## AN ACT

Designating the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf,
 Allegheny County, the Pennsylvania School for the Deaf,
 Philadelphia County, and the Scranton State School for the
 Deaf, Lackawanna County, as regional resource centers for
 hearing impairment.

6 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

7 hereby enacts as follows:

8 Section 1. Definitions.

9 The following words and phrases when used in this act shall

10 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the

11 context clearly indicates otherwise:

12 "Hearing impairment." Any hearing disability ranging in

13 severity from mild to profound, including those conditions

14 commonly referred to as "deaf" and "hard-of-hearing."

15 Section 2. Centers designated.

16 The Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf, Allegheny 17 County, the Pennsylvania School for the Deaf, Philadelphia County, and the Scranton State School for the Deaf, Lackawanna
 County, are hereby designated as regional resource centers for
 hearing-impaired children and adults.

4 Section 3. Services for the deaf.

5 These centers shall, when feasible, within the constraints of 6 available funds, continue to offer or expand to provide the 7 following services: <-----

8 (1) Comprehensive educational services to hearing 9 impaired and multihandicapped hearing impaired children and 10 adults at the infant, preschool, elementary, secondary and 11 postsecondary levels.

12 (2) Assessment, counseling and referral service to
 13 hearing impaired children and adults.

14 (3) Information for deaf and other hearing impaired 15 persons and their families, on services offered locally and 16 elsewhere.

17 (4) Expanded adult and continuing educational

18 opportunities for hearing impaired persons.

19 (5) A deaf awareness community education program,
 20 including training in communication techniques.

21 (6) An education and counseling program for parents of
 22 deaf infants, to encourage optimum communication and language
 23 development as preparation for school age programming.

24 (7) Diagnostic vocational assessment, career awareness
 25 and job readiness skills for hearing impaired persons; and
 26 assistance to other agencies in facilitating the transition
 27 of hearing impaired persons into the job market.

28 (8) Research and demonstration programs in the area of
 29 hearing impairment.

districts and other agencies.

(10) Professional training, demonstration and 2 3 dissemination services for professionals and community 4 members working with hearing impaired persons. 5 (11) An assurance of the availability of services which will enable hearing impaired persons to become self-6 7 sufficient and productive citizens of the community. 8 (12) An assurance that all the services above will be 9 available to hearing impaired persons regardless of income, 10 age or employability. 11 SECTION 3. SERVICES FOR THE HEARING IMPAIRED. <----12 THESE CENTERS SHALL CONTINUE TO OFFER CURRENT EDUCATIONAL 13 SERVICES, WITHIN THE CONSTRAINTS OF CURRENT FUNDING SOURCES, TO HEARING-IMPAIRED AND MULTIHANDICAPPED HEARING-IMPAIRED CHILDREN, 14 SUBJECT TO REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS PROMULGATED BY THE 15 16 DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION. IN ADDITION, OTHER FUNDING SOURCES WILL 17 BE USED TO DEVELOP AND EXPAND THE FOLLOWING SERVICES: 18 (1) ASSESSMENT, COUNSELING AND REFERRAL SERVICE TO 19 HEARING-IMPAIRED ADULTS. 20 (2) INFORMATION FOR DEAF AND OTHER HEARING-IMPAIRED PERSONS AND THEIR FAMILIES, ON THE VARIOUS FORMS AND SCOPE OF 21 SERVICES OFFERED LOCALLY AND ELSEWHERE. 22 23 (3) CONTINUING EDUCATIONAL SERVICES FOR HEARING-IMPAIRED 24 ADULTS. 25 (4) A DEAF AWARENESS COMMUNITY EDUCATION PROGRAM, 26 INCLUDING TRAINING IN COMMUNICATION TECHNIQUES. 27 (5) DIAGNOSTIC VOCATIONAL ASSESSMENT, CAREER AWARENESS 28 AND JOB-READINESS SKILLS FOR HEARING-IMPAIRED PERSONS; AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO OTHER AGENCIES IN FACILITATING THE 29 TRANSITION OF HEARING-IMPAIRED PERSONS INTO THE JOB MARKET. 30

(6) RESEARCH, PROFESSIONAL TRAINING, DEMONSTRATION AND
 DISSEMINATION SERVICES FOR PROFESSIONALS AND COMMUNITY
 MEMBERS WORKING WITH HEARING-IMPAIRED PERSONS.

4 (7) AN ASSURANCE OF THE AVAILABILITY OF SERVICES WHICH
5 WILL ENABLE HEARING-IMPAIRED PERSONS TO BECOME SELF6 SUFFICIENT AND PRODUCTIVE CITIZENS OF THE COMMUNITY.

7 (8) AN ASSURANCE THAT THE SERVICES PROVIDED WILL BE
8 AVAILABLE TO HEARING-IMPAIRED ADULTS REGARDLESS OF INCOME,
9 AGE OR EMPLOYABILITY.

10 Section 4. Effective date.

11 This act shall take effect in 60 days.
