

## AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 11

1 Amend Bill, page 1, line 3, by striking out the period after  
2 "Highway" and inserting  
3 ; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge Key 13861, carrying  
4 State Route 1025 over State Route 1014 in East Pennsboro  
5 Township, Cumberland County, as the Senator Hal Mowery  
6 Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge  
7 Key 15986, on that portion of Interstate 79 northbound over  
8 West 16th Street in the City of Erie, Erie County, as the  
9 U.S. Marine Captain Thomas J. Kennedy, Jr., Memorial Bridge;  
10 designating the bridge identified as Bridge Key 16385 on the  
11 portion of State Route 4016, also known as West 38th Street,  
12 between Schaper Avenue and Pittsburgh Avenue over Interstate  
13 79 in the City of Erie as the Major Tom Carr Memorial Bridge;  
14 and making related repeals.

16 said lines and inserting

17 Section 2. Senator Hal Mowery Memorial Bridge.

18 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
19 follows:

20 (1) Harold F. Mowery, Jr., was born January 4, 1930, in  
21 Chambersburg and was raised in Mechanicsburg.

22 (2) As a graduate of Mechanicsburg High School and  
23 Dickinson College, Mr. Mowery was a product of the  
24 Pennsylvania education system.

25 (3) Mr. Mowery entered the insurance business in 1954  
26 and earned a chartered life underwriter degree. Over several  
27 decades, Mr. Mowery founded multiple highly successful  
28 insurance businesses that employed hundreds of  
29 Pennsylvanians.

30 (4) Mr. Mowery was elected to the House of  
31 Representatives in 1976 and went on to serve seven terms. In  
32 the House of Representatives, Mr. Mowery achieved a  
33 reputation for expertise on fiscal and pension issues and  
34 advocated for the application of private-sector business  
35 principles to the operation of public programs and State  
36 spending. He was also instrumental in establishing the Public

1 Employee Retirement Commission.

2 (5) In 1992, Mr. Mowery was elected to represent the  
3 31st District in the Senate of Pennsylvania. He served with  
4 distinction until his retirement in 2004.

5 (6) During his time in the Senate, Senator Mowery  
6 enriched the lives of thousands as chairperson of the former  
7 Public Health and Welfare Committee and vice chairperson of  
8 the Education Committee. He also served as vice chairperson  
9 of the Legislative Data Processing Committee and as a rank-  
10 and-file member of numerous standing committees, including  
11 Banking and Insurance, Law and Justice and Labor and  
12 Industry.

13 (7) During and after his public service career, Senator  
14 Mowery was a prominent community leader. He supported the  
15 establishment of the Camp Hill Lion Foundation to enhance  
16 academic, athletic and cultural resources. He was also a  
17 supporter of the Whitaker Center for Science and the Arts,  
18 the construction of the Grace Milliman Pollock Performing  
19 Arts Center and the performing arts, including the Harrisburg  
20 Symphony Orchestra. Senator Mowery aided many charities by  
21 sponsoring and supporting benefits, galas and community  
22 fundraisers.

23 (8) Senator Mowery's professional achievements,  
24 extensive community involvement and the myriad of awards and  
25 accolades he received stand as strong testimony to his  
26 genuine concern for the well-being of this Commonwealth and  
27 the people of the 31st Senatorial District.

28 (9) By all accounts, Senator Mowery was a loving family  
29 man, a respected businessperson and a dedicated and  
30 accomplished public servant worthy of emulation for  
31 generations to come.

32 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key  
33 13861, carrying State Route 1025 over State Route 1014 in East  
34 Pennsboro Township, Cumberland County, is designated as the  
35 Senator Hal Mowery Memorial Bridge.

36 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
37 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
38 traffic in both directions on the bridge and both directions on  
39 State Route 1014.

40 Section 3. U.S. Marine Captain Thomas J. Kennedy, Jr., Memorial  
41 Bridge.

42 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
43 follows:

44 (1) Thomas J. Kennedy, Jr., was born May 18, 1930, in  
45 the City of Erie, Erie County, and served the United States  
46 in the Marine Corps, where he reached the rank of Captain.

