, shall
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   establish a presumption that the individual's medical condition
   or inability to work is work-related hazardous duty.
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      (b) Hazardous duty deemed on-duty time. -- An individual with
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   an established presumption of work-related hazardous duty under
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   subsection (a) may not be required to use sick time, vacation
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   time, personal time or any other accrued paid time off or
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   contractual time off to cover the period of incapacitation or
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   inability to work.
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      (c) Eliqibility and qualification; unemployment and workers'
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  compensation. --
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          (1) Notwithstanding any provision of the act of December
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      5, 1936 (2nd Sp.Sess., 1937 P.L.2897, No.1), known as the
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      Unemployment Compensation Law, an individual with an
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      established presumption of work-related hazardous duty under
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subsection (a) shall be eligible and qualified for unemployment compensation for the duration of the period of incapacitation or inability to work.
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- (2) Notwithstanding any provision of the act of June 2, 1915 (P.L.736, No.338), known as the Workers' Compensation Act, an individual with an established presumption of work-related hazardous duty under subsection (a) shall be eligible and qualified for workers' compensation for all medical costs related to such infection or exposure.
- (d) Applicability.--Notwithstanding subsection (a), this section shall apply to individuals who work for a non-life-sustaining business or occupation that receives a waiver from the Department of Community and Economic Development authorizing the non-life-sustaining business or occupation to continue business operations during the period of time that a declaration of a disaster or public health emergency is effective.

  Section 2102-D. Definitions.

For the purpose of this section, the following words and phrases when used in this section shall have the meanings given to them in this subsection, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

"COVID-19." The term shall have the meaning given to it in section 2101-C(d).

"Infectious disease." A disease which is caused by a microorganism, such as a bacterium, virus, or protozoan, which is not normally found in the human body, and which is capable of causing infection. Some, but not all, infectious diseases are contagious, meaning they can spread from person to person, including COVID-19 or the coronavirus. Other infectious diseases can spread from animals or insects to humans, but not from person to person.

"Life-sustaining business or occupation." A list of businesses or occupations, as designated by the Governor, which performs or conducts a range of vital operations, functions and services that are essential to assisting the Commonwealth and its political subdivisions in protecting people and their communities while ensuring continuity of functions critical and essential to public health and safety, as well as economic and homeland security, and which should continue normal operations, appropriately modified to account for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Department of Health workforce and customer protection guidance, during the declaration of a disaster or public health emergency.

"Public health emergency." An emergency declaration by the Governor of an occurrence or imminent threat of a disease or condition of critical public health importance with the following characteristics:

(1) Is believed to be caused by any of the following: (i) the emergence and spread of a novel or previously controlled or eradicated infectious disease; or

	(i) Death.
6	(ii) Serious or long-term disabilities.
7	(iii) Widespread exposure to an infectious disease,
8	which poses a significant risk of substantial present or

10	"Individual employed by a life-sustaining business or
11	occupation." Front-line employees and other individuals
12	employed by or under contract with a life-sustaining business or
13	entity who work during the declaration of a disaster emergency
14	or a public health emergency. The term shall include, but not
15	<pre>limited to:</pre>
16	(1) First responders, including law enforcement
17	officers, firefighters, emergency medical technicians and
18	other individuals who are considered to be first responders.
19	(2) Corrections officers.
20	(3) Emergency services dispatchers.
21	(4) Ambulance drivers.
22	(5) Retail workers, including restaurant, food services
23	and grocery store workers, cashiers and other support staff.
24	(6) Food and agriculture workers.
25	(7) Medical, health care and public health workers,
26	including doctors, nursing professionals, physician
27	assistants and paramedics, and other support staff.
28	(8) Pharmacists and any cashiers and other pharmacy
