## A RESOLUTION

- 1 Honoring the League of Women Voters on the occasion of its 85th 2 anniversary.
- 3 WHEREAS, On March 24, 1919, at the 50th Anniversary Jubilee
- 4 Convention of the National American Woman Suffrage Association
- 5 in St. Louis, Carrie Chapman Catt proposed the formation of a
- 6 "league of women voters to 'finish the fight' and to aid in the
- 7 reconstruction of the nation"; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Nearly a year later on February 14, 1920, the League
- 9 of Women Voters was officially founded at the Victory Convention
- 10 of the National American Woman Suffrage Association in Chicago,

- 1 as it celebrated House passage, Senate passage and ratification
- 2 by the states of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution of the
- 3 United States; and
- 4 WHEREAS, The League of Women Voters began as a "mighty
- 5 political experiment designed to help 20 million women carry
- 6 out their new responsibilities as voters, encouraging them to
- 7 use their new power to participate in shaping public policy; and
- 8 WHEREAS, The League of Women Voters' primary agenda in 1920
- 9 was to "make the general welfare" by attacking "illiteracy,
- 10 social evils, and industrial ills "such as collective
- 11 bargaining, child labor laws, compulsory education and equal
- 12 opportunity for women; and
- 13 WHEREAS, The League of Women Voters is now and has always
- 14 been a nonpartisan organization, thoroughly studying and
- 15 evaluating every issue before adopting a position on it; and
- 16 WHEREAS, The League of Women Voters' impact is felt at
- 17 national, State and local levels of government; and
- 18 WHEREAS, The League of Women Voters was instrumental in
- 19 Arizona in passing the Citizens Clean Money, Clean Elections Act
- 20 by collecting more than 190,000 signatures to get the initiative
- 21 on the ballot and then succeeding in winning 51% approval by
- 22 voters; and
- 23 WHEREAS, The League of Women Voters' 21st century vision
- 24 includes a renewed commitment to reconnecting citizens with
- 25 government, enhancing voter participation, including all voices
- 26 in civic life and strengthening the democratic process through
- 27 reform; therefore be it
- 28 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives honor the League
- 29 of Women Voters on the occasion of its 85th anniversary.