47 (2) Captain Kennedy was the Senior Battalion Advisor to  
48 the Fifth Battalion, Vietnamese Marine Brigade, in the  
49 hostile area of Phu An, Quang Ngai Province, Vietnam.

50 (3) On June 12, 1966, Captain Kennedy was with the Fifth  
51 Battalion Command Post when the lead elements were pinned

1 down by heavy enemy fire and the Command Post was destroyed  
2 by enemy mortar and rifle fire, killing the Battalion  
3 Commander, the Battalion Surgeon, key staff officers and  
4 numerous soldiers.

5 (4) Although suffering multiple shrapnel wounds, Captain  
6 Kennedy located a radio and, with his last breath, reported  
7 the situation, allowing the battalion to set up a defensive  
8 perimeter and repulse repeated enemy attacks.

9 (5) Despite his mortal wounds, Captain Kennedy prevented  
10 enemy forces from overrunning the remaining battalion units  
11 and valiantly gave his life protecting the lives of his  
12 fellow Marines.

13 (6) For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action,  
14 Captain Kennedy was posthumously awarded the Silver Star, the  
15 third-highest personal decoration for valor in combat.

16 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key  
17 15986, on that portion of Interstate 79 northbound over West  
18 16th Street in the City of Erie, Erie County, is designated the  
19 U.S. Marine Captain Thomas J. Kennedy, Jr., Memorial Bridge.

20 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
21 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
22 traffic in both directions on the bridge.  
23 Section 4. Major Tom Carr Memorial Bridge.

24 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as  
25 follows:

26 (1) Tom M. Carr was born April 17, 1961, in Wilkes-  
27 Barre.

28 (2) Major Carr was a 1979 graduate of Erie Tech Memorial  
29 High School.

30 (3) Major Carr graduated from Clemson University in  
31 1984, earning a Bachelor of Science degree in electrical  
32 engineering.

33 (4) In 1986, Major Carr began a distinguished military  
34 career in the United States Air Force as an F-16 fighter  
35 pilot.

36 (5) Major Carr was hand-picked for the Air Force "Elite"  
37 Fighter Weapons School, where he was praised for his  
38 outstanding leadership as senior ranking officer.

39 (6) During his service, Major Carr was stationed in  
40 Korea, the Persian Gulf, Italy, Bahrain, Bosnia, and Iraq.  
41 He flew numerous combat missions, including during Operation  
42 Northern Watch in Iraq, and flew over 2,000 fighter sorties.

43 (7) After leaving active duty, Major Carr became an Air  
44 Force reservist assigned to the 93rd Fighter Squadron at  
45 Homestead Air Reserve Station in Florida, where he served as  
46 the Squadron Weapons Officer.

47 (8) Major Carr's outstanding professional skill,  
48 leadership and ceaseless efforts as an Air Force reservist  
49 facilitated two major overseas deployments, three live  
50 weapons deployments, one Operational Readiness Inspection and  
51 an expeditious conversion from the F-16A to the F-16C

1 aircraft.

2 (9) On September 12, 1998, Major Carr sacrificed his  
3 life in defense of his nation when, during an Air Force  
4 attack-training mission, his F-16D jet went down over the  
5 Avon Bombing Range in Florida.

6 (10) Major Carr was posthumously awarded the Meritorious  
7 Service Medal by the President of the United States.

8 (b) Designation.--The bridge identified as Bridge Key 16385  
9 on the portion of State Route 4016, also known as West 38th  
10 Street, between Schaper Avenue and Pittsburgh Avenue over  
11 Interstate 79 in the City of Erie is designated as the Major Tom  
12 Carr Memorial Bridge.

13 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and  
14 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to  
15 traffic in both directions on the bridge and to traffic in both  
16 directions on Interstate 79 crossing under the bridge.

17 Section 5. Repeals are as follows:

18 (1) The General Assembly declares that the repeal under  
19 paragraph (2) is necessary to effectuate the designation  
20 under section 2 of this act.

21 (2) The act of June 5, 2020 (P.L.244, No.31), entitled  
22 "An act designating the bridge carrying State Route 1025 over  
23 U.S. Route 11/15 in East Pennsboro Township, Cumberland  
24 County, as the Senator Hal Mowery Memorial Bridge," is  
25 repealed.

26 (3) The General Assembly declares that the repeal under  
27 paragraph (4) is necessary to effectuate the designation  
28 under section 3 of this act.

29 (4) Section 6 of the act of July 2, 2019 (P.L.318,  
30 No.44), entitled "An act designating a bridge on that portion  
31 of State Route 3047 over the South Branch of Blacklick Creek,  
32 Blacklick Township, Cambria County, as the Private First  
33 Class Steve L. Klosz Memorial Bridge; designating the 2100 to  
34 2200 block of Castor Avenue, State Route 1005, in  
35 Philadelphia County as the Police Officer Raymond Diaz, Jr.,  
36 Memorial Highway; designating the portion of Interstate 376  
37 from the end of the bridge identified as Bridge Key 3522 to  
38 the exit at State Route 51 in Beaver County as the Richard L.  
39 Shaw Memorial Highway; designating the bridge identified as  
40 Bridge Key 3522 on that portion of Interstate 376 over the  
41 Ohio River in Vanport Township, Beaver County, as the USAF  
42 Combat Controller Staff Sgt. Dylan Elchin Memorial Bridge;  
43 designating the first block of West Main Street, State Route  
44 1010, in Fleetwood Borough, Berks County, as the Alex J.  
45 Szoke Highway; designating the bridge identified as Bridge  
46 Key 15986 on that portion of Interstate 79 northbound over  
47 West 16th Street in the City of Erie, Erie County, as the  
48 Thomas J. Kennedy, Jr., Memorial Bridge; designating the  
49 bridge on that portion of State Route 4011 over Pine Creek,  
50 Hegins Township, Schuylkill County, as the A. Donald  
51 Buffington Memorial Bridge; designating a portion of

1 Pennsylvania Route 144 beginning at the intersection of  
2 Pennsylvania Route 64 in Pleasant Gap and ending at the  
3 intersection of Pennsylvania Route 45 in Centre Hall, Centre  
4 County, as the Duster-Quad 50-Searchlight Highway; and  
5 designating a portion of Pennsylvania Route 50 in  
6 Independence Township, Washington County, as the Lt. Col.  
7 Juanita L. Warman Memorial Highway," is repealed.

8 (5) The General Assembly declares that the repeal under  
9 paragraph (6) is necessary to effectuate the designation  
10 under section 4 of this act.

11 (6) Section 10 of the act of October 24, 2018 (P.L.1163,  
12 No.161), entitled "An act designating a bridge on that  
13 portion of Pennsylvania Route 100 over the Schuylkill River  
14 in Pottstown Borough, Montgomery County, as the Newstell  
15 Marable, Sr., Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge on  
16 Stoughstown Road over Interstate 81 in Cumberland County  
17 (bridge number 21-3007-0020-0865), as the Private Raymond  
18 Lafayette Naugle Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge on  
19 Maple Avenue over the Yellow Breeches Creek in Walnut Bottom  
20 Township, Cumberland County (bridge number 21-3009-0012-  
21 0000), as the Sergeant Kenneth Lee "Buck" Devor Memorial  
22 Bridge; designating a bridge on that portion of U.S. Route  
23 219 South, over U.S. Route 22, also known as the Admiral  
24 Peary Highway, in Cambria Township, Cambria County, as the  
25 PFC Nick Kozorosky Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge on  
26 that portion of Pennsylvania Route 286, known as Washington  
27 Street, over the Kiskiminetas River, between Saltsburg  
28 Borough, Indiana County, and Loyalhanna Township,  
29 Westmoreland County, as the First Sergeant Alexander Kelly  
30 Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge identified as Bridge  
31 Key 14196 located on that portion of Pennsylvania Route 39,  
32 also known as Linglestown Road, over U.S. Route 22 in the  
33 City of Harrisburg, Dauphin County, as the Specialist 4  
34 Reuben Garnett, Jr., Memorial Bridge; designating a portion  
35 of Pennsylvania Route 54 in West Mahanoy Township, Schuylkill  
36 County, as the Francis V. "Angie" McAndrew Memorial Highway;  
37 designating a portion of State Route 2026 in Upper Moreland  
38 Township, Montgomery County, as the Corporal Michael Dennis  
39 Cooke Memorial Highway; designating the portion of State  
40 Route 192 from the intersection with State Route 477 in Miles  
41 Township, Centre County, to the intersection with State Route  
42 144 in Centre Hall Borough, Centre County, as the Central  
43 Pennsylvania Vietnam Veterans Memorial Highway; designating  
44 the bridge identified as Bridge Key 16385 on the portion of  
45 State Route 4016, also known as West 38th Street, between  
46 Schaper Avenue and Pittsburgh Avenue over Interstate 79 in  
47 the City of Erie as the Major Tom Carr Memorial Bridge;  
48 designating a pedestrian bridge over that portion of State  
49 Route 252, also known as Providence Road, between Stackhouse  
50 Lane and Copples Lane in Nether Providence Township, Delaware  
51 County, as the Jack Hontz Memorial Bridge; designating the

1 portion of State Route 3011, also known as 29th Street,  
2 between Master Street and Thompson Street, in the City of  
3 Philadelphia, as the Frank L. Oliver Memorial Highway;  
4 designating a bridge on that portion of State Route 4001,  
5 also known as Henry Avenue, over the Wissahickon Creek and  
6 Lincoln Drive in Fairmount Park, Philadelphia County, as the  
7 Brigadier General Anna Mae V. McCabe Hays Memorial Bridge;  
8 designating a portion of State Route 2050 in Montgomery  
9 County as the First Lieutenant Geoffrey Lawrence Ham Memorial  
10 Highway; designating the bridge on State Route 641, also  
11 known as East High Street, over the Letort Spring in Carlisle  
12 Borough, Cumberland County, as the Lance Corporal Edward  
13 Rykoskey Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge on that  
14 portion of Pennsylvania Route 405 over Norfolk Southern  
15 Railway tracks, West Chillisquaque Township, Northumberland  
16 County, as the H. Donald Whipple Memorial Bridge; designating  
17 a bridge on that portion of Pennsylvania Route 36 over Three  
18 Springs Run, South Woodbury Township, Bedford County, as the  
19 Marine Lance Corporal Darrell Magruder Memorial Bridge;  
20 designating a bridge on that portion of State Route 1001 over  
21 Imlertown Run, Bedford Township, Bedford County, as the First  
22 Lieutenant Eric Fisher Wood, Jr., Memorial Bridge;  
23 designating a bridge on U.S. Route 209 over the West Branch  
24 Schuylkill River in Pottsville, Schuylkill County, as the  
25 Captain David A. Boris Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge  
26 on that portion of State Route 1010 over the Conestoga River,  
27 Lancaster County, as the Sergeant Melvin R. Wink Memorial  
28 Bridge; designating a portion of Pennsylvania Route 563 in  
29 Bucks County as the PFC John Rivers Way; designating a bridge  
30 on that portion of U.S. Route 219 over the Kinzua Creek,  
31 Lafayette Township, McKean County, as the Staff Sergeant Carl  
32 Enis Memorial Bridge; designating a portion of Pennsylvania  
33 Route 339 in Columbia County as the Turner Memorial Highway;  
34 designating the viaduct bridges located on Interstate 80,  
35 Eastbound, Segment Number 1382, Offset 0000, and Westbound,  
36 Segment Number 1383, Offset 0000, in Cooper Township,  
37 Clearfield County, over Moshannon Creek as the Richard B.  
38 Whitehead Memorial Bridges; and designating the bridge to be  
39 constructed on that portion of Pennsylvania Route 88 over  
40 Peters Creek, Finleyville Borough, Washington County, as the  
41 John Emerick Memorial Bridge," is repealed.

42 Section 6. This act shall take effect as follows:

48 (2) The remainder of this act shall take effect in 60  
49 days.
